PORTLAND—(AP)—The State Highway commission has turned to 1950 budget problems. Tentative outlays for next year's construction were to be mapped. The commission wound up a second day of business here with rejection of an offer of three Myrtle tree groves in southern Oregon for use as state parks. Chairman T. H. Banfield said the legislature must decide how far the commission should go in the parks program. He said the parks department was not anxious to compete with private tourist facilities by establishing a network of overnight camping places in Oregon.

**Recording Of
Bedroom Talk Is
Offered In Suit**

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Helen Keller, red-haired playgirl, kept from her portly paramour the news that she had taken a recording of one of their bedroom interludes, she testified Wednesday.

On the stand in her own defense of charges that she extorted \$9000 from Ben Klekner, 49, head of a Hollywood television school, the 27-year-old Miss Keller denied that she intended to use the recording to extort money from him. Instead, she said, she merely wanted "to get on a record the promises he made to divorce his wife and marry me."

"Didn't you tell Klekner you had made the recording?" asked a prosecutor.

"No, not at first," she replied. "I was too ashamed. Besides, we had made up after a quarrel about when he was going to get a divorce."

In response to a question, she said she placed the microphone under the bed because "there was no other place in the apartment to put it." The recording, played in court last week, was filled with words of endearment.

Asked if she deliberately placed the device under the bed in anticipation of a romantic meeting, she snapped: "no."

**Egg And Poultry Workers
Union Wins Wage Boost**

PORTLAND, Dec. 22.—(AP)—A 5 cent an hour wage increase was granted Wednesday to Oregon's AFL Egg and Poultry Workers.

An arbitrator, Dr. Philip Overmeyer of Lewis and Clark college, fixed the amount of the pay increase. It will be retroactive to Oct. 7.

The union had struck against plants who are members of the Oregon Egg and Poultry Dealers association in October, seeking a 7 1/2 cent boost. The strike ended in an agreement to refer to arbitration.

Between 500 and 600 workers in several Oregon towns are involved.

**Save State's Resources,
Groups Urge Oregon**

SALEM.—(AP)—Two state conservation committees urged state department heads to work hard on a long program to save the state's resources.

The two committees, meeting here jointly, were the governor's advisory committee on resources, and the 1949 legislative interim committee on national resources. Governor McKay indicated he would favor the legislature creating a state resources conservation
