Sherwood hopes to send up to 12 men against the Cavemen, while Brown is fixing to field almost as many.

The boxing team of Roseburg will lack men in the heavy eight division—the heaviest man weighing only around 160 pounds. Sherwood indicated the 112-pound class in wrestling would not be filled.

30 Try Out
Both boxers and wrestlers will participate in eliminations slated for Tuesday at the high school. Nearly 30 boys in each sport will try for the team at that time.

Joe Toman, ex-collegiate wrestler, will officiate at the mat events. Judges and a referee for the boxing program have yet to be picked.

Sherwood said all but two wrestling dates have been filled so far. Medford comes here Mar. 10, and two dates have been set for Springfield: Jan. 31, here, and Feb. 10, there. Boxing will be included in the Springfield engagements.

No dates have been set with Reedsport and Florence yet, but Sherwood revealed these matches will be scheduled within a day or so.

Draft Problem To Pro Football
PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 23.—(AP)—How to solve the complex problem of draft is the major problem before embattled National American football league owners today.

The 13 owners awarded giant Leon Hart, Notre Dame all-America lineman, to Detroit late last night. Then they spent four fruitless hours trying to decide how to apportion the rest of the 1949 college grid talent.
