NORTH ROSEBURG CHURCH—Final preparations were made for the dedication of the North Roseburg church, set for Sunday, Jan. 22 at 11 a. m. Heading the service will be Bishop E. W. Praetorius of the Northwestern area of the Evangelical United Brethren church. Work on the pulpit and chapel (pictured above) was undertaken as a project by the youth of the church. They will paint the chapel floor, thus providing the finishing touches. The chapel, located in the basement of the parsonage at 2043 Vine street, was erected largely by donated labor from related churches in Eugene, Swiss Home, Philomath, Kings Valley and Vernonia. It was designed as temporary quarters for the Sunday school and worship services, first held in September. Although designed for 100 persons, the chapel is already over-crowded and plans are underway for construction of a separate chapel annex to be used for Sunday school classes and other church activities.

Investigators Probe Leak Of Secret Information

TOKYO. (AP)—General MacArthur's investigators haven't got far in trying to trace the leak on a secret state department document saying Formosa's fall was to be anticipated.

They've talked to four foreign correspondents so far. And all they learned was what they already knew from the newspapers—that all four had seen or had knowledge of the secret memorandum.

Ernest Hoberecht of the United Press, who first published a story on the document, was the latest to be examined. He was called in and questioned for 30 minutes Saturday.

He said he replied to all questions: "I have nothing to say." Tom Lambert of the Associated Press, and Howard Handelman and Bob Horiguchi of International News Service were ques-

tioned Friday. Lambert told questioners he had seen the document but declined to say who showed it to him. Handelman and Horiguchi gave similar answers.

Publication of the document caused an uproar in the United States. Headquarters has warned disciplinary action will be taken if responsibility for the disclosure can be determined.
