Erdelatz Named New Navy Coach



ANNAPOLIS, MD., Jan. 11.—(AP) Eddie Erdelatz, a veteran gridiron player at 36, is the new head football coach at the U. S. Naval Academy.

His acceptance of a four-year contract at undisclosed terms was announced today by Capt. Howard E. Caldwell, Navy director of athletics.

Erdelatz, who for the past two years has been coaching ends for the professional San Francisco 49ers, will be permitted to select his own assistant coaches and they also will get four-year contracts, Caldwell said.

Second civilian.

The big, soft-spoken St. Mary's (Calif.) graduate is Navy's second civilian coach. He succeeds George Sauer who quit two weeks ago after the academy announced dismissal of his two leading assistants, Bob Ingalls and Vic Bradford.

Erdelatz is no stranger to academy football. Beginning in 1945, he spent three seasons here coaching Middle ends. He was considered for the top post in 1948 but, when the job went to Sauer, he gave up college football for the professional game.

At Home.

At his San Francisco home when informed of his appointment, Erdelatz declared: "I'm thrilled and very honored to be selected by an institution with such high academic, patriotic and athletic standards as the Naval Academy. And I'm looking forward to the challenge the job presents."

He said he planned to arrive at the academy in March, shortly before spring football practice gets under way.

Kahut Wins Tiff, May Face Charles

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 11.—(AP)—Joe Kahut, Woodburn heavyweight, strengthened his bid for a title shot at Heavyweight Champion Ezzard Charles last night with a nine-round T.K.O. win over Irish Johnny O'Neill, of Oakland, Calif.

Kahut, 187 1/2, dropped the Californian with a hard right to the jaw to end what had been an uninteresting bout. O'Neill weighed 182.

O'Neill staggered up from the blow after the count of two, but promptly fell back again into the ropes. Referee Ralph Gruman called it a TKO.

The referee almost got knocked out himself. He slipped and fell while breaking up a clinch in the eighth, and O'Neill brought down the house by abruptly stopping his fight and starting to count over the fallen referee.

In the preliminaries, Joe Ortega, 137, Portland, won a fifth. Lucera had been knocked down six times.

Don Rogers, 136, Portland, took another TKO over Able Lucera, 31, San Jose. And in the opener Felix Ramirez, 133, San Jose, outpointed Bobby Why, 129, Los Angeles.

Bulldogs Fail To Keep Pace With Newby Five

Roseburg Indians came through with a 43-23 win over the Sutherlin Bulldogs in the league opener for both clubs last night at senior high.

Although going locally, the Bulldogs were hosts to the Indians, because Sutherlin doesn't have a regulation sized court of its own. A springling of enthusiastic fans saw the Bulldogs take a brief 2-1 lead immediately after the start of the game, but Roseburg went ahead, never to be threatened again. The halftime count favored Roseburg, 27-8.

Coach Jack Newby started last night's game mostly with men of the second team. They came through the first quarter leading 12-6. The Indians' coach then shoved the first team in. They held the Sutherlin five to two free throws, while Roseburg rang up 15 points, before the half ended.

Van Horn Collides

Roseburg's Roy Van Horn got off to a bad start in the third quarter. While going after the ball, he collided with an opposing player then skidded into the bleacher section wall with a loud bang that could be heard across the floor.

While fans craned their necks, Newby and the players rallied round; asked "wot 'opened" Van Horn finally got up, apparently none the worse for the wear.

Sutherlin took its fourth timeout in the third, and Coach Orrin Hills' advice finally seemed to make sense. They scored 10 points that quarter, to Roseburg's seven, closing the score margin to 35-20, in favor of Roseburg.

The Indians went ahead again in the final quarter, holding their opponents to three foul shots.

Both teams took a lot of shots and missed a lot of "cinch baskets." Pete Linden, sophomore Bulldog forward, who fouled out in the fourth quarter, paced his team mates with seven points, while Bulldog Fred Krosh was next highest with five.

Roseburg's scoring was rather evenly distributed, but Roy Van Horn and Mickey Coen, forwards led the pack with five points apiece.

Ragged Play Noted

Both clubs broke quickly; but played ragged ball. Frank Olson's backboard work was good, in spite of the many falls he took during the game. Merle Buck, and Kendall Wahl, forwards turned in good performances for the Bulldogs.

Both Dale Black and Larry Henninger played for the first time after many weeks layoff due to injuries. Each started out with a bang, considering the prolonged "vacation" and wound up with four points apiece.
