MENINGITIS FIVE TIMES PHILADELPHIA (AP)—

Little Johnny Cavallieri, not three years old, already has won his fifth battle over meningitis. Doctors at Children's hospital, where Johnny is convalescing, said they doubted if medical literature listed any individual who suffered as many as five attacks of this severe disease.

Meningitis is an infection affecting the central nervous system. It involves the spinal fluid in the membrane surrounding the spine and brain. Doctors say that while on attack of meningitis doesn't make a person immune from another, it is rare when a person suffers a second attack.

Library Features Several Books On Timber Industry

Several books vital to Douglas county's main industry—timber—have been presented to Roseburg Public library by the Roseburg Lumber company in cooperation with the West Coast Lumberman's association. Miss Muriel Mitchell, librarian, announced Tuesday.

Sen. Guy Cordon has also recently sent a volume entitled "Trees," the yearbook of the Department of Agriculture, Miss Mitchell said.

"Trees," with the other volumes on timber production and harvesting, has been assembled in a display at the library called the Timber Shelf. The display was arranged by Clementine Armon, assistant librarian.

Realistically decorated with assorted pieces of wood, the books are arranged on an inside shelf. A display of the book jackets in the library hall calls attention to the shelf inside, which features such well-known authors as Stewart H. Holbrook and James Stevens.

Two Holbrook volumes, "Burning an Empire" and "Tall Timber," supplement his other books previously acquired by the library. Probably his best known work is "Holy Old Mackinaw," Miss Mitchell pointed out.

Two books by Stevens are also among the new volumes. They are "Timber!" "The Way of Life in the Lumber Camps" and "Paul Bunyan," a new edition with an added chapter, published by the Knopf company.

"Tall Timber" and "Timber! The Way of Life in the Lumber Camps" were written for the juvenile reader.

Other Volumes Listed
The Department of Agriculture yearbook is not merely statistics, the librarian stated, but contains many colored pictures and has real "eye appeal."

Other volumes contributed by the lumber company through the

courtesy of its president, Kenneth Ford, include "The Lost Wood; Adventures of a Naturalist," by Edwin Way Teale, and Roderick Peattie's "The Cascades: Mountains of the Pacific Northwest." "Now We're Loggin'," a humorous book filled with many facts on life in the woods, will be of special interest to many, Miss Mitchell said.

The Roseburg high school band is working on new music in preparation for its concert Feb. 16, under the close guidance of Director E. G. Stiles.

Stiles has procured enough music to present a well-balanced program of overtures and popular and semi-classical numbers. One of the big features of the concert will be a German band, a nine piece outfit which promises some good solo music, among which will be the popular "Schnitzelbank."

The program also features solos, quartets, brilliant concert marches, and some popular George Gershwin music. Stiles has been devoting much time to working with individuals and individual groups at his home and in the band building. Aid During Polio Told Kiwanis By Mrs. Lee Marsh

The shock of being told that she had polio that she could not even see her children before being hospitalized and the feeling that she might never see them again were described by Mrs. Lee Marsh before the Roseburg Kiwanis club Tuesday noon.

Mrs. Marsh has been appearing before various service groups in the interest of the infantile paralysis fund campaign. A victim of the dreaded disease slightly over a year ago, she stated: "I feel I owe my recovery to the quick action of the polio organization in getting me to the hospital for immediate care."

The knowledge that her doctor bill and hospital care would be paid for by the polio foundation was a great relief to her and to her husband, who had the responsibility of caring for the children during her absence, she said.

Del McKay, Roseburg polio chairman, emphasized the importance of this year's infantile paralysis campaign. He stated that the national treasury is \$5,000,000 in debt, and is faced with the grave problem of either stopping treatment for polio victims or stopping research. To discontinue research today might mean that a cure for the disease might never be found, he warned. McKay said he was told by the national polio director himself a polio victim that a virus had been found for one type of polio, and others are being sought.

The Kiwanis club is taking over the business district solicitation again this year. The work will be under the direction of a central committee, headed by Bob Bashford, who was in charge of Tuesday's program. Each committee member heads a group, which will have a specific section of town to cover.

A special feature of Tuesday's meeting, the room was divided into sections occupied by members of the various standing committee chairmen, as the first step toward working out an active Kiwanis year, according to Maurice Newland, president.

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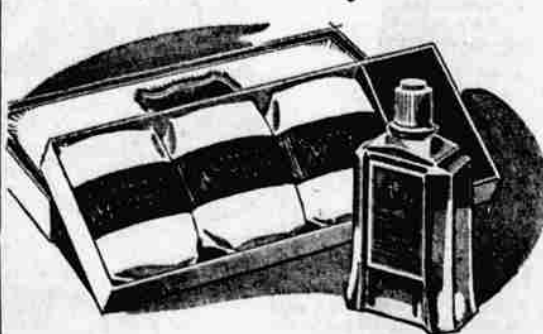
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
