Churchman Hits Reds' Influence

BUCK HILL FALLS, Pa.—(AP)—If communist leaders in China have their way they will build a completely totalitarian state, a prominent churchman says.

Quoting private information from missionaries "behind the bamboo curtain," Dr. Frank T. Cartwright, Methodism's associate secretary for China, said the Communists seek absolute control of education, the press, industry, police and all other forms of power.

Dr. Cartwright spoke to the board of missions and church extension of the Methodist church, which is holding its annual meeting here.

He told the conference in a prepared address that "in general, the attitude of communists, both soldiers and civilian officials, toward Christian Chinese and missionaries has proved more tolerant than had been expected."

"Americans in a position to know the facts and who have recently returned from China," he said, "have stated that since the summer of 1948 there have been no verifiable instances of persecution of Christians."

Associate Secretary Raymond L. Archer reported "encouraging progress" in European countries considered "behind the iron curtain," especially Poland, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Austria and Hungary.

"There seems to be freedom in those areas for public worship and the conducting of the usual religious programs which belong to our churches," he said.

Another associate secretary, Dr. T. T. Brumbaugh, said Japan, "sick and tired of war and seeking the surest possible way to avoid its recurrence in their part of the world," is "the most receptive field in the world of Christian missionary endeavor."
