

Marshfield Pirates Defeat Roseburg Indians, 63-46

Coos Bay Five Leads Throughout

The Marshfield Pirates scored an easy 63-46 victory over the Roseburg Indians Monday night at Coos Bay. Led by high scorers Milton Schultze, Ron Robins, and Barney Holland, who garnered 16, 13, and 12 points, respectively, the Pirates ripped Roseburg's early lead, then forged ahead and widened the gap in the second quarter.

Roseburg jumped off a 1-0 lead on forward Bud Mathews' free throw, the Pirates were ahead at the end of the first quarter, 16-12, and held the Indians scoreless in the second half to lead 35-12 at halftime.

With Frank Olson pouring in counters on pivot shots from the key and Larry Freeman connecting from 20 feet out, the Roseburg team outscored Marshfield in the second half to lower the 26-point halftime deficit to the final 13-point edge.

Freeman led the Roseburg scoring with 14 points, followed by Olson with 12 and Mathews with eight. Roseburg coach Jack Newby used all of his 12-man traveling squad in the contest.

The Roseburg team had a slow trip home from the game because of snow, but all hands reached home safely.

Basketball Tilt To Test JYR Players

Bob Schindler, Roseburg JYR guard, and high-scoring Indian varsity basketball player on the 1948 team, paled when informed he would ride a donkey at Senior high Wednesday night against Roseburg National Guardsmen.

This animal classic, in which both teams are mounted on the rebellious recalcitrants, will test the players for accuracy while their donkeys gallop full tilt down the basketball court.

Schindler reports it is difficult enough to shoot while both feet are planted on the maples. "How can I steer the animal while I'm trying to lay one in?" he queried.

Manager Jeff Jeffries said he'd talk it over with the officials. If they approved, Schindler would be permitted to trade places with the donkey.

"We'll turn the lights down low and maybe the fans won't be able to tell the difference," he said.

The game is slated to start at 8:15. All proceeds go to the high school athletic fund, to help pay for the newly-purchased timberscoreboard, now hanging from the gymnasium ceiling at senior high.

Mills, Maxim Mix Tonight

LONDON, Jan. 24 — (P) — Freddie Mills brings the world's light heavyweight title out of cold storage tonight for the first time in 18 months when he meets America's Joey Maxim.

The chances are 2 to 1 that he won't get a chance to put it back. The 15-round argument is scheduled for 9 p. m. London time (4 p. m. eastern standard time) before a sellout crowd of 18,000 at the Earl's court arena.

Mills claims he's in better shape than when he won the crown on points from Gus Lesnevich in July of 1948.

"I'm feeling really good this time," said the 30-year-old Briton. "Everything's been going right. My legs feel good and I think I'm better than I have been for five years."

Maxim, a goodlooking black-haired brawler from Cleveland, was as nervous as a novice as he tried to kill time yesterday.

"That's the way I like him," purred smooth-talking Jack Kearns, his manager. "Keep him on edge and he fights his best. He's ready."

The fighters were due to meet for the first time in three weeks when they report to promoter Jack Solomons' gym this afternoon for the official weigh-in.

Neither expected any difficulty in making the 175 pound limit. Maxim weighed 174 1/2 pounds yesterday and Mills 174.

Holy Cross Tops Nation's Court Clubs

NEW YORK, Jan. 24 — (P) — The classy Crusaders of Holy Cross continued to reign today as the kingpins of the country's college basketball teams in the fourth weekly Associated Press poll.

The all-conquering quintet from Worcester, Mass., who wrested the leadership from St. John's of Brooklyn by a narrow margin last week captured top honors by a landslide vote.

Unbeaten in 14 starts this season, Holy Cross drew 118 of a possible 166 first place votes cast by sports writers and sports casters from coast to coast, to win in a breeze from second ranked Duquesne of Pittsburgh.

The margin was 1,600 to 1,024. Penn. Gets 4 Votes

The Pennsylvania Dukes, the only other undefeated major five, picked up only four first place nominations but grabbed enough seconds and thirds to vault from sixth to second. Duquesne has won 13 straight.

Long Island University, despite its 55-52 upset by North Carolina last Tuesday, clung to its third place ranking. The Blackbirds (13-2) had 10 first place calls and piled up 826 points to come in ahead of Kentucky and St. John's fourth and fifth, respectively.

The Wildcats (11-4) recovered from a licking by Georgia to swamp De Paul of Chicago and move up a notch. The Brooklyn Redmen, who bowed to De Paul for their second loss in 17 starts, slipped three places from their runner-up spot of a week ago.

Kentucky had 762 points to St. John's 754.

Bradley Sixth
Sixth place was awarded to Bradley, which suffered an upset by Detroit last Saturday. The Braves (15-3) first place choice of eight experts, received 698 points.

LaSalle college of Philadelphia continued to make rapid strides to the front by vaulting from 10th to seventh on the strength of seven straight wins, including a resounding triumph over North Carolina State on the latter's home court. The Explorers (11-2) received 534 points.

Held idle by mid-semester exams, City College of New York dropped a notch to eighth place with 446 points. The Beavers (9-2) were the only club among the first ten failing to get a single first place vote. St. John's, Kentucky and La Salle got six each.

ninth ranked Indiana got two as did 10th rated North Carolina State.

Indiana, eighth a week ago, dropped one place despite winning both its games during the week. The Hoosiers, who own a 12-2 won and lost mark, drew 384 points to nose out the Wolfpack by only four points. The latter knocked off Lill and North Carolina during the week to climb from 12th to 10th with a 13-3 record.

Other first place votes were cast for 11th ranking U. C. L. A., 12th ranking Kansas State and 16th ranking University of Washington. U. C. L. A. got four.

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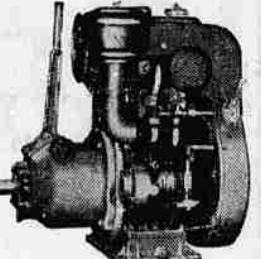
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
