Vegetables Belong In Winter Menus

Broccoli is one of the most important vitamin C bearing winter vegetables. Try it with cheese sauce with sliced cold turkey.

Broccoli With Cheese Sauce Wash about two pounds fresh broccoli and trim a bit off ends to stems, but do not remove branches. If any stems are more than 4 inch in diameter, make lengthwise gashes through them (about 4 or 6) almost to the flowerets. The stalks will then cook as quickly as the flower buds. Drop broccoli into a small amount of boiling salted water. Cover and cook quickly until just tender—10 to 15 minutes, or 15 minutes in a pressure saucepan.

Cheese Sauce (Makes Enough For 4 Servings) Melt 1 pound processed American cheese in double boiler. When melted, stir in 1 cup milk. Pour over hot broccoli.

Vegetable Casserole For An Oven Dinner (Serves 6) Shell 2 pounds fresh peas, reserving 3 or 4 of the pods. Combine peas with 2 cups celery cut into one-half inch pieces. Add 1 teaspoon salt and 1 cup water. Add pods to vegetables for added fresh flavor. Cover casserole tightly and bake 1 hour at 325 degrees F. Remove pods. Season vegetables with butter or fortified margarine and pepper to taste. Serve while hot.

Here's a wonderful main dish winter luncheon salad dancing with vitamins.

Western Tuna Salad (Serves 6) Two 7-ounce cans tuna (2 cups), 2 cups diced celery, 1 red-skinned apple, diced, unpeeled, lemon juice, salt and pepper, to taste, mayonnaise or salad dressing, iceberg lettuce cups.

Break tuna into large pieces. Use scissors to cut celery into crunchy bite-sized cubes. Dice unpeeled apple and sprinkle with

lemon juice to prevent darkening. Combine tuna celery and apple. Season with salt and pepper. Toss carefully with enough mayonnaise or salad dressing to moisten. Serve in lettuce cups.

Fruits And Salad Combat Fatigue

The more fruit and salad greens you eat these days of pre-Christmas hustle and bustle, the less tired you will be.

Fresh Pear, Celery, Nut Salad (Serves 6) Three ripe pears, lemon juice, 2 (3 ounce) packages cream cheese, mayonnaise, few grains of salt, 3/2 cup cream, whipped; 2 cups diced celery, 1/2 cup chopped nuts, iceberg lettuce.

Peel, halve and core pears. Sprinkle with lemon juice to prevent darkening. Blend just enough mayonnaise into cheese to make it smooth and fluffy. Add salt to taste. Fold in arranged cream. Add celery, whipped pears on lettuce cups. Top with cheese mixture and garnish with nuts.

Looking for a main dish that's easy and uses plentiful foods? Here it is:

Sausage Sweet Potato Pie (Makes 6 servings) One and one-half cups (3-4 pound) sausage meat, 1 tablespoon rich prepared mustard, 2 cups cooked mashed sweet potatoes, 2 tablespoons sausage drippings, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 cups tart applesauce, fresh or canned (No. 2 can). Mix the sausage meat and the rich prepared mustard. Fry until meat separates into cooked particles. Whisk the sweet potatoes with the sausage drippings and the salt. Spread over bottom and sides of a greased 9 or 10-inch pie plate or shallow casserole. Pour in the applesauce. Top with cooked mustard-flavored sausage meat. Heat thoroughly in a moderate oven (350-375 degrees F.) 20 to 30 minutes.

Here's a variation on the carrot theme:

Toasted Carrots (Serves 4) Twelve whole carrots, 1-4 cup salad oil, melted butter or fortified margarine, 1-1/2 cups cornflakes, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper.

Cook carrots in boiling salted water, covered, only until just tender. Dip in oil, then in finely crushed cornflakes to which salt and pepper have been added. Arrange in pan and broil until cornflakes are toasted, about 5 minutes. Baste twice with remaining oil while toasting.

Nazareth Prepares To Again Handle Pilgrim Traffic

NAZARETH, Israel, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Nazareth is preparing for the resumption of its ancient trade—the reception of pilgrims who have been coming to this city ever since it became known through the New Testament.

Actually, most of the Christian holy places are concentrated in North Palestine—Galilee and the nearby lake of Tiberias, Capernaum and the River Jordan, but Nazareth, the only 100 per cent Arab town in Israel, is the center.

Church dignitaries and the local population, with the cooperation of Israeli military and civil authorities in the district, are making all preparations in the town for the revival of the old pilgrim trade, the main source of income. Pilgrim traffic has been at a standstill since the outbreak of the war in Palestine.

An interministerial committee has been appointed which deals exclusively with pilgrim problems. Israel consuls in different parts of the world have been instructed to give all facilities to applicants for visas to Israel during the holy year. However, because of the shortage of accommodations, visas will be granted only in quotas of 2,000-3,000 per month.

Nazareth itself is undergoing a thorough housecleaning. Churches, monasteries, even the streets and buildings are being whitewashed.

Hop breeders—Nazareth is the only place in all Israel where the raising of his non-kosher food is permitted—have been ordered to freeze all meat, and no more is to be slaughtered until the pilgrim influx.

Wage Boosts In 1949 Lower Than In Previous Year

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Only one out of the 15,000,000 unionized workers won general wage increases last year, the increases were smaller than in 1948, and there was no "pattern."

The president's council of economic advisers today gave that accounting of what the 1949 recession did to labor's "fourth round" of post-war wage increases.

The council, in a review sent to Congress along with president Truman's economic message, said the increases were "far fewer and somewhat smaller in amount" than in 1948, when a majority of organized labor won faster paychecks.

"For the first time in the past decade, some organized workers were called upon to accept pay cuts," the council said.

Despite the absence of a pattern, the advisers noted as one of the year's "outstanding developments" the growth of pension and welfare plans financed wholly or partly by employers.

These amounted in a number of cases to "an important long range charge upon industry," the council found, and a potentially "substantial" increase in labor costs when added to the 50 per cent rise in the social security tax which took place January 1.

The advisers estimated that workers' wage income increased from \$135,100,000,000 in 1948 to \$136,800,000,000 last year. Average weekly earnings rose from \$54.14 to \$54.78.

Besides the approximately 5,000,000 organized workers who will work for federal employees received higher pay, as well as unorganized workers in a number of unknown but probably "well below the previous postwar

level" programs.

Affected by any decision reached would be workers employed on an hourly rate. Salaried employees already are covered by an employer-paid program.

Both the company and James E. Faddling, IWA president at Portland, said the discussions were of an "informal" nature. Faddling said the question of industry-wide pension demands might be settled at a union conference in Portland this week-end.

The AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers already have announced they will seek \$100 monthly employer-paid pensions in upcoming negotiations.

School Enrollment In Oregon Heavily Upped

SALEM, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Public school enrollment in Oregon during the 1948-49 school year totaled 272,804, the State Department of Education said today.

That was a 12,000 increase over the previous year. No figures are available for this year, but they are expected to be higher than for the 1948-49 school year.

During 1948-49, there were 205,243 elementary school students, which was 10,000 more than in the year before. There were 67,561 high school students, again of 2,000.

FINDS BOMB—DUD PITTSBURGH, Jan. 7.—(AP)—State Representative George E. Jenkins of nearby North Braddock Thursday reported he had a frontally exploded bomb under his porch. The bomb was a dud.

Allegheny county District Attorney William Rahsauer and chief county Detective Charles S. Johnson said Jenkins has been fighting racketeers in the borough.
