

Measles Taking Toll Of Arctic Circle Natives

EDMONTON, Alta. —(CP)—A measles epidemic which in recent weeks has struck the Indian and Eskimo population of the Mackenzie delta region inside the Arctic circle has taken three more lives, bringing the toll to 10, it was reported here.

The information was included in a message received by Dr. W. L. Falconer, superintendent of the Charles Camsell hospital from a medical team from the hospital which flew 1,300 miles north Sunday to fight the epidemic.

The medical team which left Edmonton Sunday, Dr. Paul Harvey, and nurses Rita Murphy, Ruth Fadam and Dorothy Chapman, have joined the fight against the epidemic, carrying with them serum and other supplies.

Dr. Harvey, who spent many years of his medical career in the Arctic, plans on travelling by air to many remote Eskimo settlements where he will check natives.

Cause of much of the rapid spread of the disease is the migratory habits of the Eskimos and

Indians. During winter they move constantly in search of food.

Lamar Toose Mulls Idea Of Racing Sen. Morse

PORTLAND, Jan. 25 —(AP)—Lamar Toose, Portland attorney, said Tuesday he was considering running against Sen. Wayne Morse in the Republican primary election.

Toose said a month ago he would not be a candidate. Tuesday he said a number of people had asked him to reconsider. "Naturally I don't rebuff people like that because they are sincere in asking me to run," he said.

His final decision will await several discussions, Toose said, among them one on his position in the law firm of Cake, Jauregui and Toose. One of the partners is Ralph Cake, Republican national committeeman, a friend of Morse's.

Meier & Frank Ups Advertising In Oregonian

PORTLAND, Jan. 25. —(AP)—Meier & Frank company, Portland department store, increased its advertising in the Oregonian Tuesday but store executives disclaimed any connection between change and recent criticism of the store.

After the Oregonian published a report of an NLRB examiner's findings on an unfair labor charge against the store, Meier & Frank canceled a number of advertisements and cut back the daily line to one page. Advertising in the Journal, which also published the report, was not affected.

Tuesday the Oregonian had two pages—the first increase above the single page. The advertising cut-back had been criticised by the Multnomah county Democrats, labor unions and the press as economic pressure by an advertiser to influence news policy.

"Mike" Elliott Again Files For Sheriff Job

PORTLAND, Jan. 25. —(AP)—Marion Le Roy (Mike) Elliott, repudiated Multnomah county sheriff, came back Monday to try it again. He filed as a Democrat seeking the sheriff's job.

Voters turned Elliott out of office in a recall election last November. He had taken office a year after changing registration from Republican to Democrat and beating incumbent Martin Pratt in a close vote.

The present sheriff, Terry D. Schunk, appointed to succeed Elliott, has not yet filed. He has, however, announced that he will store's advertising policy was not affected by newspaper policy.

Price Increases In Steel Defended By Benj. Fairless

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25. —(AP)—President Benjamin Fairless of the U. S. Steel corporation told a congressional committee Tuesday the recent steel price rise should cause no "harmful effect whatsoever" on price levels in other industries.

Any upward changes, added the head of "big steel," "will be due more to increased labor, transportation and other costs, than to any change in the price of steel."

Fairless said the price boost his company ordered was "made necessary by heavy increases in our costs. This is the simple truth."

As items of this increased cost, he emphasized:

(A) New insurance and pension programs, \$67,500,000; and (B) increased social security tax, \$3,400,000.

"These costs alone are \$3.88 per ton and more than offset the \$3.82 per ton which we hope to obtain from price increases," Fairless said.

Higher Reserve Goal Set By Baker Credit Assn.

BAKER, —(AP)—Proud of achieving in 16 years a goal of complete ownership by its members, the Baker Production Credit association has set a new goal. It hopes to reach a reserve of \$500,000, compared to its present \$338,550.

The farmers' association includes 505 members from Baker, Union, Grant, Malheur and Harney counties.

Since its founding the association has loaned \$28,327,000 to members and paid off a \$175,000 federal investment. In 1949, \$1,450,919 worth of loans were made to members.

BIGGEST EUROPEAN CLOCK

STRASBOURG —(AP)—What is claimed to be Europe's biggest clock is now being built in a special workshop here. It will be erected in Oslo when completed.

The clock has a face more than 26 feet in diameter with hands weighing 550 pounds. The pointer of the big hand will move by jumps representing half a minute on the face of the clock. Later the clock will be joined by a 35-bell electric carillon.
