Cook Baked Beans With New Flavor

Dried beans, plentiful now, are a low cost source of protein. Give them to the family often, but try this different way of cooking them.

Home Baked Beans

(6 servings)
Two cups pea beans, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1 pound salt pork, 1 small onion, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup brown sugar, one 8-ounce can tomato sauce, 1 1/2 cups (12 ounces) beer or water.
Pick over beans; wash. Soak overnight in cold water to cover. Drain; cover with fresh cold water; add soda; simmer, covered, until tender. Drain; rinse with cold water. Scald pork with boiling water; scrape rind; cut through rind at 1-inch intervals, making cuts 1-inch deep.
Put onion in 2-quart bean pot or casserole. Add beans. Bury pork in beans so that only rind is exposed. Combine salt, mustard, pepper, brown sugar and tomato sauce. Add beer; mix well. Pour into bean pot. Add enough boiling water to cover beans.
Cover bean pot. Bake 6 to 7 hours in slow oven (300 degrees F.) adding boiling water as needed, to keep beans covered. Remove cover during last hour to brown beans and pork.
Eggs are plentiful also. Cook them differently too.

Pork Patties Good For Sunday Dish

Pork tenderloin patties are full of flavor and belong in the economy meat group, too. There is no waste on them either. Served with fresh vegetables, they make a good Sunday dish.

Braised Pork Tenderloin Patties

Flour patties and brown in a little fat in a skillet. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, add desired additional seasonings and a small amount of liquid. Cover skillet tightly and cook slowly until tender, 35 to 40 minutes. Below are a list of seasoning suggestions for varying the flavor of the patties:

1. Top browned patties with chopped onions. Use bouillon or tomato juice for the liquid in place of water. Add 1 teaspoon thyme or marjoram to the liquid, if desired.
2. Braise the browned patties in thin, mild flavored barbecue sauce, bottled or homemade (1 cup catsup, 1 cup water, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 1 tablespoon brown sugar, 1 table spoon Worcestershire sauce).
3. Use diluted mushroom or tomato soup for the liquid and add a little chopped onion and a pinch of sage.
4. Use pineapple juice or canned pineapple syrup as the liquid. Add a little allspice.
5. Cook according to basic recipe above, then after patties are tender, add 1 cup sour cream to drippings in pan, thin with a little water, heat, season to taste, and pour over patties to serve.

6. Cover browned patties with thin slices of onion and top each with a tablespoon of chili sauce. Add a little water to the pan before braising.

Easy Chicken Casserole

(6 servings)
Two 15 1/2-ounce cans spaghetti and tomato sauce with cheese, 1 1/2 cup water, 1 1/2 cups cubed cooked chicken, 1 1/2 cup chopped raw green pepper, 3/4 teaspoon salt, dash pepper, 1 tablespoon butter or fortified margarine, 1 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs.

Heat oven to 375 degrees F. (moderate). Chop spaghetti into 1 1/2-inch pieces; add water. Blend in the chicken, green pepper, salt and pepper; place in a greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. Melt butter or margarine; pour over bread crumbs. Top casserole with buttered crumbs. Bake at 375 degrees F. for 25 minutes.

Sausage Rice Casserole

(Makes 6 servings)
One and one-half cups (3/4 pound) sausage meat, 1 1/2 tablespoons rich prepared mustard, 3 tablespoons sifted flour, 2 cups cooked unsalted rice, 2 cups (No. 2 can) tomatoes, 1 1/2 cup chopped green peppers, 1 1/2 cup chopped celery and leaves, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt.

Roll sausage meat into 12 small firm balls. Spread with the rich prepared mustard. Dredge with flour. Brown all sides on medium heat. Remove from pan and keep warm. In same pan combine the remaining ingredients. Heat thoroughly. Serve topped with the sausage mustard balls.

Angels on Horseback

(Serves 6 as appetizer—3 or 4 as main course)
Drain 1 pint large oysters. Lay each oyster across 1 1/2 slice of bacon. Sprinkle with chopped parsley, cayenne pepper and paprika. Roll bacon around oyster and fasten with toothpick. Place oysters on a rack in shallow baking dish. Bake in preheated hot oven (450 degrees F.) for 10 minutes, or until bacon is crisp. Serve hot.

margarine, 1/2 cup flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, few grains pepper, 1 8-ounce can tomato sauce, 2 cups milk, 1 cup beer or water, 6 hard-cooked eggs, halved, one 6-ounce can mushrooms.

Melt butter or margarine over low heat. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Add tomato sauce, milk and beer. Cook, stirring constantly until thick and smooth. Add eggs and mushrooms.
