

First Aid Chief For Douglas Red Cross Unit Named

George Smith, field representative for the State Industrial accident commission, accident prevention division, has accepted appointment as first aid chairman for the Douglas County chapter, American Red Cross.

Smith announced the beginning of extensive first aid classes, involving some 400 Douglas county industrial workers soon after the first of the year. These classes will be sponsored, organized and conducted by the State Industrial Accident Commission as part of its accident prevention program. The function of the local Red Cross chapter will be to supplement the facilities of the commission, by way of providing standard Red Cross instructional aids and qualified first aid instructors. The materials and instruction aids made available thru Red Cross are accepted as standard by most organizations interested in first aid and accident prevention. 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Experiences Told By Members At Kiwanis Session

Dr. B. R. Shoemaker was winner of an impromptu Christmas experience talk at the Roseburg Kiwanis club meeting Tuesday noon.

He related his very unpleasant experiences of spending, in all, about nine hours attempting to clean out a clogged kitchen sink in his home on Saturday night through Monday. Still unsuccessful, he called a plumber Tuesday morning. The plumber did the job in about 15 minutes, he said.

The program was arranged by Chester Morgan, who played two phonograph records, then conducted the brief contest.

After this he had several members who had been in the service tell their Christmas experiences of 1945.

Col Medorem Crawford stated that he was in command of about 18,000 troops in Paris. On Christmas day, there came an order to evacuate between 12,000 and 15,000 of his men, in order to make way for the wounded soldiers being returned from the battle of the Bulge.

Not one complaint was registered from any of the men. He considered this one of the greatest sacrifices by army troops, who were asked to give up their Christmas day to make way for the wounded.

Marler Yoder related that he would never forget Christmas day of 1944. He said he was operating a gas truck, when a German plane came. He leaped out of the truck, but both he and the truck were strafed. He "miraculously" escaped, he said, but the truck was ruined.

Norval Easton said he was stationed at Will Rogers field, Oklahoma City. He accompanied an Army pilot to Stillwater, Tex., for a blind date. The blind date became his wife.

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Nash Motors To Sound Public On \$1,000 Car

DETROIT, Dec. 28.—(AP)—Nash motors plans to sound out public reaction to a \$1,000 price class auto, although it has no present plans to produce it.

Nash has built a prototype of such a vehicle, designed to be powered with a foreign-made, low-horsepower engine. It will be shown Jan. 4 in New York.

The New York preview will be one of six such showings in different cities. At these showings, the public will be asked whether a car of the \$1,000 price class type would sell sufficiently to warrant production.

Sale Of New Plywood Plant Set At Portland

PORTLAND — (AP) — Negotiations to sell the nearly-finished Portland Plywood corporation plant to the Multnomah Plywood corporation for \$1,043,000 have been completed.

F. A. Johnson, general manager of Multnomah Plywood, said the plant would begin operating in about two months. The plant construction on which was halted when plywood slumped last year, will be finished immediately.

The purchasing firm is a newly-formed corporation of 120 stockholders.

HAMBURG, Germany, Dec. 28.—(AP)—Four little girls have died after their dresses caught fire from the candle-lit Christmas tree at a German orphanage party, police at Buechen, lower Saxony, reported today.

The children were between eight and 12 years of age. Police said the orphans and other children staged the Christmas play "Snowflake" on Christmas eve. The little girls wore cotton costumes as snowflakes. One of them caught her costume afire from the Christmas tree and ran screaming among the other tots.
