Mortgage Foreclosure Suit Filed In Court

Ralph and Elenor Anderson have filed suit in circuit court demanding judgment in the sum of \$796.17, plus interest and costs, from R. K. and Marjorie Stenson.

The plaintiff further demand that the mortgage against the Stensons be foreclosed and sold by the sheriff; that the proceeds be applied to the costs and payment of the amount due to the plaintiff, and that the defendant and all persons having claims against the defendants mortgage be barred from all claims to the property involved.

The plaintiffs also demand that their lien be decreed superior to the judgment lien of L. W. Metzker, who is also named as defendant.

Metzker's lien judgment against the Stensons, was docketed in the county court on Nov. 13, 1948, in the amount of \$230.66, plus interests and costs.

Truman Hits Back At Taft's Views Anent Formosa

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—(P)—President Truman said Thursday he did not know that Senator Taft was a military expert. His crack at the Senate Republican policy leader came in response to news conference questions about Taft's criticism of the administration's policy toward Formosa.

A reporter had asked particularly about Taft's assertion that Formosa is one place where a small amount of aid at a small cost could prevent the spread of Communism.

The president said Senator Taft is entitled to his opinion.

Then Mr. Truman added that he did not know Taft was a military expert, though.

At the same time the president made it clear that the administration's policy against military aid to the Chinese Nationalists on Formosa is not likely to be changed by the fire of criticism.

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cism it has drawn from Republicans in Congress.

Mr. Truman said he had laid down the policy on Formosa in his last formal statement and that statement was thorough and complete.

A report to the House Foreign Affairs committee from a staff aide says the Chinese Nationalists on Formosa might be able to hold out six to 18 months without American help.

The report also says that enemy control of the island in a future would be of "great strategic consequence," but "the rub is in attendant circumstances."

The document makes no specific recommendations as to whether the United States should give or deny military aid to Formosa—A hot issue in congress.
