Yule Broadcasts To Offer Varied Noted Performers

NEW YORK—(AP)—Margaret Truman is to sing three numbers when she makes her Dec. 20 appearance in the Carnegie Hall program with Frank Black's orchestra over ABC.

Two of the selections are in keeping with the season, "Silent Night" and "Little Town of Bethlehem." The other is an operatic aria. The Robert Shaw chorale will supply vocal accompaniment in addition to the orchestra.

A Christmas day broadcast based on a precedent set in previous days by Bing Crosby and his four sons is planned by NBC. As then, the network will go visiting at present-opening time around the Christmas tree.

In the first broadcast from Bing's home, microphones were placed as inconspicuously as possible so as to pick up the youngsters' reactions without their knowledge.

This time four homes will be visited during a half-hour period; those of Phil Harris, Robert Young, Frank Sinatra and Gordon McRae, all of whom have children in the Santa Claus age.

The next night Sinatra is to play an altogether different role. He'll turn actor as guest of the CBS Inner Sanctum, taking the lead in "The Enchanted Ghost."

Added to the Christmas list is to be an hour from the Vatican on Dec. 25 over NBC. In it the Sistine choir is to present the oratorio, "The Nativity."

860-Mile Speed Admitted By AF Jet Pilot Yeager

DAYTON, O.—(AP)—Capt. Charles Yeager, air force test pilot, disclosed Wednesday he had flown 100 miles an hour faster than the speed of sound "and then some."

It was the 26-year-old flier's first public announcement disclosing the extent to which he had exceeded the speed of sound, which is 760 m.p.h. at sea level.

The feat was accomplished in the air force's X-1 rocket plane, which Yeager has flown 30 times.

The accomplishment was made known in an exclusive interview obtained by Herbert Shaw, aviation writer of the Dayton Daily News.

Yeager was interviewed at headquarters of the air materiel command at the Wright-Patterson air force base. He returned three weeks ago from tests at Muroc Field, Calif.

And what was his sensation while traveling at a super-sonic speed?

"Anybody," replied the Morgantown, W. Va., native, "can fly faster than sound as long as he wants to, so far as the physical effects are concerned."

"The fact is, it's no different than sitting in your armchair at home."

The needle-nosed X-1 has four rocket engines developing a total of 25,000 horsepower. Its fuel is alcohol and liquid oxygen. It can remain aloft two and a half minutes.

Toscanini Scored For Rejection Of Life Senatorship

ROME, Dec. 8—(AP)—Maestro Arturo Toscanini's refusal to become a life senator of the Italian republic drew sharp words today from a part of the Italian press.

President Einaudi appointed the noted conductor in recognition of his musical accomplishments. Toscanini cabled his refusal from the United States, saying the appointment "was in contrast" with his feelings though he was "always ready to serve the fatherland."

In the senate, where Toscanini's cable was read by senate president Bonomi yesterday, there was no comment.

But the independent newspaper Momento termed it a refusal that had "some discords" and addressed these words to the conductor:

"You said 'no' to fascism (Toscanini once refused to conduct the fascist hymn 'Giovinezza'). . . you should have said 'yes' to our good president and to those Italians who had, in you, learned to honor the Italian who said no to fascism."

"Instead that 'no' of yours to the senate, your continuing to stay in America to make dollars, that acceptance for years of American honors while disdaining those of the fatherland, spoils a little, maestro, that harmony that always has been suggested by your musical skill, but that often was given the lie by certain attitudes of yours with which you drove away photographers—and now senators."
