Congressmen May Probe Their Own Foreign Spending

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Congress may be asked soon to investigate its own overseas travelers.

Several members of the House disclosed informally that they are preparing legislation to bring this about. A Customs bureau spokesman who would not permit use of his name suggested that some Congressmen have abused their customs exemption privilege in bringing things home from abroad. The projected investigation stems from Congressional demands that government expenses generally be curbed and that tax loopholes be plugged. \$6 Million spent.

House members planning the investigation estimated that the aggregate cost to the tax payers of "junkets by House members alone" in 1949 was \$8 million. This includes the cost of military transportation, food and lodging, entertainment, and personal services.

"Every time a load of Congressmen goes abroad," one member said, "there is a heavy initial bill either for ship transportation or for transportation by military plane. You must figure in this the cost of the personnel manning the planes and the cost of servicing them. You must figure in the time consumed by our employes abroad arranging for accommodations and entertainment for the visitors, all of which eventually comes out of the taxpayers' pockets."

Outlay Questioned
He said he has been unable to find justification for the large annual outlay.

Last year was one of the biggest travel years in house history. Members who didn't go abroad on some sort of investi-

gation stayed home because they wanted to stay home, and not because they had no opportunity to travel.

There has been no estimate of the loss of revenue that results from exempting returning congressmen from customs duties. "But it should be quite a sizable figure," a Customs bureau spokesman said.

Another Witness Against Bridges Under Attack

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13—(AP)—Veracity of another government witness in the Harry Bridges perjury case was under fire of defense attorneys Thursday.

The witness, Lew Michener, 41, a Long Beach official of a United Auto Workers local, has had testimony disclosed, a varied career—from Montana bootlegger to Communist party membership to membership of the Tenth regional War Labor board.

No longer a member of the party, he testified he and Bridges attended two Communist meetings.

Defense Counsel James M. MacInnis pounced on Michener's admission yesterday that he probably filled out some sort of government document when appointed to the War Labor board and asked:

"In the questionnaire you had to fill out you were asked, 'are you a member of the Communist party or affiliated with a Communist organization,' weren't you?"

"I doubt it and I'll buy you a new hat if you can show me I signed such a statement under such circumstances," replied Michener.

MacInnis immediately demanded a search be made of government records. Federal Judge George B. Harris agreed but warned MacInnis not later to accuse government counsel of failing to find "a non-existent document" if there is none.
