Sooners Say Sugar Bowl Win Shows Superiority

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—(AP)—The loudest din rising from the scattered bowls today came from the throats of fired-up Oklahomans challenging Notre Dame's position as the nation's No. 1 college football team.

IN HAWAII

Stanford Drops Hawaii, 74-20

HONOLULU, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Stanford's football team capitalized on wind, speed, power and good football yesterday to swamp the University of Hawaii 74-20 in the Pineapple Bowl.

But the lopsided score does not tell the whole story. Hawaii made a game of it well into the third quarter when they trailed 20-26. At that point, though, Stanford buckled down and ran the islanders ragged.

Eighteen thousand fans sat through a 30-mile an hour wind to watch the intersectional seasonal game.

Midway in the third, end Bill McColl of Stanford heaved a mighty pass from his own 25. Aided by the wind the ball traveled 64 yards in the air. It hit Holbrook Burck in the chest, bounced off Hawaii's Sol Kaukukulu's shoulder and back into Burck's arms. Burck scampered across the goal while Stanford Coach Machie Schwartz was convulsed with laughter. McColl added the extra point.

The Indians went into the game a five touchdown favorite and roared to a 20-0 lead in the first 10 minutes of play.

YMCA-Church League Sign-Up Ends Wednesday

Registration day for the YMCA-Church league ends Wednesday, according to Alva Laws, YMCA youth committee chairman. All churches planning to have teams this year are asked to turn in entry blanks at the "Y" office or to Marlen Yoder.

The YMCA-Church league will be divided into two divisions. The "A" Division will include boys 13 to 18 years of age and the "B" Division will be for boys under 13 years of age. A church may have a team in either division or both divisions. The games will be played each Saturday afternoon, starting Jan. 14, in the Benson Grade school gymnasium.

Each church will furnish a coach and one other person to serve as score-keeper or timer. The churches will be responsible for the equipment for their team. A color, for shirts, has been assigned to each church that has so far shown an interest in the league. Jack Newby will furnish referees from the senior high school team.

It is hoped that a trophy may be donated to the winner and perhaps a plaque for the team showing the best sportsmanship, according to Laws. The award would be a "trophy" trophy, which would have to be won three times. For now, however, warned Laws, is for the church to be sure and get its entry blank in Wednesday.

SUGAR BOWL

Oklahoma Sets 3 New Records

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Oklahoma's lightning silt "T" offense streaked to three new Sugar Bowl records in blasting outmanned Louisiana State university 35-0.

Oklahoma set a new scoring total yesterday in winning its 21st straight game by the biggest margin in Sugar Bowl history, and Oklahoma Fullback Leon Heath's 86-yard touchdown bettered the old mark by one yard.

L. S. U. Coach Gaynell Tinsley called Oklahoma's record-setting play flawless. Oklahoma Coach Bud Wilkinson said, "if we played against L. S. N. a dozen times, we'd never play that well or score that many points."

Oklahoma's 35 points broke the mark of 33 set by Oklahoma A. & M. in its victory over St. Mary's. The margin erased the record of 20 points, also set in Oklahoma A. & M.'s 33-13 win over St. Mary's.

And Oklahoma's margin of victory was the biggest in any of 1950's major bowl games.

Heath's 86-yard jaunt broke the mark of 85 yards that has stood since Monk Simons provided the winning margin in Tulane's 20-14 victory over Temple in the first Sugar Bowl game in 1935.

The run showed the 82,470 fans why Oklahoma was rated the nation's number two team. Heath was untouched as his teammates cleared a wide and smooth path for him. The day's performance prompted Sugar Bowl authorities to award Heath the annual trophy as the bowl's outstanding player.

Santa Clara Tops Kentucky

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Santa Clara's stubborn Broncos staged a wild second half stampede yesterday to upset favored Kentucky 21 to 13 before a record crowd of 64,816 in the 16th annual Orange Bowl classic.

Reverting to the regular season "bread and butter" plays, the determined Californians—trailing by seven points at the end of the half—crushed an opponent which netted two touchdowns in the third period and another only 30 seconds before the game ended.

Kentucky Favored

Kentucky—rated a 5 1-2 point favorite—climaxed a 51-yard touchdown march in the middle of the second period when Wilbur Jamerson plunged over from the one yard line. In the dying seconds of the period Kentucky almost scored again but Santa Clara's line held and time ran out.

The final Wildcat touchdown came when Vito (Babe) Parrill—one of the greatest passers to appear in the year end classic—heaved a long, looping pass to end Emery Clark who ran the remaining 15 yards to a touchdown. The play was good for 52 yards.

Play Changed

Coach Len Casanova of Santa Clara attributed the Broncos' stunning upset victory to what he termed the "regular" season bread and butter plays.

He said he told his determined, but slightly disconsolate, squad to forget all the fancy plays and use the same ones they used successfully during the regular season. "It worked fine," Casanova smiled.

Beside the grit and fight displayed by the entire team, Santa Clara's primary asset was the kicking of halfback Hal Haynes. Time and again the lanky, 180-pound senior punted to within yards of Kentucky's goal line. Once, a 63-yard boot was downed by the Wildcats on their own three yard line.

Pro Grid Coach Offered Post At Naval Academy

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Eddie Erdelatz said last night he had been offered the job as head football coach of the U. S. Naval Academy.

He said he will fly to Annapolis tonight to talk over the deal with the academy's president, George Sauer, who resigned last week.

Erdelatz is assistant coach now of the San Francisco Forty-niners of the All-America conference. The conference recently merged with the National Football League.

Buckeyes Keep Big Ten Flag Flying In West

PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Ohio State's victorious football team flies home today, the banners of the Big Ten flying high for the fourth straight year.

California's Golden Bears pined for Berkeley, beaten but not disgraced after their second loss with the Big Ten in the Rose Bowl.

And a record crowd of 100,963 football fans relaxed after one of the tightest, best games in the history of the Tournament of Roses.

The score was 17 to 14, and it came on a field goal with one minute and 55 seconds left in the game—the first time a field goal had decided the issue in the big bowl.

Brightest star of numerous heroic warriors was Ohio State's right end, Jim Hogue, whose deadly right foot won the game. Defeat Averted.

His boot broke the 14-14 deadlock; broke the heart of a fighting California eleven and its legions of supporters in the tense, packed stadium; gave the Big Ten its fourth consecutive win in Big Ten-Pacific Coast conference series and averted a 28-0 shellacking a California "wonder team" gave Ohio State in this same fixture on New Year's day of 1921.

The kick came with dramatic impact from the 17 1/2 line mark. Some called it 17, others 18. Whatever the minute difference, it came with success.

Many observers felt that Buckeye Coach Wes Fesler himself had a role in the game-winning kick. He sent Dick Widdees in to hold the ball for Hogue but the team started to send Widdees back to the bench.

"Some of the boys out there apparently didn't like the field goal idea," said Fesler. The hesitation cost Ohio State five yards for delaying the game. The better angle on the kicking chance.

Fesler wouldn't admit it as a deliberate stall to draw a penalty. Munching happily on an orange, Fesler commented:

"That five yards didn't hurt though, I'll admit."

Hague thus goes down as the player whose foot kicked Ohio State into and successfully through the Rose Bowl. He was the man who kicked the extra point against Michigan for a 7-7 tie and clinched the Buckeye trip to the bowl.

Behind that kick were more than the usual amount of thrills and excitement, of spectacular efforts and bad breaks for both teams.

California scored first on the heels of a beautiful 55-yard pass play from Quarterback Bob Celeri and Frank Brunk. This was in the second quarter.

Count Tied
Ohio tied the count at 7-7 in the third when Halfback Vic Janowicz intercepted a Cal pass, stopping a scoring thrust and setting the Bucks into motion to score from the Bear 33.

Ohio State went ahead, 14-7, on a blocked punt that fell into the Buckeye hands on the California six.

They won the game on Hague's field goal after Celeri on a poor pass from center was forced to punt the ball while running. He did it with his left foot, the ball fizzled out on the Cal 13 and the field goal came four plays later.

Halfback Jim Monachino was the scoring star for California. He juggled the leather for the first tally from seven yards out, and he got loose for the longest run of the day with a 44-yard burst that carried on across the Buckeye goal.

Largest ground gainer was Buckeye fullback, 214-pound Fred Morrison, who made 113 of the team's total of 221 yards rushing.

Coach Lynn Waldorf of California had no cills. "The coast is creeping up," he said. "Last time it was only six points—in the Northwest beat us when the minutes."

Washington State and Oregon State line up tonight for the first toss-up of the 1950 northern division basketball title play. The initial fray pairs OSC's defending Pacific Coast conference title defenders with one of the early season favorites to carry off the new bunting.

Also at stake will be Oregon State's hopes of dedicating its new Gill coliseum with a conference victory.

Oregon, a 74-62 victim of the Columbia Lions last night, tackles the easterners again tonight in the windup of its pre-conference campaign. The Ducks open Friday against the invading WSC five, the same night Idaho moves into Seattle against Washington.

Coach John Warren's Ducks, winners of only two games in 10 pre-season outings, never really got into last night's fray. Columbia boomed out to an 8-0 lead and romped to a 32-14 margin after 14 minutes of play. Half-time tally was 38-24. The closest Oregon approached was seven points—50-43—with nine minutes of the second half to play.

John Azary, the Annie Oakley-eyed guard who counted 34 points in Columbia's two losing efforts against Washington, bombarded the basket for 28 points against the Ducks to tie an all-time Columbia one-game scoring record. Will Urban led Oregon with 13 points.

BASIN CENSUS UPPEP
COULEE DAM, Wash.—(AP)—Postmasters in the Columbia Basin have taken a census that shows the population climbing above the 40,000 mark in 1949.

The census, taken for the Bureau of Reclamation, lists a total of 41,817 persons living in the towns and rural areas of the basin. The unofficial census released at the end of 1948 was 35,178.

Pasco, the largest city included in the survey, was given a population of 11,908, an increase of 648 persons over last year. Richland, the atomic energy town, was not included.

Ephrata's population jumped from 3250 in 1948 to 5580.

Leo Helsby kicked the game-deciding points from a cleared spot in 10 inches of snow during the third quarter.

The score was the first made in the cold-air classic. Last year's inaugural ended in a scoreless tie. The thermometer hovered at 10 above during the clash, in contrast to last year's subzero temperatures.

A trophy, donated by Austin E. Lathrop, wealthy Alaskan businessman and industrialist, went to the winner.
