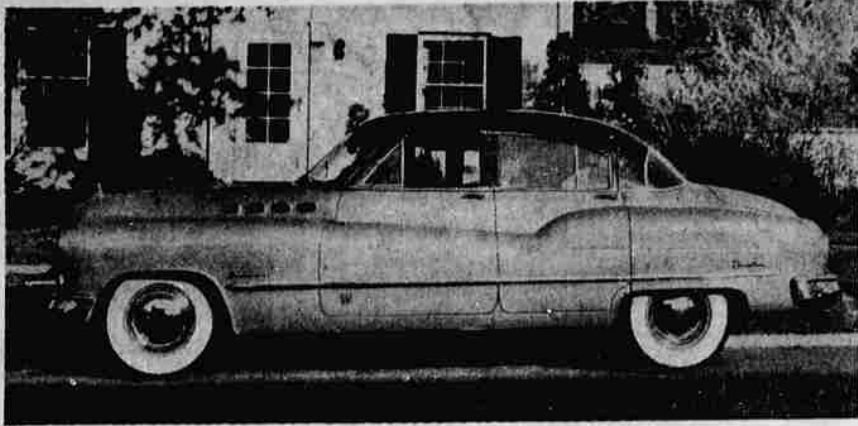


Buick Roadmaster for 1950

Faye Emerson Hoping For Mexican Divorce

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Faye Emerson was staying with friends today in Cuernavaca and hoping to get a divorce within a month from the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt's son Elliott.

Miss Emerson arrived in Mexico City yesterday and went soon after to Cuernavaca, 50 miles south, to stay with unidentified "old friends."

Her attorney, Francisco Lopez Figueroa, said she would file her divorce petition next week, probably in Cuernavaca, charging "mental cruelty." The attorney said the divorce probably would be granted about three weeks after filing.

Lopez Figueroa said the law requires Miss Emerson to be present only for the filing. After that she could return to the United States.

But the attorney said there would be "no legal shortcuts in this divorce" so there would be no doubt in the U. S. of its validity. Roosevelt, he said, had named a legal representative in Mexico and a property settlement already had been made in the United States.

Woman Hermit For 33 Years Removed To County Home

SACRAMENTO, Calif., (AP)—Governor Earl Warren has signed five sex crime bills handed to him by the pre-Christmas special session of the legislature.

The signing makes the laws effective. The two key bills he signed provide stricter punishment for sex crimes against children.

Another increases the maximum penalty for sodomy from 10 to 20 years and the two remaining bills strengthen the police processes of keeping tabs on sex offenders who have been convicted.

One of the key bills defines the killing of a child during a sex attack automatic first degree murder—punishable by death, or life imprisonment without chance of parole.

The other major bill makes the molesting of children a felony if the sex offender has previously been convicted of lewd and lascivious conduct with children. Under existing law, such a molestation is a misdemeanor.

Madame Chiang To Give Parting Radio Address

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Madame Chiang Kai-shek will deliver a parting message to America before she starts home for China, probably next week.

The wife of the beleaguered Chinese nationalist leader will give a 15-minute talk tomorrow over the National Broadcasting company network, starting at 12:00 noon (EST).

NBC said it would be her final public speech before she sails for the island of Formosa, last island stronghold of her husband, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, against the Chinese Communists.

Madame Chiang, a graduate of Wellesley college and frequent visitor to the U.S., will leave "Some time next week," her brother-in-law, Dr. H. H. Kung, said last night.

She has been staying at Kung's Bronx residence since she arrived here in November, 1948, to seek aid for the Nationalist cause. In recent months, she has remained in seclusion.

Southern California Gets Relief From Cold

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Weary Southern California citrus orchardists, who kept their smudge-pots aglow again during the night, drew hope from a forecast of cloudiness tonight and rain late tomorrow.

The Weather Bureau stated that the mercury dipped to 25 to 27 as expected early today, but added that orchard heating was not as prevalent as the previous night. Temperatures generally were one to two degrees higher.

The forecast of increasing cloudiness and rain brought cheer to begrimed orchard workers. It would mean an end to the current freeze.

Temperatures were up slightly in San Fernando valley, providing a respite from smudging. Meantime, the assessment of frost damage continued. Experts said damage to Los Angeles county vegetable crops, if any, might not show up until harvest time.

Robot Traffic Cop Late Development Of Science

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—Now the scientists have come up with a robot traffic cop. The gadget does everything but give you a ticket.

Engineers at the University of California's Los Angeles campus have developed an electronic device which records patterns and

habits of traffic roaring along the streets.

H. R. Kaiser, who helped design the instrument, says that for the time being it won't throw his motorcycle cop out of work. Instead, it acts as a recorder in traffic surveys by:

1. Recording the speed of passing vehicles.
2. Telling what lane they are traveling in.
3. Tallying the number of vehicles in a given lane during a given period of time.
4. Recording the speed distribution in a selected lane during any hour of the day.
5. Furnishing facts about the traffic flow in any particular area during rush hours.

The device works by metallic detectors sealed in the pavement. It measures speed by the time it takes a car's front wheels to cover the distance between two detectors.

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
