## Fire Razes School Near Completion

TACOMA, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Fire swept through the almost-completed Lister school here yesterday, destroying the 12-room wooden structure with a loss "in excess of \$100,000," according to school officials. The building was to have been occupied early next month.

Supt. Howard R. Goold said the blaze started when an oil-burning salamander, being used to warm the building for workmen, was upset. The oil ran through the halls, swiftly spreading the flames to other heaters in the building. A workman, Peter Olson, was cut by glass as he fled through a window.

The building, located in Sallishan, a Tacoma federal housing project, made up one-half of a 24-room structure which is needed to ease the housing of pupils in the area. The uncompleted other half of masonry construction, was not harmed. It will not be ready before fall, however, Goold said.

## Hotel Successful In Water Search

NEW YORK.—(AP)—After searching for five weeks, a fashionable Park avenue hotel finally has found what it was looking for—a water well.

Spurred on by the city's water shortage, the Ambassador hotel had ripped a half dozen holes in its basement floors in the hunt for a well abandoned on the property by a brewery in 1915.

That was six years before the hotel was built on the site. Workmen tore up some more floor, and there was the eight-inch well casing, filled almost to its rim with water.

Engineers said the well would supply more than enough water to keep the hotel's air conditioning system going, if the city bans use of city water for such purposes.

"We may even have enough to do our laundry with," the management said.
