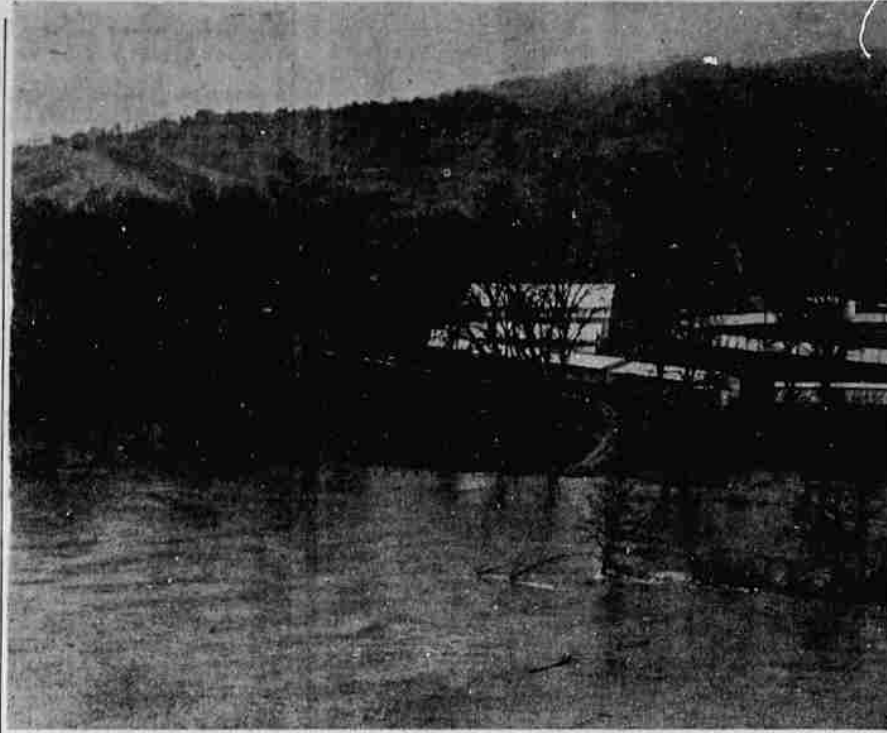
MEETINGS OF CIRCLES ANNOUNCED FOR THURSDAY

Utility Official Opposes PPL Sale To Van Ingen Co.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 —(AP)—The long-standing controversy over public versus private ownership of utilities in the Pacific Northwest ended anew today at a Securities and Exchange Commission hearing.

The situation developed as the SEC began proceedings to determine whether to approve or reject a proposal to sell control of Pacific Power and Light Co. of Portland, Ore.

Burtis E. Calder, board chairman of Electric Bond and Share, New York holding company, opposed public ownership of utilities. For this and other reasons, he said, he is against selling the Portland utility to a New York underwriting syndicate headed by B. J. Van Ingen and Co., Inc. American Power and Light Co., a subsidiary of the corporation Calder heads, has asked authority to sell controlling interest in the Portland utility, under the proposal the Van Ingen syndicate would purchase 500,000 shares representing outstanding common stock in Pacific Power.

Calder told the SEC that he understands the Van Ingen interests plan to resell the Pacific Power holdings to public utility districts in the northwest. "Now by all means, if we can get the right price," Calder said, "I would prefer Pacific Power to go into private hands."

He said he also opposed the Van Ingen offer on the grounds that American Power and Light could receive immediate cash payment for the holdings if it accepted another proposition.

He referred to an offer by Allen and Co.—New York investment company, which headed another syndicate—to pay \$15,000,000 cash for the Pacific Power stock.

The Van Ingen offer listed a base price of \$10,000,000 plus an added sum contingent on the sale of certain properties owned by Pacific power. The total price however, would not exceed \$19,500,000.

Calder said he is "totally in favor of the Allen offer" because of the readiness to pay cash and his belief that the Allen syndi-
