## Joe Kahut Signs Up To Battle Pat Valentino

PORTLAND, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Joe Kahut, the Woodburn, Ore. fighting farmer, was signed today to meet Pat Valentino, San Francisco, in a Feb. 3 boxing match that Kahut hopes will lead toward a crack at the national heavyweight championship.

Matchmaker Tex Salkeld said he was asking the Washington and California Boxing commissions to recognize the winner of the Kahut-Valentino event here as the Pacific coast heavyweight titlist.

Meanwhile Salkeld disclosed attempts to bring heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles here next summer for a fight with Kahut.

## Payroll Of Cleveland Indians Receives Slash

CLEVELAND, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The Cleveland Indians, once possibly the highest paid team in baseball, could start checking the postman today for their 1950 contracts.

The pay offers are in the mail, and the official word from new owner Ellis Ryan is this: out of a roster of 38 players, 11 got a salary cut, 22 were offered a raise, and five received the same money.

Ryan conceded straight off he won't be doing out the kind of cash Bill Veale did last season.

But the Indians were 1949 world champs then. For 1949, sports editors in an Associated Press poll voted them the biggest sports flop in the nation. They tied for third with Detroit in the American League.

However, Ryan quickly added: "Actually, I believe, we will still pay out more to our players than any other club."

## Ben Hogan Joins Other Greats In Golf Comeback

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The 24th annual Los Angeles open and Ben Hogan's comeback get underway today. The once-mighty Hogan rejoins the nation's leading golfers as they start their annual trek for winter purses that will aggregate more than half a million dollars.

The Los Angeles offers the highest single prize, \$15,000, with \$2,600 going to the winner and the remainder split into 24 places.

It's a wide open tournament despite the fact that Hogan is slated to participate.

Ben is invariably a man to beat, but this time it is different. The Mighty Mite is essaying a comeback from an automobile accident that all but killed him last February.

It remains to be seen whether he can maintain his old time tournament form over the four-day, 72-hole distance.

Many experts believe he can. Some have even installed him as the favorite. He has captured this same fixture three times, in 1942-47-48.

The pairings matched him in a threesome with another winner here, Johnny Bulla, and Eric Monti, late in the field of 128 amateurs and pros. Par for the 7019 yard layout is 35-36-71.

There are others to watch, of course, all more robust in health than Hogan. They include Sam Sneed, seeking his second win here; national open champion Cary Middlecott; Jimmy Deane and such amateurs as Johnny Dawson, Frank Stranahan and Bruce McCormick.

Out of the picture is last year's defending champ, Lloyd Mangrum, with a bad shoulder, along with Ed (Porky) Oliver, who suffered a wrenched knee in a traffic crash enroute here from Seattle.

## Sportsmen Will Attend Hearing On Angling Rules

Sportsmen are making numerous recommendations regarding the 1950 angling regulations, Charles A. Lockwood, Oregon state game director, announces. Lockwood reminded anglers that the public hearing concerning angling regulations will be held in the Portland office of the Oregon State Game commission at 10:00 a. m., January 13.

The public is invited, and representatives of organizations and individuals will all be heard. For accuracy in the record, though, Lockwood requested that all important facts and statements be submitted in writing.

Tentative regulations for the coming year will be announced after the public hearing. The commission will reconvene after a two-week interval, make any changes deemed necessary, and set the final angling regulations for the year 1950.

## Angell Says Tax Relief Wanted

Washington.—(AP)—Rep. Angell (R-Ore) said Thursday "the people in the Portland, Ore., district feel this Congress must grant relief from high taxes."

"And they want a careful spending by the government stopped and the cost of government reduced."

The people of the Pacific Northwest, he added in an interview, are deeply interested in development of their natural resources, especially water and power, but they want to retain local control over them.

The proposed Columbia Valley administration, for which President Truman put in another plug in his message to Congress, would be governed by a board of three appointed by the President.

"The governors of the Pacific northwest states oppose the CVA bill," Angell continued. "And generally the people oppose extension of bureaucracy over their lives. The people are ready to support any program for development of the Northwest which does not require them to surrender local control."

Angell has not formally announced his stand on the CVA bill because he is a member of the House public works committee before which the bill is pending.

## Joe Louis Will Again Battle Professionally, Poll Verdict

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Will Joe Louis, retired world heavyweight boxing champion, return officially to the ring?

The "ayes" have it by two to one in the Associated Press' annual year-end poll of the nation's sports writers, who were asked to express their opinions on boxing's No. 1 question.

Of a total of 90 writers who balloted on the question, fifty-nine thought the Brown Bomber would succumb to the lure of another big title bout purse and give up the exhibition business.

The other 31 believed Louis really had retired for good, and would stick to his announcement of last spring. His last official fight was June 25, 1948, when he knocked out Jersey Joe Walcott in the 11th round at Yankee stadium in defense of his title.

Later Louis joined as a partner with the International Boxing club, which succeeded promoter Mike Jacobs and the Madison Square Garden group, controlling major boxing.

But his return to the exhibition circuit—and especially his knockout victory over Pat Valentino in Chicago recently—has changed a lot of minds, although Louis will be 36 in May.

Those writers who believe Louis will return generally are of the opinion he will meet Ezzard Charles, the National Boxing association's recognized champion, in a title bout, in June or September.

The same writers yesterday voted the Cleveland Indians as the "greatest disappointment of the year." The Indians won the American league pennant in 1948 and finished third the past season behind the champion New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox.

## OSC Memorial To Honor Two Tragedy Victims

CORVALLIS, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Oregon State college will establish a McGuire-Corvallis memorial fund, honoring two athletes killed Tuesday in a tobogganing accident.

President A. L. Strand announced plans for the fund. A committee will decide its use after consulting families of Stan McGuire and Bill Corvallis. Strand said a scholarship and annual sports award have been considered.
