

Responsibility Law Operation In Oregon Reported

Application of Oregon's financial responsibility law resulted in suspension of 5,973 operators' licenses and 7,187 vehicle registrations last year, according to the state department's annual report.

Majority of the drivers whose licenses were suspended failed to file proof of responsibility after being involved in property damage or injury accidents. Owners of vehicles involved must also file proof, and 3,114 of the registration suspensions resulted from failure to comply. Other vehicle suspensions were for unsatisfied judgments, drunken driving not resulting in accident, and failure to maintain proof after filing.

More drivers' licenses were reinstated than were suspended, however. Expiration of the three-year period allowed return of 5,009 and furnishing of proof after suspension another 3,593. A total of 4,051 vehicle registrations were reinstated on filing of proof.

Secretary of State Newberry, whose office administers the act, pointed out that the number of drivers and vehicles affected by suspensions is only a little over one percent of the state's total. "Our records show, however, that a small minority of drivers

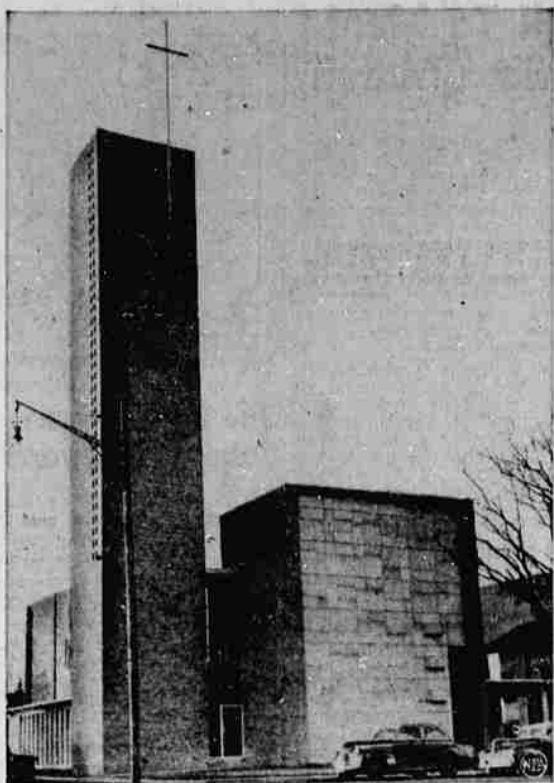

Protestant Aggression Against Communism Urged

EUGENE, Jan. 20 (AP)—A challenge to Protestants to carry out an aggressive policy in the "battle for men's souls" was delivered in Eugene Wednesday night by Dr. Clifford Barber, moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church.

The speaker, who is the chief executive officer of the two and a quarter million Presbyterians in the nation, said that "there is nothing wrong with bazaars and Sunday School picnics, but they don't win men's souls."

Speaking to more than 200 local church members, he urged Protestants to capture the spirit of John Knox, founder of the sect, who bowed his head to no man. Christians should have an overall strategy to combat the program of communism, he told his audience. He contended that Christians have been "pusy footed and mealy mouthed" while the other side "is using every subtle means at its command to lead men astray."

SALEM, Jan. 20 (AP)—Repeal of the federal excise taxes on colored oleomargarine won't mean that Oregon housewives will be able to buy colored oleo. Oregon state law has prohibited the sale of colored oleo since 1915. Attempts have been made in the legislature to allow sale of colored oleo in Oregon, but they have been badly defeated.

In the most recent legislature, in 1949, Democrats sponsored a bill to permit sale of colored oleo. But it was defeated, 22 to 6, in the Senate. The House never considered the bill.

However, the action of Congress in taking off the special taxes on colored oleo is expected to provide new ammunition in the next legislature for those who want to allow the sale of colored oleo. Generally, the Democratic legislators from Portland want to let colored oleo be sold. But the Republican legislators from upstate dairy communities, who have an overwhelming control, are dead set against colored oleo.

INHERITS \$10 MILLION LOS ANGELES (AP)—R. D. Merrill of Seattle has been named sole beneficiary in the will of Thomas S. Lee, radio heir, whose estate attorneys estimate may total \$10,000,000. Merrill is an uncle of Lee, 43, who plunged 12 stories to his death from an office building last Saturday.

Desertion Of Two Children Brings Mother To Court

SPOKANE, Jan. 20 (AP)—A 35-year-old woman who deserted her two children Christmas day pleaded guilty Tuesday to a charge of family desertion.

Prosecutor Hugh Evans said the desertion charge filed against Mrs. Geneve Lang was the first against a woman in Spokane county and possibly the first in the state.

Deputy Prosecutor Dudley L. Wilson told the court Mrs. Lang left her son, Donald, 13, and daughter, Carol, 17, Christmas morning and went to Tacoma. He said she telephoned the children the next morning and told them to ask the Welfare department for money to go to their father in Massachusetts.

Wilson quoted the woman as telling the children the Welfare department would care for them. She was arrested in Tacoma and returned to Spokane last week. She pleaded guilty to two counts: (1) Abandoning the 13-year-old boy, and (2) failing to support him.

Claims Now in Order For Ex-Prisoners Of War SALEM, Jan. 20 (AP)—Former prisoners of World War II now can get application blanks for payment under the federal war claims act, the state Veterans department says.

The forms have been given to county Veterans' service officers. Under the act, all men who were held prisoner by the enemy can receive \$1 for each day they received substandard food during imprisonment. This will take in nearly all former prisoners, as most of them received substandard food.

School Controversy Solved: School Discontinued

BAKER, Ore. (AP)—When the community of Sparta, about 30 miles from Baker, became embroiled in a quarrel as to where the schoolhouse should be located, it solved the whole thing by not having any school at all, Myrtle Lee, Baker county school superintendent, reported here. There hasn't been any school at Sparta since Dec. 23, she said, and the teacher has gone home to Portland. Now, all of the school directors and the school clerk have quit in a huff and a special meeting will have to be called to elect replacements, Mrs. Lee added.

Actions On Cases In Circuit Court

A civil suit involving Clifford Legg, plaintiff, vs. Roseburg Lumber Co., defendant, was launched in circuit court today. The plaintiff demands judgment for \$15,500, plus costs, for alleged damages to his truck and because of the truck's incapacity. The civil suit of Louis Hollinger vs. March Logging Co. went to the jury today, after Judge Carl E. Wimberly instructed the jurors. Final testimony in this case was presented Thursday. Commercial Credit Plan, Inc., has filed suit in circuit court demanding judgment from Norman L. Rackley in the sum of \$523.26, together with interest and costs, for alleged non-payment of a debt.

A complaint filed by Betty Greenley against A. N. Johnson was ordered dismissed by Judge Wimberly, having been settled out of court. Rees Endrup Baird was awarded a \$231.47 judgment, plus interest and costs, by default Thursday in circuit court, from Rhoda E. Wheelock. The suit of Betty Greenley vs. Dr. A. N. Johnson has been dismissed, based upon the stipulation of the parties, by order of Judge Wimberly. California U. Cyclotrons Produce New Element

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—The University of California cyclotrons have produced another new element—this one the heaviest known. The new substance, No. 97 in the atomic scale, is the fifth to be produced by the cyclotron's atomic particle bombardments. Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, 37-year-old professor of chemistry at the university, said it probably would be named "Berkellium," in honor of the university city.

The element was discovered Dec. 19 but its announcement was withheld pending necessary approval by the Atomic Energy commission. What the new element is like and what might be done with it were not announced. Dr. Seaborg said theoretical considerations rule out its use in atomic weapons. Investigations of its properties are continuing. Dr. Seaborg has been co-discoverer of four of the five new elements produced in the Berkeley cyclotrons: plutonium, americium, curium and now the tentatively named Berkellium. The fifth was neptunium. The University of California cyclotrons are machines which are capable of changing known substances into other, entirely different substances. Twenty-six states have "Keep Green" forest programs.
