Weekend Terms In Jail Penalty Meted Chiseler

TACOMA, Feb. 2 — (P) — Elmer H. Thompson is one Tacoma man who can turn down an invitation with this excuse: "I just can't make it Saturday night—in fact I don't have a weekend free for a year."

Thompson is the recipient of a novel jail sentence handed down by Superior Judge Bartlett Rummel. He must spend weekends in jail for one year, pleaded guilty to a charge of fraud, admitting that he drew unemployment compensation checks over a four month period while he was employed.

Deputy Prosecutor Neil Hoff said the sentence was devised to accord some punishment for Thompson, and at the same time allow him to continue supporting his family. Thompson is father of five children. A sixth is expected next week.

Under terms of the sentence, Thompson will report to the county jail each Sunday at 1 a.m., and will be confined there until 7 a.m. Monday.

Potential Humane society members kept the office telephone receivers hopping Tuesday morning submitting suggestions to announcer Lyle Fenner for feeding our snowbound friends, the birds. Because the high price steps up the cost of woolen goods, even here. Sale of wool in this current 1949-50 season will bring something like 250,000,000 pounds Australian (about \$550,000,000) the average price per pound this season so far is \$4.73 cents Australian (50.17 cents).

Look back over the last 20 years. In the 1929-30 season wool sold brought 32,800,000 Australian—about one-eighth of this year's expected income. In 1930-31 income from wool slumped to 28,200,000 Australian. In 1936-37—the best pre-war year—it was 60,200,000 and even in 1946-47 it was only 92,300,000.

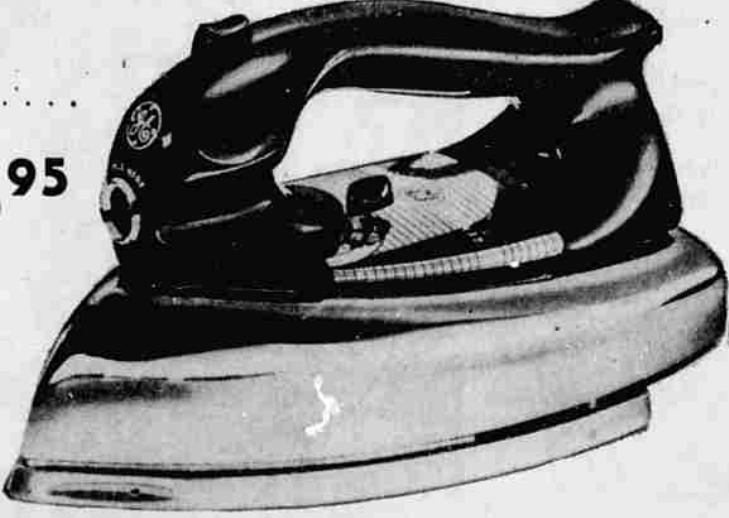
