**Dedication Of New 'Dorm' At U. Of O. Scheduled**

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—(Special)—Results of the university's first postwar construction program will be unveiled Feb. 11, with a formal dedication slated to open the new \$1,600,000 women's dormitory, remodeled Villard hall and theater addition, and the administrative addition to the school of music.

Official inspection and acceptance of the new buildings of the state board of higher education will be held the preceding day.

The women's dormitory, largest of the completed structures, will house 333 women and is of five-story brick and concrete construction. Villard hall, remodeled to house the speech and drama department, cost \$468,000 to complete and includes radio broadcasting facilities and a modern theater with seating capacity of 400. The sound-proof music school administrative addition will house faculty offices and provide some classroom space. It was built at a cost of \$195,000.

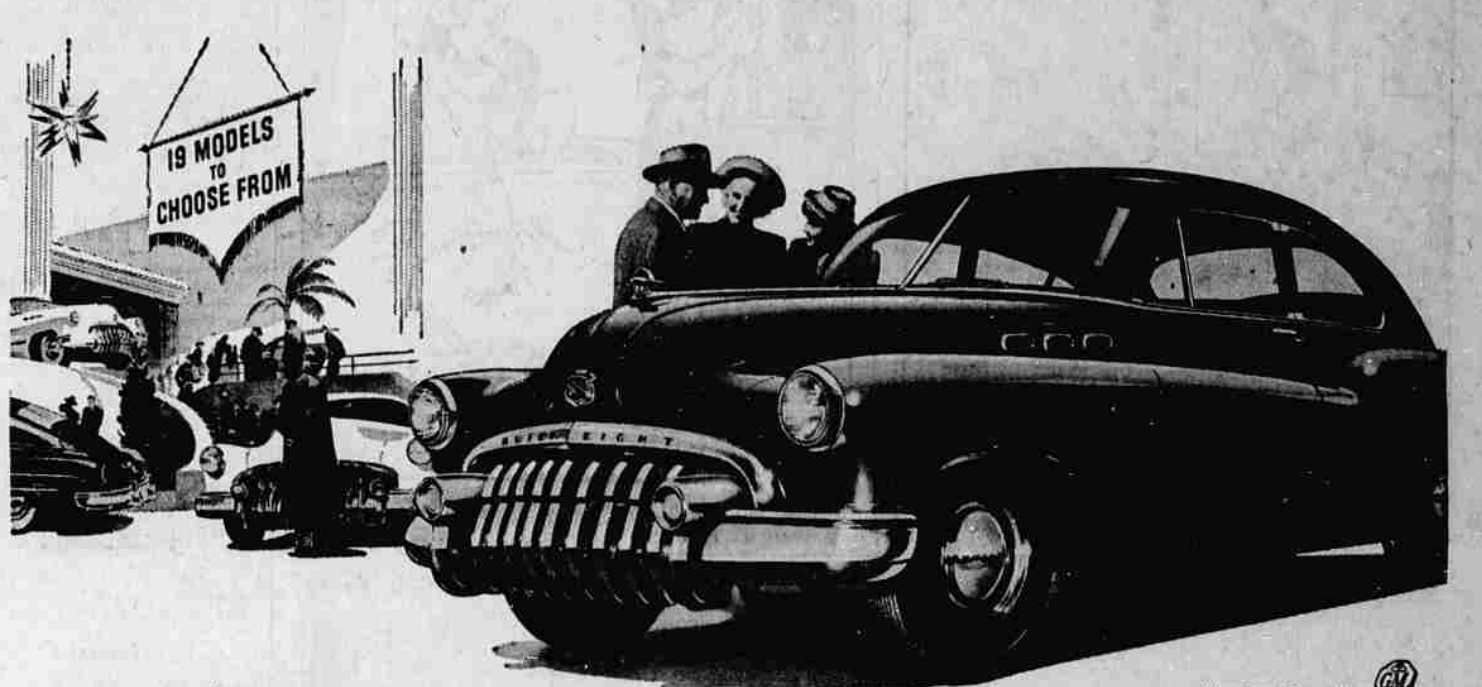
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
