Census District Office Takes Crew Leader Applications

Applications for the position of crew leader in the 17th decennial census to be conducted in April and applications for employment as enumerator are now being received by the Eugene district office of the United States Bureau of the Census.

Final selection for the crew leader positions will be made in February after oral and written tests of candidates for the jobs, according to Ray M. Feves, census district supervisor here. Approximately 22 crew leader positions will be filled. Each crew leader will have supervision over about 20 enumerators.

Qualifications required for selection as crew leader include, as a minimum, a high school education and at least three years' experience in supervising or assisting in the supervision of an office force or field crew, training of subordinates, making and reviewing reports of average difficulty, and handling related assignments. In general, an applicant's record of experience must show satisfactory performance in increasingly responsible positions. College education may be counted in part in lieu of experience. The census bureau further specifies that the applicant's previous employment and associations must be of such a nature that they will facilitate obtaining cooperation from respondents. Census bureau employees are sworn to secrecy and are punishable by law for revealing confidential information but beyond this care is exercised to employ only persons who have public confidence.

Approximately 322 enumerators will be employed to take the 1950 census in the following counties over which the local census office has supervision: Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Lane and Linn.

Applicants for enumerator jobs must be citizens of the United States, have a high school education or furnish evidence of comparable experience, be in good physical health and of excellent character, and between the ages of 21 to 65 although preference will be given to those between 25 to 45 years. They must have sufficient financial resources to sustain themselves for approximately four weeks from the date of appointment until their first salary check. Applicants with veteran preference who meet those requirements will be given priority over non-veteran applicants.

Applicants for enumerator jobs in rural areas must have an automobile available in good operating condition. The method of payment will provide for the cost of operating cars on official Census business.

Application forms may be obtained from the census office located at Rm 205 Armory, Eugene, Ore. Mr. Feves will visit each of the counties the first week in February. Exact dates for his visit to this community will be announced.

Dr. Bennett A. Porter, specialist in fruit insecticides in the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, said the cost of spraying is high, but growers would go out of business if they didn't use chemicals.

Some apple growers, he said, spend more than \$100 a year to control insects in their orchards.

Dr. Fred C. Bishop, chief of the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, said that the alternation of various types of insecticides would reduce health hazards.

He added that insects themselves build up resistance to a poison if the same type is used continuously.

Dr. Bishop agreed that insecticides are man's most dependable defense against insect pests. He said that food production would drop and prices increase if they were not used.

The hearing is expected to last a year. It was occasioned largely by recent reports that the residue of chemicals on fruits and vegetables may be causing human ailments and disease.

Kidnap Hoaxer Draws Two Years' Probation

DETROIT, Jan. 23.—(AP)—His faked story of being kidnaped George Thomas, 58, Union night watchman, will be on probation for two years.

Thomas was a co-finder of the dud dynamite plant at the CIO United Auto Workers headquarters Dec. 20.

Less than three weeks later, after being found on the city outskirts with a rope around his neck, Thomas told a hair-raising story of having been kidnaped.

Then, after keeping police busy for 36 hours in an investigation, Thomas admitted his story was a hoax.

Saturday in recorder's court he was ordered on probation for falsely reporting a felony. He is returning to his job. The union is giving it back to him.

Oregon U. To Get New Economics Professor

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., Jan. 23.—(AP)—Dr. C. Ward Macy, professor of economics at COE college, has resigned to become chairman of the economics department at the University of Oregon.

He has been dean of the faculty and chairman of the division of social studies at COE. He said Sunday he planned to assume his duties at Eugene about Sept. 1.

Dr. Macy has been a commissioner of the midwest athletic conference since 1944.

Woman Held As Suspect In Bad Check Passing

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Red Cross Load Heavily Upped In Winter Severity

The months of December and January have been extremely active as far as the home service department of the local chapter of the American Red Cross is concerned, according to Douglas Simms, chapter manager.

Many factors have contributed to this increased load, said Simms, chief among which were weather conditions and unexpected illnesses. Many members of the armed forces, home on leave during the holidays were stranded because of the road conditions in surrounding areas and were forced to expend their funds for necessities during their prolonged stay rather than for return transportation as intended.

Likewise unexpected illness of members of their families caused additional drain on their resources. In order to meet these needs the local chapter assisted in arranging three emergency furloughs and extending already arranged leaves in two more instances. All cases involved serious illnesses, necessitating the presence of the serviceman at home.

Poor road conditions made extended travel inadvisable in some cases and Red Cross was called upon to supplement transportation funds for the return trip to the military installation.

Aid Requests Increase

Simms stated that rather than the usual 40 to 50 requests for assistance per month, there have been to date applications from over 130 persons, seeking assistance of one type or another.

Many of the applicants were found to be eligible for assistance from other sources and were accordingly referred to the appropriate social agency. The not inconsiderable number for whom no other resources existed were, in the main, found to be eligible to receive assistance from the local chapter.

Requests were varied, including requests for direct financial assistance, assistance with claims for government benefits such as pension claims, medical care, insurance problems, etc., health and welfare reports regarding the dependents of servicemen, social investigations involving minor and incompetent wards of the government, emergency leaves and requests for bedding and clothing in emergency situations. All requests were met insofar as possible thru the resources of the local chapter.
