

Indonesian Calm Interrupted By Soldiers' Mutiny

JAKARTA (Batavia), U. S. I. Jan. 25.—(P)—A top Indonesian military chief today blamed a sudden guerrilla raid into the city of Bandoeng on a "mutiny" of native soldiers in the Dutch army.

About 800 armed fighters from the so-called private army of an outlawed former Dutch army captain seized key points in the big west Java city yesterday morning, but withdrew later in the day after bloody fighting.

A Dutch army spokesman said a Dutch general at Bandoeng, 120 miles southeast of Jakarta, had persuaded the guerrilla raiders to withdraw to avoid further bloodshed. Sixty Indonesian

army soldiers, including three high ranking officers, were reported killed in the fighting as guerrillas took over most of the city.

The Dutch army spokesman conceded that 300 Indonesian soldiers enrolled in the Dutch army had deserted. But he denied a statement by Col. Simalupang, acting chief of staff of the U. S. I. army, that the raiders were "mainly from the Dutch army."

It was evident the flareup involving the Dutch army at Bandoeng seriously blasted the bridge of friendship carefully built between the two countries in independence negotiations.

An official U. S. I. communiqué today said the situation in West Java was still "troubled and confusing." Attempts to restore peace were being made difficult by actions of several

Dutchmen, the communiqué said. The raid on Bandoeng, one of Indonesia's leading cities with a population of about 180,000, was the first outright revolt against the authority of the month-old United States of Indonesia.

The raiders were from a "private army" headed by R. P. P. (Turk) Westerling, a former Dutch army captain who was discharged in 1948. Westerling had issued an ultimatum that he would revolt unless his army was recognized as the official law enforcement agency in West Java.

Coplon-Gubitchev Espionage Trial Launched In N. Y.

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—(P)—A young, college-educated American girl and the Russian engineer with whom she says she once was in love went on trial Tuesday on a charge of plotting espionage for the Soviet Union.

The case is the U. S. government versus Judith Coplon and Valentin A. Gubitchev.

A panel of 95 persons was summoned to appear as prospective jurors in the trial, which has been delayed seven weeks while the defense fought a stubborn but losing battle to prevent it.

Judge Sylvester Ryan is presiding.

He also sat at the long, sometimes dramatic pre-trial legal skirmishes which ranged widely into international protocol, operating methods of the FBI, and legality of the arrest of the two defendants.

Defense Skirmishing Fails Attorneys for Miss Coplon, 28, and Gubitchev, 33, tried unsuccessfully to have the case thrown out, largely on grounds that it was based on FBI wiretapping evidence, which is illegal in federal courts.

Judge Ryan held there was sufficient evidence without the wiretapping records.

Gubitchev, third secretary of the Soviet ministry of foreign affairs, also staged a prolonged battle to avoid prosecution by claiming he was entitled to diplomatic immunity.

But Judge Ryan backed up by the State department and denied the claim.

Attorneys for the pair claimed their arrest, without a warrant, was illegal, but this move also was defeated.

The case has been vehemently denounced by the Moscow government, whose protests have been rejected by the U. S. and the United Nations, for which Gubitchev formerly worked, suspended him.

It is the second time that Miss Coplon has been called to account by her government.

Tried separately in Washington, she was convicted of stealing papers from the Justice department where she worked before she and Gubitchev were arrested at a New York rendezvous last March 4. Both now are free on bail.

Heavy Penalties Provided The indictment here, charging the pair conspired to try to transmit U. S. secrets to Russia, names Miss Coplon on three counts, Gubitchev on two.

If convicted, he could draw a maximum penalty of 15 years in prison and \$20,000 in fines, while she could get up to 35 years in prison and \$25,000 in fines.

Miss Coplon, an honor graduate of Barnard college, already has been sentenced to from 40 months to 10 years in prison on the Washington conviction. The case is being appealed.

In that trial, she testified that her meetings with Gubitchev were not for spy plotting, but for romance. She said she was in love with him until she learned he was married.

Minimum Wage Law Boon To Labor, Truman States

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—(P)—President Truman says he looks forward "to great and lasting benefits" from the new 75 cents an hour minimum wage law which went into effect today.

Asserting the United States will not relax its efforts "to provide a better life for all our people," Mr. Truman said the raising of the minimum rate from 40 to 75 cents an hour is "dictated by social justice."

The law to which the president called attention, was one of the key planks in his 1948 campaign. "Ours is a growing society," Mr. Truman said. "We cannot afford to stand still, and we cannot afford to have our legislation become outmoded."

He said the 40 per cent minimum wage standard had become "obsolete."

The president said the increase would affect 22,000,000 workers. Another amendment, he said, "will provide greatly increased protection for our young boys and girls against dangerous industrial work."
