It's Official: Evashevski In

PULLMAN, Wash., Jan. 31.—(AP)—Washington State college made it official today: Forrest Evashevski is the new head football coach.

Appointment of the Michigan State college backfield mentor, disclosed exclusively by the Associated Press Sunday, was confirmed last night by Bob Brumblay, WSC athletic director.

Evashevski, who gained college fame as Tommy Harmon's blocker at Michigan, was signed to a five-year contract. Salary was not disclosed, but the same source who gave the early tip-off to the new coach's appointment said it would be in excess of \$10,000 a year. Brumblay said it would be among the highest ever paid a WSC coach.

The new head coach is expected to arrive on the Pullman campus by mid-February to lay groundwork for spring practice. A disciple of the single wing style of play, Evashevski will pick his own assistants.

One departure from previous regimes will give the newcomer to coast conference grid ranks four assistant mentors instead of three. Evashevski said one of these would be Dan Stabley, who he will keep in his present post as freshman coach at WSC.

Evashevski succeeds Coach Phil Sarboe who resigned the WSC post following the 1949 campaign. The Cougars won but three of nine games last season.

Holy Cross Again Takes Poll Honors

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—(AP)—"Sure, we think we're the best in the nation... and we'll keep on thinking it until somebody beats us."

The speaker? Lester Sheary, coach of unbeaten Holy Cross which today was voted the nation's top basketball team for the third straight week in the Associated Press poll.

"Team play has done it, too," Sheary said. "We use a three-platoon system, employing 15 players. After all, common sense says 15 men can outrun eight or nine."

The "triple-teaming" has added up to 14 straight victories for the classy New Englanders, who received almost 60 percent of the first place votes.

Although idle last week, the Crusaders were tabbed No. 1 on 92 of the 157 ballots cast by sportswriters and broadcasters throughout the country.

All told, Holy Cross totaled 1,446 points. Duquesne (14-0), Price of Pittsburg, placed second with 1,040 and 10 first place votes. The two leaders are the only major unbeaten teams in the country.

However, the top two face a busy week. Holy Cross tangles with mild Springfield tonight and Chicago Loyola on Saturday. Duquesne has two tough customers in Cincinnati and Louisville.

Bradley (17-3) registered impressive triumphs over Tulsa and St. Louis to advance from sixth to third place, close behind came Long Island University (14-2), in fourth.

St. John's of Brooklyn (16-2), which ruled the roost for several weeks, held its No. 5 spot, followed, in order, by Kentucky (14-4), Ohio State (12-3), La Salle (12-2), North Carolina State (15-3) and CCNY (10-2).

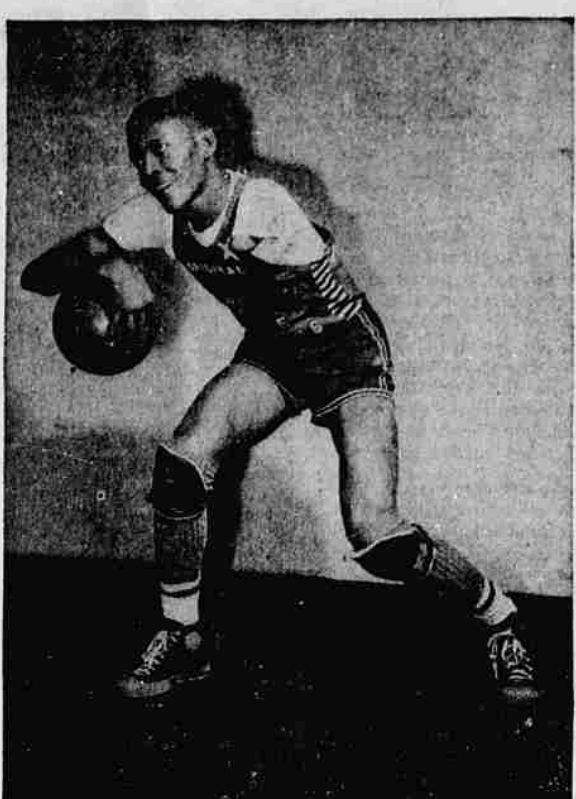
Kentucky, rebounding from a Notre Dame setback, conquered Xavier (O.) and Georgia, but fell from fourth to sixth. Ohio State, Big 10 kingly, made the big leap from the 13th slot to seventh with an important win over Minnesota.

Eighteenth-ranked LaSalle of Philadelphia dropped a peg, despite a resounding victory over Temple. North Carolina State, moved up a notch to ninth place, whizzing past Louisville and Virginia Tech.

City College of New York, the only club in the first ten without a first place ballot, slipped from eighth to tenth.

UCLA moved into 13th place with four first place votes. Washington, 16th last week but loser in two weekend games with Oregon, fell off the list completely.

Canyonville Loses To CBA Hoopers

George Mikan Named To Top Of Hoop Pile

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Eight years ago he was just a big awkward guy.

Today George Mikan was named the greatest basketball player of the last 50 years by sportswriters and broadcasters participating in the Associated Press mid-century poll.

It is significant that it seems hardly necessary to identify Mikan as the former DePaul university star now with the Minneapolis Lakers in the National Basketball association. Mikan has developed to the point where he is called by many "Mr. Basketball."

The electric lights on Madison Square Garden's marquee blink "George Mikan vs. Knicks" when the Lakers meet the New York Knickerbockers. That is symbolic of the mastery Mikan has achieved in the cage sport.

Holds Scoring Record
 Basketball Mikan, whose 53 points in one college game still stands as a Garden record and who holds virtually all the individual scoring marks in the NBA, polled 139 of the 380 votes cast.

Hank Luisetti, Stanford's whiz of 13 years ago, was very much in running. He got the runnerup spot with 123.

Luisetti averaged 16.8 points for 95 games during his college career compared to Mikan's 19.1 for 98 games. Luisetti's high one game mark was 50 points against Duquesne compared to Miami's 53 against Rhode Island State.

Mikan and Luisetti far outdistanced the others. Na Holman of the original New York Celtics and now coach of City College of New York, was third with 31.

Charley (Chuck) Hyatt, Pitt flash of 23 years ago, was fourth with 16 and Alex Groza, star of Kentucky's N.C.A.A. champions last year and now with Indianapolis in the NBA, fifth with 13.

Fulks Holds NBA Record
 Joe Fulks, of the Philadelphia Warriors whose 63-point single game mark in the NBA Mikan has yet to eclipse, and Forrest (Red) Debernardi, who placed with the St. Joseph (Mo) Hilliards in the twenties, each received seven votes and ties for sixth.

Two other members of the original New York Celtics—Joe Lapchick, now coach of New York in the NBA, and Dutch Dehnert, credited with inventing the modern pivot play at Chattanooga in 1926—tied for eighth. Each got six votes.

Bob Kurland, Oklahoma A & M's star of four and five years ago and now with the Phillips Oilers, completed the top ten. He received four votes.

In the 1945 Red Cross classic for the mythical national collegiate championship, Oklahoma A & M beat DePaul, 52 to 44, with Kurland getting 14 points to Mikan's nine. However, Mikan was banished on personal fouls after only 14 minutes of play.

Numerous others received one vote each, including Lew Beck, who finished at Oregon State in 1947.

Villemain, recent conqueror of middleweight champion Jake La Motta in a non-title bout, added prestige yesterday in outpointing Jean Stock, the French 160-pound champion, in 10 rounds.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Bernard Docussen's hopes for a crack at Ray (Sugar) Robinson's welterweight title have been sidetracked for the time being.

Docussen, New Orleans battler rated number three contender for Robinson's crown, lost a 10-round decision at the arena last night to Otis Graham, Philadelphia. He was rated to beat handily.

Docussen, who weighed 148—three less than Graham, had won 12 straight before last night and has dropped only five of his 80 professional bouts.

For Graham, the victory was his 39th in 49 pro bouts.

Docussen seemed in control of the fight at times, but frequently showed signs of being rusty. Graham took full advantage of these lapses to pile up winning points.
