

Mine Owners Urge Federal Force To Up Coal Output

MINE OWNERS — 18 inside WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 —(AP)—Forty-five additional mine owner groups Thursday asked the National Labor Relations board to try to force miners back on a full work week by court injunction.

Operator groups representing practically the entire soft coal industry now have filed unfair labor practice charges against John P. Lewis and asked for court action.

The coal groups filing charges Thursday included those from Illinois, the Far West, and major "captive" mines owned by steel companies.

The steel firms include Bethlehem, Republic, Jones and Laughlin, Inland, Crucible, and Armco.

The operators want Robert N. Denham, general counsel of the NLRB, to seek a court order against Lewis to compel him to bargain for a new contract and to end the present Lewis-ordered three-day work week.

The operators turned to Denham after failing to get the White House to order an injunction effort under the Taft-Hartley law.

President Truman indicated at a news conference Thursday that he is sticking to his hands off policy in the coal situation.

He had no comment on a reported appeal from St. Louis urging him to use his full authority to bring about full operation of the mines.

The appeal, a reporter said, was made by a St. Louis citizens fuel committee and the St. Louis Retail Coal Dealers association. The president said he had not

Coal Firms Sue Mine Union For Big Damages

CAMBRIDGE, O., Jan. 7.—(AP)—Five Ohio coal mining companies Friday filed five suits in common pleas court, asking nearly \$8,000,000 damages from John P. Lewis and other United Mine Workers union leaders individually, and the union treasury.

The same companies filed companion suits against the members of the union asking court injunctions to bar them from abiding by Lewis' three-day work week.

Filing the suits were the Pittsburg Consolidated Coal Co., the Warner Collieries Co., the Y and O. Coal Co., the Jefferson Coal Co. and the Cadiz Mining Co.

The firms asked damages on the basis of tonnage lost by various miner strikers and work stoppages. They estimated the loss in 1949 at 7,000,000 tons.

Honest Day's Work To Be 'Must,' AFL Warning

PORTLAND, Jan. 7 —(AP)—Craftsmen will have to put in an honest day's labor from now on, Ivor T. Jones, AFL secretary of Oregon Carpenters, said here yesterday.

He told the AFL shingle weavers' district convention that he expected an active construction year with much competitive bidding.

"It means that more efficiency will be demanded of labor, that the heavy train has gone by. Labor will be expected to put out a day's work for a day's pay," Jones said.

The Raymond, Wash., local submitted a resolution calling for an employer-financed pension of \$100 monthly after 20 years' service for workers 65 years old. It will be considered later.

Three Roseburg Cops Will Attend Training Classes

Three members of the Roseburg police department, all sergeants, will attend a series of advanced police training classes to be held in Eugene under the sponsorship of the Oregon Association of City Police Officers and the Oregon State Sheriff's association.

Police Chief Calvin H. Baird said the three designated local policemen are Sgts. William Burke, Lloyd Larsen and Ervin Best.

Chief Baird said the local men are attending the school to prepare for a police training school to be held in Roseburg sometime in the spring, in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Supplementing the program carried out in the basic training schools held last summer, the new series will consist of nine special classes to be conducted by representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, state police department, and the Portland police department. The first four classes, to be held this month, will provide advanced, technical treatment of such subjects as laboratory work in criminal investigation, interviews, preliminary crime investigation and traffic enforcement. The final five classes in February will cover practical problems in the handling of burglary cases and will feature a complete "on the scene" investigation, interrogation of "suspects" and a moot court trial of the "accused."

The 1950 series of classes will comprise the second year of a long-range program of progressive officer training that was adopted in 1949 by the sponsoring organizations. Schools will also be held in Astoria, Oregon City, Salem, Corvallis, Medford, Klamath Falls, Bend, The Dalles and Pendleton.

Eugene Police Chief Keith L. Jones is chairman of the training committee. Other members of the committee are L. M. Ackerman, police judge, Klamath Falls; Melvin DeRock, chief of police, Hillsboro; Clark D. Newman, police captain, Oregon City; F. A. Fletcher, special agent in charge, Portland office, F. B. I.; Vern L. Hill, sergeant, department of state police; Elmer H. Halstead, supervisor, public service training, division of vocational education, and Herman Kehrl, director, bureau of municipal research and service, University of Oregon.

Abortion-Caused Death Jails Male Suspect

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—A deputy coroner said today that a "completely unsuccessful" abortion caused the death of a pretty young mother whose body was found in a blood spattered apartment yesterday.

Dr. Christopher J. Murphy, who conducted an autopsy on the bruised body of Mrs. Nina Jean Campbell, 20, said an illegal operation was performed a few hours before the mother of two small children died.

Police filed a charge of abortion against a man booked as Ralph Myers, 44, of Arlington, Va. Captain Robert V. Murray said that was the only charge which can be brought in such a case under District of Columbia laws.

Police were led to the apartment by the woman's husband, Carlton Campbell, 21, of Hillside, Md. Campbell reported his wife had been missing since Wednesday night.

Hiccapping Victim Faces Death By Slow Starvation

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Jack O'Leary, who started his 18th month of hiccapping Thursday, thinks maybe he's set a record. But he isn't happy about it.

O'Leary, 24, lies in a room filled with varieties of cure and piled high with letters from friends. The spasms come every second.

It all started after an operation for a ruptured appendix. Peritonitis set in, and although it was stopped, his doctor says it somehow affected his diaphragm. His weight has dropped from 120 to 80 pounds.

Of chief concern is his inability to retain food for longer than five minutes.

"It's a race between stopping the hiccups and slow starvation," says his mother, Mrs. Margaret O'Leary. "We've prayed and prayed. That's about all we have left."

But O'Leary is optimistic: "They'll stop," he says, "but I hope it's soon. You've no idea how tiresome it gets."
