NEW YORK — (AP) — The husband and wife kissed and made up, and that ended the husband's kidnaping trial.

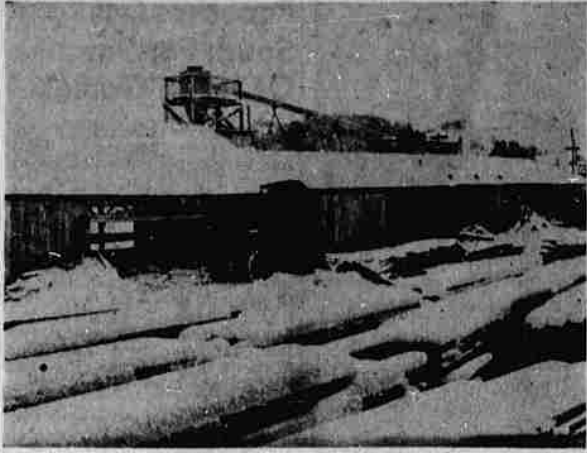
Last summer, Irving Horowitz, 35, a wealthy manufacturer, took his four-year-old son, Steven, to Israel.

The mother, Edythe, claimed she had custody of the child under a separation agreement.

A grand jury indicted Horowitz for kidnaping. He was arrested when he returned two weeks ago. The child was returned to the mother.

During his kidnaping trial, Kings county Judge Samuel S. Leibowitz called a conference in chambers.

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New Freight Cars Ordered By S. P.

Orders for 3,100 new freight cars have been placed by Southern Pacific, according to announcement by A. T. Mercier, president of the railroad.

Two thousand 50-ton box cars will be built by Pullman Standard Car Manufacturing company at Bessemer, Alabama; one thousand 50-ton automobile cars by Southern Pacific's own Sacramento shops and one hundred 70-ton drop-end gondolas by the Ralston Steel Car company at Columbus, Ohio. Mercier said. Deliveries are scheduled to begin in the spring and be completed by end of the year, the rail president said. They will raise to 23,630 the total number of new, post-war, freight cars acquired by the railroad besides half ownership in 8,000 new Pacific Fruit Express refrigerator cars and lift the railroad's postwar investment in new rolling stock of all kinds to a total of almost \$257,000,000.

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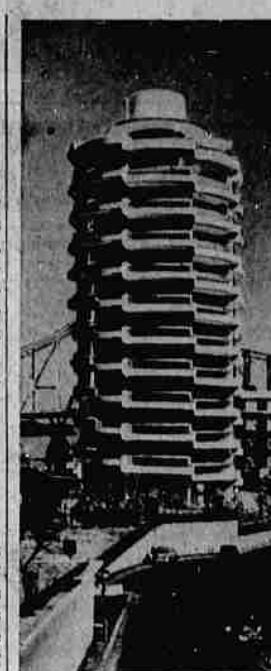

Heroic Acts Draw Carnegie Awards

PITTSBURGH — (AP) — A 20-year-old Kenyon college student who suffered severe burns in saving two friends during a fire Feb. 27, 1949, topped the list of 15 persons given awards by the Carnegie hero fund commission.

The bronze medals were distributed to men, women and children in nine states.

Recognition was given five heroes who lost their lives. In three of these cases, pensions of \$2,400 a year were granted. Death benefits of \$500 were awarded in another case. Payments of \$3,750 were made in eight instances for education, home purchases or other purposes.

The heroic college student is Edwin T. Collins, of Detroit, who saved two friends during a dormitory fire at the Gable, O., college.

Collins was credited with leaping four and a half feet from a third floor window to a fire escape platform after the other students had been trapped.

He then steadied the ladder, helping his friends reach the platform. Six students died in the blaze.
