FEPC Bill Won't Be Bottled, Truman Assured

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(AP)—President Truman said Thursday he has assured that the administration can beat a proposed House rules change that might bottle up the FEPC bill.

The President told his news conference that his information came earlier in the day from Chairman Sabath (D-Ill) of the House Rules committee.

He said he called Sabath to the White House this morning for a conference and the chairman assured him he had the votes to defeat the resolution for repeal of the so-called 21-day rule.

Of course, Mr. Truman said, he is against changing the rule for dislodging bottled-up bills from the Rules committee. He called it a backward step.
