Officers Chosen By Health Assn.

Members of the Mental Health association of Douglas county elected officers and a board of directors and laid plans to initiate a county-wide educational program at a meeting Monday night at the Roseburg Veterans hospital.

Dr. John L. Haskins, manager of the hospital was elected president of the group. Named first vice-president was Mrs. Esther Geddes and Julian Helleck, welfare department child guidance officer, was selected second vice-president. Laura Cummings of the public health office was elected secretary-treasurer.

Nine persons were named to serve on the association's board of directors, with terms of office ranging from one to three years. Nels Lindell, M.D.; Georgia Moss, R.N., and Carl Felker were named to one-year terms. E. J. Wainwright, M.D., public health physician; Al Neet, Myrtle Creek grade school principal, and Edith Pickens, R.N., were selected to serve two years. A three-year term of office will be served by Harold Schmeer, U.S. National bank president; Rev. Kenneth Knox, Christian church pastor; and Mrs. Olive E. Doerner, R.T. Committee appointments include Mrs. Geddes, radio and paper; Robert C. Johnson, schools; Dr. Haskins, Rotarians; Dr. Wainwright, Kiwanians; Rev. Mr. Knox, Roseburg Ministerial association; Dr. Lindell, medical groups; Bernice Smith, R.N., nurses association; Mrs. Doerner, granges and P.T.A.; and Carl Felker, veterans organizations.

The members indicated they would contact granges and other groups to offer services of speakers who will deal with the subject of mental health. Groups which desire speakers or further information are asked to contact Mrs. Laura Cummings at the public health office.

The association's next meeting will be held in the Veterans hospital recreation room Feb. 20. On the program will be a speaker and motion pictures.

60,000 Northwest Vets Get Loans

World War II veterans living in the Pacific Northwest and Alaska have obtained 60,607 GI loans for the purchase of homes and farms, or for business purposes, the Veterans Administration reveals. There are approximately 470,000 World War II veterans living in the area.

Total of the loans approved for veterans by the VA since March 28, 1946, has come to \$294,034,278, as follows:

Washington, \$192,090,263; Oregon, \$61,366,654; Idaho, \$22,545,383; Montana \$17,320,551; Alaska \$711,427.

Ninety-five percent of the loans were used to finance home purchases, the VA said.

The VA coupled its announcement with a reminder to veterans who have not yet used their G. I. loan entitlement that they have until July 25, 1950, to use this benefit—plenty of time to shop around for a good value before getting a G.I. loan.

The agency pointed out that it does not actually make loans to veterans. Veterans should apply directly to a bank, savings and loan association or other lending institution for their loan.

Veterans should furnish the lender with their original discharge papers when applying for a G.I. loan, the VA advised.

Daniel H. Clare Of Glendale Dies

Daniel Hankerson Clare, 80, died at a Eugene hospital Wednesday morning after a short illness.

He was a resident of Glendale, Oregon, and well known in lumbering circles, in which he and his sons have been identified for a number of years.

Clare was born in Lincoln county, Missouri, on March 10, 1869 and was married to Miss Janet Dimond in Missouri in 1894.

He was a member of Salubria lodge No. 31, AF & AM, Cambridge, Idaho; the Scottish rite of Eugene, Hillah temple, Ashland, and was a member of the Christian church since he was 21 years of age.

He is survived by his wife, also by three sons and a daughter, Leon and James Clare, both of Sacramento, Calif.; Dan F. Clare, Glendale, and Mrs. Lucille Stark, Eugene; a sister and three brothers, Mr. Bess Palmer, Frank W. John and Fount Clare; and seven grandchildren.

Services will be held in the Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral home, Friday, 1 p.m. Rev. Father Bartlum of the Episcopal church will officiate.

Closing services will be given by the Asalea lodge, AF & AM. Arrangements are in care of Stearns mortuary, Oakland.

The place of interment will be the Masonic cemetery, Roseburg.

Earlier Payment Of Corporation Taxes Proposed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26. — (AP) —Balancing the federal budget next year by making corporations pay their income taxes sooner was proposed by Rep. Mills (D-Ark.) Mills, a member of the tax-drafting House Ways and Means committee, said he will present his plan during committee consideration of President Truman's tax program.

Mills said: "It is highly discriminatory against the millions of individual income taxpayers, who now have their federal income taxes deducted from their pay check as it is earned, to permit corporations to continue to use government's money over the entire year after it is earned. "While it may not be feasible to place corporations on a completely current 'pay-as-you-go' basis, my bill would be an important first step in requiring corporations to pay taxes promptly as soon as it is possible to determine the amount of their tax liability."

Mills made a similar suggestion last year. Congress then took no action at all on general legislation, as it ignored President Truman's January, 1949, proposal for a \$4,000,000,000 tax boost.
