The sandfly transmits the tropical disease known as dumdum fever.

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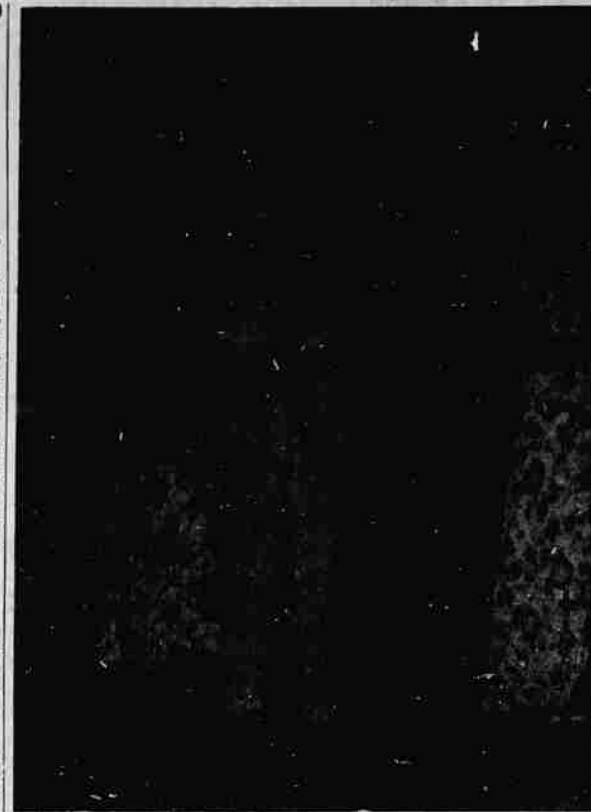

Man Sentenced To 20 Years For Death Of Child

TACOMA, Jan. 30.—(P)—William Vicory, 30, was sentenced to 20 years in state prison today.

The sentence was passed by Pierce County Superior Judge W. A. Richmond after Vicory pleaded guilty to manslaughter charges filed by Prosecutor Patrick M. Steele.

Mrs. Vicory, who faces manslaughter and non-support charges will appear in court today. The couple was arrested Sept. 13 after the infant, 15-month-old Laura Lee, died following her admission to Pierce County hospital. The baby had been severely beaten. The mother at that time claimed the tot had fallen down a flight of steps.

Vicory later admitted beating the child. The non-support charge, dropped when Vicory pleaded guilty to the higher count of manslaughter, involved mistreatment of another child, William, age 3. Investigators found the child covered with vermin, and was suffering from malnutrition. Since that time, under treatment by juvenile authorities, the boy has regained his health.

Judge Richmond termed Vicory's act "unbelievably despicable."

Gubitchev Says He Was Nervous

NEW YORK.—(P)—It was romance and not espionage that made Valentin A. Gubitchev jittery during a rendezvous with Judith Coplin, says his attorney.

The attorney, Abraham L. Pomerantz, made the assertion after two FBI agents testified that Gubitchev appeared uneasy when they trailed him to a meeting with Miss Coplin on Jan. 14, 1949.

Gubitchev, 33, Russian engineer suspended from his United Nations post, and Miss Coplin, 28, former Justice department employee, are on trial on charges of plotting to channel U. S. secrets to Russia.

The married Russian knew he was being trailed by strange men on Jan. 14, 1949, when he met Miss Coplin in upper Manhattan, Pomerantz said during cross-examination of FBI Richard T. Hradsky.

Hradsky conceded that Gubitchev's "behavior was that of a man who suspected somebody was following him" and that he appeared scared.

The defense claims Gubitchev feared discovery by his wife of his romance with Miss Coplin. But the government contends his furtive actions were the result of a spy conspiracy.

Four-Year-Old Downs Rivet, Then Coughs

OMAHA.—(P)—Four-year-old Garlin Young, playing with a toy construction set, slipped a rivet into his mouth and gulped. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Young, rushed the boy from their home in Wood Lake, Neb., to a doctor in nearby Valentine. On the doctor's advice, they drove 300 miles through the night to get Garlin to an Omaha hospital for an operation.

At the hospital, Garlin was waiting to be taken to the operating room when he coughed. Up came the rivet.

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Survey Shows The Boss Isn't Even Interested

LOS ANGELES.—(P)—Don't worry about how tight that pink angora sweater should fit. Millie! The boss isn't interested in sex, at least not in the office. A survey of 1,000 businessmen in Los Angeles discloses that the boss rates glamor far below his secretary's ability to perform her job efficiently. What the chief really wants in his gal Friday is that she be neat accurate, dependable, a conservative dresser, have a ready smile and a good sense of humor.

The survey, conducted by Woodbury College, turned up some "pet peeves" by the boss. Lack of punctuality, 149 employees said, irks them more than anything else. Gum chewing, said 131 others, tops the list, while 129 said sloppy appearance is a cardinal sin. Inefficiency, excessive smoking, prudishness, lack of originality and stupidity also were charged to secretaries.

The secretaries themselves were polled. They said they could stand a little more leadership, understanding, intelligence, tact and cooperation from Mr. Big. The gals said a sense of humor was the outstanding personality trait they look for in "acquiring" a boss. In the physical attribute department, charm, a nice smile and neatness rated one, two, three.

SUNDERLAND, Eng.—(P)—A stage strong man called Samson declared in court he is afraid of a woman.

She is Violet Hanson, petite 29-year-old bus ticket taker, who is five feet four and weighs 120 pounds.

"No man," said Samson solemnly, "is a match for a woman, however, strong he may be."

Samson—Joseph Besford in private life—had Mrs. Hanson arrested for "threatening to shove my eyes out." He said the argument began when he tried to pass through the front door of their apartment building just as she was trying to come in.

On the stage Samson holds an iron bar in his teeth and bends it into an arc. He lets two teams of nine men play tug of war with a rope looped around his sinewy neck. He has a truck carrying ten men run over planks laid across his powerful chest.

Washington leads all other states in pulp production, the pamphlet said.

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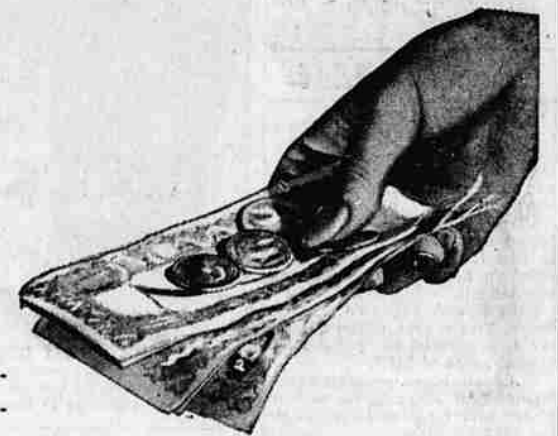
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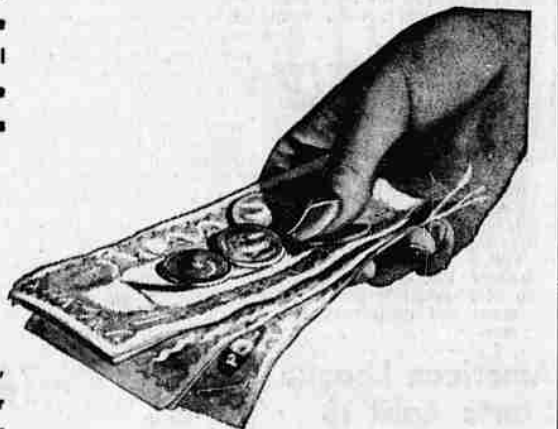
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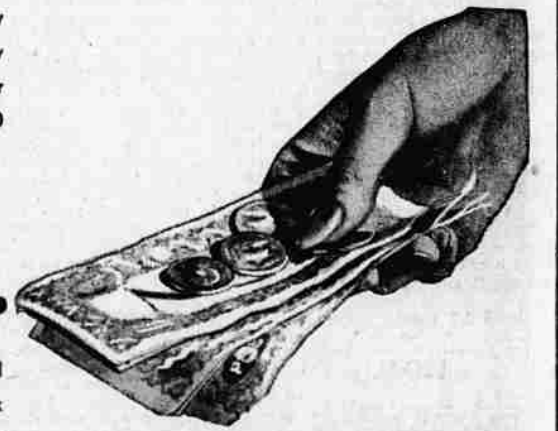
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
