Disinherited Son Tells Admission For Father

LOS ANGELES. — (AP) — A pale and tousle-haired young man gave a jury a highly laudatory description of the man who disinherited him — his father, William S. Hart of western film fame.

"He was to me exceedingly large and tall, and to my impression a deity almost—very striking looking, very muscular and, of course, very friendly and endearing to me," said the son.

William S. Hart Jr., 27, testified in the case by which he hopes to gain a share of the late actor's \$1,700,000 estate. He and his mother, former actress Win-

fred Westover, are contesting Hart's will, which did not provide for them.

They claim that Hart was unduly influenced in making his will by his spinster sister, the late Mary Ellen Hart, and others. The elder Hart, who died in 1946, left the major portion of his holdings to the county of Los Angeles to be used in creating a memorial park.

Attorneys representing the executors objected to attempts to introduce evidence that Hart's sister may have influenced him against the son and his divorced wife, Miss Westover.
