

Beavers Beat Oregon Ducks 65-49 Friday

WSC Shows Predicted Form To Down Huskies 56-42 In Big Clash

(By The Associated Press)
The Washington State college Cougars showed the form which earned them pre-season picked as the basketball team to beat in the Northern division, Pacific Coast conference last night.
They walloped the University of Washington Huskies, 56-42, on their home floor at Pullman, to bat the Huskies into a two-way tie for first place in the division with Oregon State's defending champions.
Oregon State defeated Oregon at Eugene, 65-49.
It was Washington's first defeat in three conference games, and the second Washington setback in 14 contests including out-of-league competition.
The defending champion Beavers from Oregon State successfully withstood two challenges by the Oregon Ducks, one in each period.
Oregon made a battle of it the first dozen minutes, until the starters employed a weave to shoot two small guards into the clear for jump shots. That pushed Oregon State into successive leads of 17-14 and 26-16, before compiling a 29-19 halftime edge.
Forward Will Urban and center Jim Vranizan souped the Ducks in their second half surge, drawing nigh at 36-40 after the first four minutes.
Then the Starters started sifting their small guards, Dick Balantyne and Bill Harper, through again, and they carried an 11-point margin into the last two minutes of play.
The Beavers' two dynamiting guards led the scorers, Harper with 15 and Balantyne with 14. Urban and Mel Krause potted 11 apiece for the losers.
Despite snowy weather, 8,030 fans turned out to see the Beavers win.
The two Washington teams tangle again tonight at Pullman.
The Idaho Vandals, idle this week in conference play, matched the blizzard outside at Wallace, Idaho, in snowing under the Wallace All-Stars last night, 69-38.

GAMES POSTPONED

Southern Cal, Kansas State Stage Upsets

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Southern California and Kansas State scored major upsets last night in college basketball.

USC trimmed UCLA, 58-45, behind Bill Sharman's 32 points to take over the lead in the Southern division of the Pacific Coast conference. Kansas State overhauled Oklahoma in the closing minutes and went on to beat the Sooners, 43-42, in a big seven overtime fray.

St. Johns of Brooklyn, rated the No. 1 team, had a close call from Georgetown (DC) but rallied to win, 67-66.
Duquesne, ranked eighth, opened a midwest tour by whipping St. Josephs of Indian, 51-40, in its 11th straight win.

Denver, Utah State and Wyoming went into a three-way tie for first in the skyline six. Denver came from behind to nip Colorado A & M, 55-53. Wyoming whipped Brigham Young, 46-39, and Utah State nosed out Utah, 54-51.

Tulane remained unbeaten in the southeastern conference, nicking Louisiana State, 75-70.
Notre Dame won its fifth straight, 73-66, against John Carroll and Michigan State won its second game of the year, 81-64, against Marquette.

In other games North Carolina upset Miami (Fla) 55-53, on a last second field goal. Carnegie Tech walloped Penn State, 57-42, and Texas Tech beat New Mexico, 59-55, in overtime.

State Game Commission Hears Many Suggestions
PORTLAND, Jan. 14.—(AP)—The State Game commission struggled through dozens of suggestions today, trying to draw up the state's 1950 sports fishing regulations.
The suggestions were made at the annual public hearing on fishing rules yesterday, which representatives of all major sportsmen's groups attended, despite the worst storm of the winter. Individuals also attended.
Some wanted to end the rule that small fish must be thrown back. Others wanted a year-round trout season, except for the spawning period. There was another suggestion to add the month of April and the month of October onto the present trout season.
The Salem chapter of the Trout and Salmon League wanted a number of coastal streams opened to steelhead fishing in March. The rivers are the Lewis and Clark, the Nehalem, Trask, Wilson, Nestucca, Siletz, Salmon and Alsea.
The commission expects to announce its tentative regulations tonight.

Sanity Code Is Big Issue Before NCAA

Seven Schools Facing Expulsion Order; Small Colleges Pose Block

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—(AP)—The NCAA's sizzling internal wrangle over the sanity code reached its climax today with the nation's smaller colleges in a position to kill off a potent southern uprising.

The high brass of the National Collegiate Athletic Association met with representatives of the minor group yesterday to explain the new set of amateur standards.

Afterwards, Dr. J. H. Nichols, athletic director of little Oberlin college, said: "The smaller colleges are almost unanimously in favor of the sanity code * * * because it brings athletics under closer scrutiny of the college administration."

He said the minor schools had about one-third of the NCAA's voting strength and "actually are a decisive voice in the organization."

The NCAA's newly-acquired position as a governing body is threatened in a move to expel seven institutions which have admitted non-compliance with the code. Today's general meeting was the showdown.

The code, born two years ago, restricts scholarships and specifies an athlete must work for his keep. Outright athletic grants-in-aid are forbidden.

The seven schools threatened with expulsion are Virginia, The Citadel, Virginia Tech, Virginia Military Institute, Boston college, Maryland and Villanova.

The South and Southwest, meanwhile, have risen up in a chagrined body to back up the culprits who contend they can't abide by the rules. Three conferences—the Southern, Southeastern and Southwest—pledged their full voting strength to the cause.

The Southern group is fighting for a revised code which would permit athletic scholarships under rigid university supervision.

The NCAA announced that one of the seven schools recommended for expulsion by the compliance committee had since filed notice it can comply. This is reported to be Maryland.

Lynn Waldorf of California was elected president of the American Football Coaches association to succeed L. R. (Dutch) Meyer of Texas Christian.

The larger college group recommended that an active committee be formed to study the television problem and that no television commitments be made after the 1950-51 college year.

Committees representing the Pacific Coast conference and Big Ten met to discuss renewal of their Rose Bowl pact.
