

Daylight Saving Time
Scheduled in Portland

PORTLAND, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Portland will have daylight saving time this year from April 30 to Sept. 24.

The city council has approved the dates unanimously. Last year the change was made to conform to California and eastern cities.

The state law to prevent daylight time unless proclaimed by the governor is inoperative because it was referred to the people. The vote will be next November.

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Library Offers Many Books On Crafts And Sports

In response to a seasonal demand for "How-To-Do" books, the Roseburg public library this week is displaying a selection of technical and popular volumes. They cover many subjects: auto repair, electric wiring, cabinet work, painting, paper hanging and plumbing; horseback riding, hockey and skiing, also veterinary science for the amateur. Or would you like to play canasta? Oswald Jacoby tells how; and the library has him.

For the sheet metal worker here is an illustrated book of pattern layouts intended as a complete shop guide. For the fireman, a handbook of 650 pages which should get him up there and down again in safety and efficiency. For the expert or the novice who uses a slide rule, here is a small volume which explains applications, and helps to figure complicated problems in a jiffy.

For the man or woman with no great technical training but with a bit of leisure and a creative impulse, here are hours or months of delight. Such books as "Wood Carving and Whittling," "Amateur Painter's Handbook," "The Fun of Sketching Outdoors," and many others. "Holiday Handicraft" reminds us that no Christmas is over, it is time to start making valentines and gadgets to commemorate Lincoln, Washington and good Saint Pat.

For the very young there are likewise plenty of hobby books. "Fun-time Crafts" by Schwalbach and a whole series by Caroline Horowitz, starting with "A Treasury of Play Ideas for Tiny Tots" and winding up with "Treasures of Things-to-Do" for older boys and girls.

The books are supplemented by magazines which may be borrowed and perused in the comfort of home. Popular Mechanics, Popular Science, American Home, Hobbies, are among those which give the reader something to keep him busy until gardens sprout again.

The long-awaited December issue of Consumer Reports finally arrived. This annual issue gives "best buys" in hundreds of items from air conditioning to yeast. One's pet dentifrice or shampoo sometimes turns out to be "not acceptable," which is rather a shock. Best way to counteract damages done might be to work on Crampton's book, "Start Today! Your Guide to Physical Fitness." Looks strenuous, but after all, what about last month's resolutions?
