The decision to augment the panel of fishing and hunting experts to include specialists from all fields of sports was made in order to give other sports enthusiasts the same type of radio feature and service given fishermen and hunters since December 23, 1946. Throughout the country additional millions of people have made sports hobbies of more than two-score known and popular games and athletic skills. This Thursday MDL program (8:30 - 8:55 p. m.), which has been retitled "Sports for All," now will present as panelists noted personalities who are outstanding in their particular sports hobbies. In recent experimental broadcasts, the program has featured such guest panelists as handleader Guy Lombardo, Pauline Betz, former women's tennis champion, and Tony Henrich, hero of the 1949 World Series. Tonight's guest experts are Shirley Mae France, the Somerset (Mass.) swimming star who unsuccessfully attempted to swim the English channel last summer, and basketball star Don Forman. (Tonight—8:30 - 8:55 p. m.).

Highlighting tomorrow's late evening listening will be a special program shot featuring the presentation of the junior first citizen award at the annual banquet at Kennedy's Dutch Mill. Announcer Bob McCarl will handle introductions and descriptions of events for KRRR listeners.
