

Roseburg Wind Velocity In Dec. Low As Usual

Roseburg lived up to its name (as the city with the lowest wind velocity where a weather bureau station is maintained) during the month of December, according to a report released Tuesday by Richard S. Way, acting official in charge of the local bureau. "As usual," the report states, "winds were quite light, averaging 4 mph, with prevailing direction south."

However, a velocity of 29 mph was recorded for a brief period during the afternoon of Dec. 4.

The average temperature for December (41.8) was normal, according to statistics, with a low of 29 on Dec. 4 and Dec. 30 and a high of 69 on Dec. 4. Freezing temperatures were reached on nine days during the month.

We didn't have as much rain as normal, the report says. The 3.82 inches recorded was 1.52 inches below average. Some rain fell on 22 days, and traces of snow were recorded on six days.

The month was rather cloudy, with only one completely clear day, three partly cloudy, and 27 cloudy days.

The wettest December on record was 12.82 inches of precipitation in 1907. The driest was 1.46 inches in 1903.

That "lucky old sun" shone on Roseburg 69 hours during the past month, statistics show. That's out of a possible 280 hours.

the 1948-49 school year. This total does not include the Roseburg school district, and is for grades 1-12.

Teachers increased by 50.

Another indication of county school growth is the increase of teachers from 300 to 350. Barneburg said there are two explanations for this increase. The first, of course, is the jump in enrollment. However, he said the county school system would not be justified in adding fifty additional teachers because of a pupil increase of 437.

Barneburg said the principal explanation is that additional classroom space was made available. Not only did this speeded-up building program alleviate overcrowded conditions in county schools, it also lessened the load on those faculty members who were teaching classes in existing rooms. As more rooms became available, more teachers were hired. Barneburg said the additional teachers made it possible for the county school system to meet the standards of teaching efficiency set by the state.

A third major increase noted during the 1948-49 school year was the revised property evaluation—from \$38,500,000 last year to

Conditions South Worse
Highways to the south are reported slippery as far as Redding, Calif., according to the police. Most cars traveling south are putting on chains at Canyonville for the drive over Canyon mountain.

The Associated Press report shows the highway clear at Eugene and Medford, with spots of ice around Grants Pass.

The Siskiyou and Green Springs area are reported in bad condition. At 9 a.m. the report showed it to be snowing hard. There is six inches of fresh snow and the condition is getting worse. Snow plows are at work.

Wide Region In Icy Spell's Grip; Montana Coldest

Winter's twin punches, snow and sub-zero temperatures, struck across the central and western parts of the country today.

It was 42 below at Cutbank, Mont.

Cold air covered nearly all of the area from southern California to northwestern Illinois. The frigid air moved into the Midwest from the Rocky Mountain region, sending the mercury down from abnormally high marks to zero and below.

No immediate relief from the cold was in sight. The coldest weather of the winter season appeared likely for many central and western states. Blizzard conditions were predicted for some regions.

Montana Coldest
Montana was the coldest area today, as it was yesterday. The mercury dropped to 31 degrees below zero at Havre. It was below zero over the Dakotas, western Minnesota, northwestern Iowa, Nebraska and around the zero mark in Colorado and other Rocky Mountain states.

Snowfall was general over the cold belt, with the heaviest falls reported in Wyoming. Blizzard conditions were reported over most of Utah and in parts of the Dakotas. In Utah there were scores of traffic accidents because of extremely icy roads. Several hundred cars were stalled near Point of the Mountain, 20 miles south of Salt Lake City. Many others were stalled in Parleys Canyon, east of Salt Lake City, and near Heber, Utah. The storm also swept across much of southern Idaho.

Southern California Hit
Southern California was getting ready for freezing weather over most of the area tonight. Snow flurries were forecast over the mountain region today.

The Pacific Northwest was expected winter's coldest weather. Temperatures of 10 below were forecast for northwest Washington; 5 below in the normally mild Bellingham area in northwest Washington; zero or below in northeast Oregon and 12 above in western Oregon. More snow also was forecast for the area. A New Year's eve fall added 16 inches on the Cascade mountain ski resorts at Mount Hood and laid a few inches over the northwestern part of the state down to the Pacific surf.

Rain still fell over much of the northeastern quarter of the country, extending from Virginia and Tennessee into the New England states.
