

Hardrock Gordon Slated To Fight Johnny O'Neill At Portland Feb. 3

Roseburg's Babe Hardrock Gordon is slated to put in another ring appearance at Portland's civic auditorium, Friday, Feb. 3, when he meets Irish Johnny O'Neill in a scheduled 10-round clash of a double main event.

Gordon is still the talk of Portland fight circles because of his upset victory over Baby Dutch Culbertson. Later, Hardrock lost out to Bill Peterson on a TKO, but the Roseburg lad is considered by many to be a sure-fire ring attraction.

Gordon's manager Ernie Nazelrod said if his boy gets past O'Neill, the contract stipulates a return match with Joe Kahut for an Oregon heavyweight championship bout within 60 days. Kahut currently holds the claim to the Oregon title.

Plans are on the fire to match Kahut with Ezzard Charles in a June outdoor show at Portland. According to Nazelrod, Charles' backers are still waiting to see if Joe Louis plans to fight again, before taking any other offers.

Although Coach Art McLarney wouldn't say so in so many words, it looked in last night's drills as though Bremerton's Russ Parthermer has nosed out Bellingham's Hal Arnsen for a starting forward berth. Parthermer sparked Washington's second win over Oregon in Seattle last week and continued to scintillate in week-day drills.

Oregon, meanwhile, was preparing a warm welcome. They've won but three of 13 starts this season but all the wins have come on the Eugene floor.

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Penn State Tips Pitt In 'Freeze'

Pitt didn't stall this time. But it didn't make any difference. Penn State won again.

Last Saturday the Pitt basketball quintet played Penn State at State college, Pa., and failed to score a point in the first half. The Panthers froze the ball. Penn State led, 50, at the half and went on to win 34-21.

The scene shifted last night to the Pitt stadium floor in Pittsburgh. This time the Panthers made a game of it all the way before losing, 58-51. Penn State was ahead at the half, 23-20, but Pitt tied the score seven times in the second half before fading with the score tied at 50-50.

North Carolina State, Southern conference champs and ranked 10th nationally in this week's Associated Press poll, pulled away in the second half to rout Louisville, 79-53.

Joe Jordan sank 19 points, 14 in the first half on seven field goals, to lead Georgia to 67-55 triumph over Georgia Tech in a Southeastern conference fray at Athens, Ga. Georgia pulled away after Tech tied the score at 17-17 in the first half.

Dayton, which surprised at the start of the season with a string of ten straight victories, was upset by Baldwin-Wallace, 66 to 60, at Cleveland. It was Dayton's third defeat in 19 games.

Texas Wesleyan lost its second straight game on its eastern tour, bowing to Seton Hall at South Orange, N.J. 64-58. The Texans were ahead at halftime, 29-27.

Cincinnati walloped Ohio Univ., 76-51, in the Mid-America conference.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 26.—A high speed diesel-engine was entered today in the 500-mile automobile race to be run at the Indianapolis motor speedway May 30.

The car, now under construction, was entered by the Cummins Engine company of Columbus, Ind. Jimmy Jackson of Fort Hot Springs, Calif., who has been in the money in the last four races, was nominated as the driver.

The car is described as a rear drive, six-cylinder, four cycle supercharged creation. It has a piston displacement of 401 cubic inches, a bore of 4.125 inches and a stroke of five inches.

The diesel entry will have no concession except size when goes against gasoline-powered cars in the qualification test. It is 10 inches longer and 30 pounds heavier than the four-cylinder Meyer-Drake gasoline engine which swept to the top positions last year.

The first entry in the history of the speedway finished in 1931 without making a pit stop. The Cummins company withdrew from racing after seeing the engine's stamina had been proved. Cummins officials decided to return to racing after improvements indicated that increased speed could be combined with durability of the engine.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Jan. 26 — (AP) — Sam Snead may be the logical favorite, but the crowd today will be watching the fellow for whom the \$10,000 Ben Hogan open golf tournament here was named.

Most of the gallery at yesterday's pro-amateur preliminary followed Hogan, the bantam belt, whose fellow pros didn't think would recover from critical auto accident injuries before next summer.

He surprised them by tying for first place in the Los Angeles open although he later lost to Snead in the playoff.

Ben arrived here Monday with the flu as an added burden. It just about had him down the next two days.

But yesterday, after touring the Phoenix Country club course in even-par 71 figures, Hogan said he felt "100 percent better" and thought the flu was licked.

Ben's 71 was three strokes off the 68 fired by Snead, the 1949 golfer of the year, but it proved he was ready to go. And those rounds yesterday don't count in the 72-hole totals. Hogan still doesn't get the same distance on his drives that he did before the accident, and his game isn't just right. Nevertheless he appears well able to hold his own in the field he once reigned.

Yesterday's pro-amateur saw Johnny Palmer of Badin, N.C., team with Phoenix amateur Bill Sauffley for their second consecutive title. They had a best ball 63 with Palmer Carding a 67 medal score—beaten only by Lawson Little, Monterey, Calif., veteran, and Dale Anderson of Hinsdale, Ill., who both had 68.

At 68 with Snead were Henry Ransom, Toney Penna, and Fred Hawkins.
