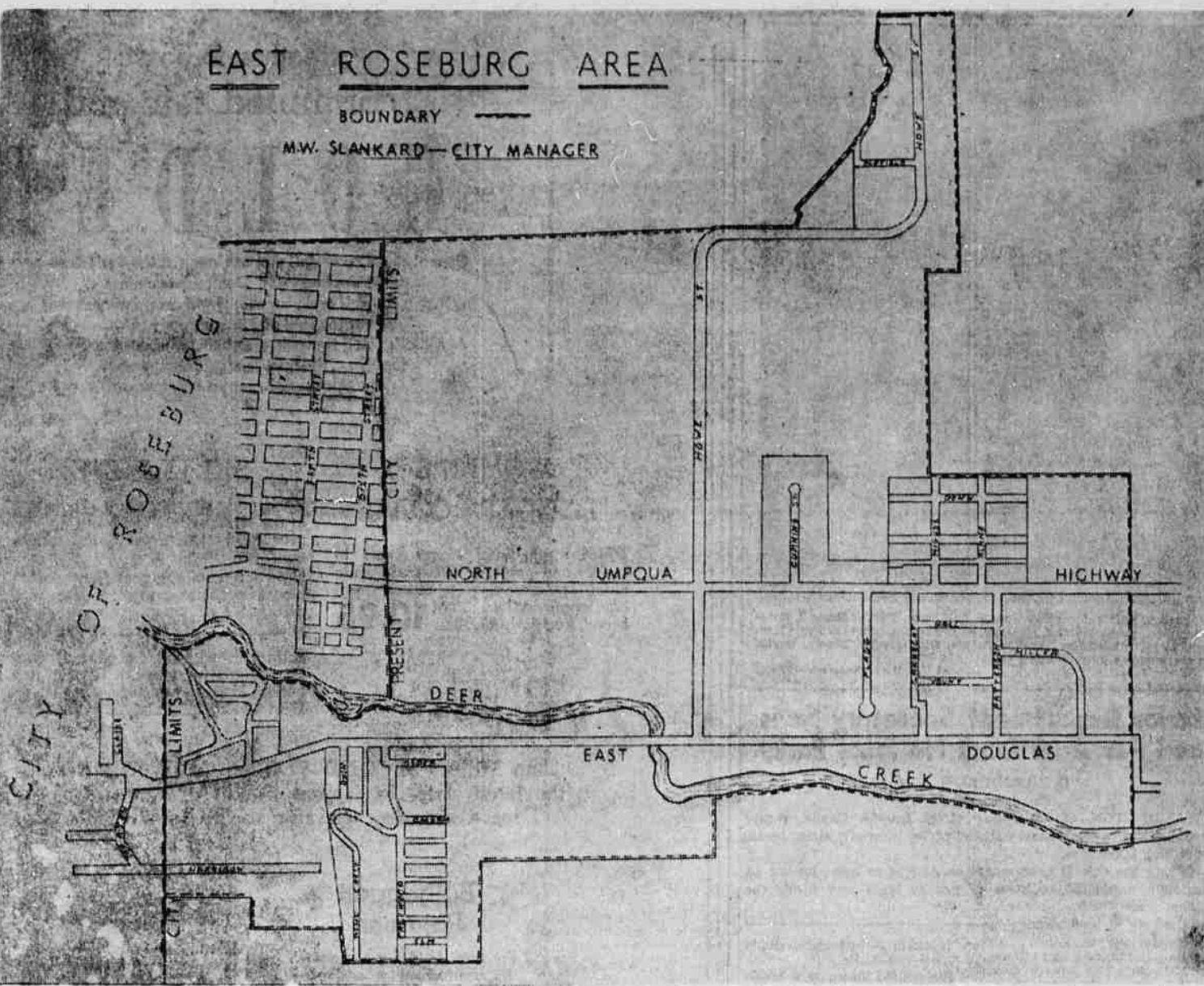

Salvation Army Advisory Board Members Named

New members of the Salvation Army advisory board were elected recently at the annual board meeting held at Turn-Around Inn. Named as chairman of the board for the coming year was Judge D. N. Busenbark. Vern Harpham was elected vice-chairman, Bob Franks as secretary and Jack Fariss will serve as treasurer. New members of the board include Joe Chamberlain, Tom Pargeater, Arthur McGehehey and Jack Adair.

Capt. Claude Bowden, in charge of local Salvation Army unit, itemized incomes, expenditures and activities of the local group, stating that more than 1,000 persons had received aid from the Salvation Army during the year, excluding activity during the Christmas season.

"This total included persons asking for information, advice, meals, lodging and clothing," Bowden said. The greatest number of requests were for clothing, with 2,193 garments given local persons and 183 transients being served.

During the Christmas holiday period, food orders were provided to 23 families, a total of 110 individuals. Fifty-eight toys were given to 26 children and 35 persons were given clothing. The Christmas party highlighted the season's activities, with 165 persons attending the first such event tried in this area.

During the year, a total of 2,654 persons attended adult meetings such as church services and Bible classes. The youth program showed a total attendance of 4,128.

Bowden reported only \$413.58 remained on hand at the end of the year after the \$10,000 income for the year was depleted by operating and special expenses. Bills amounting to \$450.85 face the local unit before payments on the new building are met. About \$1,000 is needed to complete the building and this will pay for paint, carpentry work and plastering. At present, cash in the building fund totals \$2.90.

Russia Rejects French Protest On Indochina

PARIS, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Russia today rejected France's note of protest against Soviet recognition of the rebel, anti-French regime in Indochina.

Soviet ambassador Bogomolov sent the French note back to the foreign office with a statement that "the government of the U.S.S.R. does not consider it possible to receive such a note."

The French note was a sharply worded warning that Russia's recognition of the Ho Chi-minh regime in Indochina would "gravely impair Franco-Soviet relations."

France said in the protest that the recognition of the Moscow-trained Ho Chi-minh's guerrilla government was a violation of international law.

French troops have been fighting a jungle war with Ho Chi-minh's forces in Indochina for three years.

Ho Chi-minh's regime has been recognized by the Chinese Communist government of Mao Tse-tung, and has been accused by the Nationalist Chinese of receiving active military aid from the Communists.

CHINA SOLD OUT
By State Dept., Dillard Charges

That the U. S. State department's program is not one of appeasement but a deliberate "sell out" to the Communists and directed by Molotov is the general consensus of Chinese Nationalists and Americans and British in the China war theatre.

This was the opinion of the Orient. Dillard spoke Tuesday noon before the Roseburg Kiwanis club.

The Americans are accused of liberating the bottled up Communists in southwest China, permitting them to march north to Manchuria for rearming by the Russians, then to begin their slow march south to overrun China, he said.

When the Americans pulled out of Tsingtao, this was all the incentive the Communists needed to continue on, and the same move broke the spirit of the Nationalists, he said.

Dillard's talk was mostly along the same lines as that which he delivered before the Chamber of Commerce Monday. A news report appears on page one in today's News-Review.

"Name them," said the prosecutor.

"Well, with Justice Rutledge of the United States Supreme court," Kenny answered.

"Now dead," Donohue added. Kenny said "Yes."

Donohue wanted to know "Did you sponsor a dinner of the American Youth for Democracy, which was the success to the Young Communist league, in 1945?"

"Yes, I remember that dinner," Kenny testified. "I went with Gen. Evans Carlson of the U. S. marine corps."

"Now dead," Donohue snapped.

"Yes," said Kenny, "and with Frank Sinatra, now alive."

Donohue inquired if it had been correctly reported that Kenny had been acting with counsel in defense of William Schneiderman, California Communist party secretary in 1939.

"Yes," said Kenny, "that counsel was Wendell Willkie."
