### AZALEA HOUSE PROJECT IS DISCUSSED AT RECENT MEETING

Seven Azalea House committee chairmen met at the home of Mrs. A. J. Standley, Roseburg, for a one o'clock luncheon and meeting on Monday. Mrs. Standley is county chairman of the Azalea House project. Corinne McTaggart, county extension agent (Home Economics), reviewed the purpose of the Azalea House project.

Azalea House is planned to give modern, attractive, and convenient housing to 50 girls who are students at Oregon State College at a cost less than other group housing of a similar quality. It will be a cooperative house where girls can save part of their living costs by helping with the work of the house for a short time each day. Girls studying home economics will be given preference. Each county in the state will have opportunities to nominate girls to live in the house.

Funds to start building are being raised by members of the home extension units in Oregon. A check for \$25,000 to apply toward the Azalea House fund was presented to Dr. A. L. Strand, president of Oregon State College, last June.

### Oregon Building Permits In 1949 Show Decrease

SEATTLE—(AP)—Oregon wound up 1949 with an increase in building permits, though the year as a whole was below 1948.

That was the report of construction news bulletin, Seattle, which surveyed permits issued by 23 Oregon cities. Fourteen of them reported an increase in building during December: Baker, Bend, Coos Bay, Corvallis, Eugene, Gresham, Hillsboro, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Medford, Portland, North Bend, Springfield, and The Dalles.

Four Oregon cities started more building in 1949 than in 1948: Medford, Newberg, Oregon City and Tillamook.

### Corn Chowder Is One-Dish Meal

Canned corn is on the United States Department of Agriculture's list of plentiful January foods. It's also on the family's list of favorite meal-in-a-dish specialties.

**Corn Chowder**  
(4 generous servings)  
Four tablespoons ham fat, butter or fortified margarine, 1 large onion, sliced, 1 No. 2 can whole kernel or cream style corn, 2 cups diced potatoes, 3 cups milk, 1 cup diced cooked or leftover ham, optional, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons chopped parsley, 1/2 teaspoon tobacco.

Add onion to fat in large saucepan and cook until tender, but not brown. If whole kernel corn is used, drain corn and add corn liquid to saucepan. If cream-style corn is used, add 1 cup water to saucepan. Bring to a boil and add potatoes; cover and cook 10 minutes. Add corn, milk and ham if desired. Add salt. Heat thoroughly. Add parsley and tobacco.

Here are two more good corn recipes, each by cooking experts of the Department of Agriculture.

### Corn Fondue

(serves 4)  
One-third cup of bread cubes, 1 1/2 cups cream-style corn, 2 tablespoons minced onion, 2 teaspoons finely chopped green pepper, 1/4 cup finely grated cheese, 1/2 teaspoon salt, pepper, 2 eggs, well beaten, 1 cup scalded milk.

Blend all the ingredients into the eggs, adding the scalded milk last. Pour into a greased loaf pan (4x8 inches) and set in a pan of hot water. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) until set—about one hour.

**Cheese, Corn, Tomato on Toast**  
(6 servings)  
Three tablespoons flour, 3 tablespoons melted table fat, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 1 onion, sliced, 2 cups canned corn, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 pound sharp cheese, shaved thin.

Brown the flour in a heavy skillet. Remove from skillet and blend with 2 tablespoons of the fat. Brown the sliced onion in the remaining fat, add all other ingredients except cheese and cook about 10 minutes. Add the cheese and stir until it melts. Serve on crisp toast. Garnish with slices of hard-cooked eggs.

### Larger U. S. Army At Reduced Cost Planned

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 —(AP)—The Army announces that it is planning a new reserve corps program designed to turn out more trained fighting men—at less cost to the government.

Secretary of the Army (Gray) said the new program aims at a "desirable" organized reserve of 625,000, but the Army will accept 367,000 officers and men as the "minimum total."

It will replace a program begun in 1945 that called for 1,000,000 organized reserves, but had produced only 250,000 up to last Nov. 30, Gray said.

The Army secretary said that the new plan will cost about \$153,000,000 annually compared to the \$369,000,000 estimated for the organization set up at the end of the war.
