But the roadbed deteriorated, the rolling stock gradually became a laughing stock, with the newest passenger car a trifling 36 years old. Finally the Maryland Public Service commission, which has wrestled long and anxiously with B. and A. problems (mostly financial) authorized it to abandon rail passenger service and switch to busses on New Year's day.
