

Ex-Con Nabbed After He Thought He Killed Cop

PORTLAND, Jan. 16 (AP)—Detectives slapped handcuffs on an ex-convict yesterday while he cried "I didn't mean to kill him." I just ran and ran . . . and ran."

Vernon C. Goodwin, 33, apparently believed he had killed Officer Vernon Riedberger, the night before during a chase after a grocery store holdup. The policeman had slipped on the snow and fallen just in time to miss a bullet fired at him.

Goodwin's arrest climaxed a five-hour search for the grocery hold-up man. Detectives surrounded an apartment house and called for Goodwin to come out. Goodwin raced into the basement and cringed behind a furnace until three armed detectives roused him out.

cery store Saturday night, and fired three shots at proprietor Dwight de Haven when De Haven ran out screaming for help. Police took up the chase, but the bandit leaped from his car and ducked between buildings. He fired at officer Riedberger, running behind.

Later a check of the car led to the apartment house where Goodwin was arrested.

A woman in the apartment, Mrs. Clara Armstrong, was charged with being an accessory to the holdup.

Police said Goodwin escaped from Washington State prison in 1946.

VA Jobs Opened To Examination

The U. S. Civil Service commission announces an examination for contract officer and technical assistant, loan guarantee, from which positions in the Veterans administration, Washington, D.C., will be filled. Yearly salaries are \$5,400 and \$6,400.

No written test will be required of applicants for these positions. To qualify, they must have had at least six years of appropriate experience. Pertinent education or training may be substituted for not more than three years of this experience. For grade GS-12 positions (paying \$6,400), applicants must show responsible administrative or supervisory experience. Details about the requirements and other information of interest are given in the examination announcement.

Information and application forms may be obtained from the Commission's local secretary, A. C. Canterbury located at the Roseburg post office from Civil Service regional offices, or from the U. S. Civil Service commission, Washington 25, D.C. Applications should be sent to the Executive Secretary, Committee of Expert Examiners, Veterans administration, Washington 25, D.C., and must be received not later than January 31, 1950.

KLAMATH FALLS, Jan. 17—(AP)—Two hungry and half-frozen Negro women were taken from a Southern Pacific boxcar here shortly after noon Monday. They had been in the car since last Wednesday.

The women identified themselves as Louise Moore, 38, and Sally Larkins, 34, transient harvest workers.

Louise Moore said they were traveling from El Centro, Calif., to Washington to be there when work in the apple orchard opens up. They had been picking cotton around El Centro.

The women said they had boarded the boxcar Wednesday at Oakland and had been virtually without food since that time until given a sandwich and cup of coffee at the SP yards when taken off the car Monday.
