News of the Nineties

Sixty years ago! Roseburg was becoming a center of activity in those days. The population was creeping past the 2,300 mark and the newspaper, published EACH Thursday appeared under a nameplate. "Roseburg Review" with S. F. (Fred) Floed and Chas. H. Fisher as editors. To many of us now the "gay nineties is becoming a fast-fleeting memory.

Thumbing through the browned files of the Roseburg Review many items long forgotten come to light. Benjamin Harrison was president. J. W. Hamilton, prosecuting attorney for the second judicial district and Sylvester Pennover held the title of Governor of Oregon. In Douglas county H. S. French provided legal authority to the title Constable and J. C. Shambrook was county physician.

The January Roseburg Review, announced in no bold manner, that they "provided more reading matter for residents of southern Oregon than any other newspaper" . . . that four Prineville hunters killed 191 rabbits in

one day . . . the McClallen House advertised "large and commodious sample rooms for Commercial Travelers" . . . that A. F. Stearns was over from Oakland, Monday . . . that "suits for the H. and L. Mask ball may be obtained from W. H. Fisher . . . "A panther hunt was enjoyed in Coles Valley . . . "The Panama canal will be completed. It can be finished in 2 years says the commission, provided enough money can be procured."
