Roseburg showed up fine in the second half, outscoring their opponents 24-15 points, but the Indians could not keep up in the first two quarters and were outdistanced 30-1 at the half.

The Indians made 13 out of 20 free throws to Medford's 13 for 22. Buddy Matthews led the locals with nine points. He made seven at the free throw line. Jack Morin again paced his teammates with 11 points.

Tonight, the Indians go to Myrtle Point for a makeup game. Tuesday, Sutherlin comes to Roseburg for a Douglas division game.

A Canadian black bear, weighing nearly a quarter ton, proved too much for wrestler Leo Wallick Saturday night at the Roseburg armory. After a torrid, but comparatively short struggle, the bear easily pinned its opponent, amidst roars of approval from a capacity house.

Mayor Al Flegel, who refereed the grim battle between man and animal, came well-prepared.

All Decked Out In his baseball umpire's uniform, complete with knee guards, chest protector and mask, he was relatively safe from any surprise move from the furred grappler from the Canadian woods.

Once the bear scrambled toward the general Roseburg mayor and the latter started to scramble for Myrtle Creek, without the formality of resigning from his civic position, but the bear again started tussling with Wallick and Flegel resumed his officiating duties.

In a three fall semi-final, Ted Bell, talented New Jersey mat man, beat villainous Tony Ross here for the first time after a brief vacation from Roseburg mat circles.

Bell took the first fall with a rolling short arm scissors, then Ross evened the count with shoulder butts and a body press in the second fall, but Bell took the match, by putting Ross in a reverse surboard in the final stanza.

In a one fall preliminary, George Dusette, substituting for Lee Grable, downed Billy Fox, ex-marine and owner of the bear, with a full nelson.

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ND-Leading WSC Tackles Ducks Tonight

Washington State's Cougars put their northern division lead on the counter tonight and tomorrow when they collide with the Oregon Webfoots in the appetizer on this week's Pacific Coast conference basketball menu.

Hostilities will take place on the Cougar floor, but if Oregon should happen to win both games it will lift the Washington Huskies into first place.

The Webfoots have shown flashes of brilliance on occasions this season. In fact, it was they who knocked the Huskies out of the lead two weeks ago and put Washington State in. Now, they're in position to put reverse English on the same stunt.

Ducks Drop Two If Oregon performs like it did this past weekend, however, the Cougars needn't worry. The Webfoots dropped two games to lowly Idaho, 62 to 44, and 44 to 34. These are the Vandals' only two league triumphs so far.

Friday, Washington State invades Oregon State, while second place Washington opens a two game inter-sectional series with University of Wyoming. Oregon entertains St. Mary's on Saturday.

Washington, which dropped a 56-46 decision to Oregon State Friday night, bounced back strong Saturday with five starting players going the distance for a 52-44 victory. The Huskies were never behind after breaking from a 9-9 deadlock.

Louie Soriano poured in 19 points to lead the Washington Beavers with 12 counters.

Foul shots provided the margin of difference between the two clubs, OSC hitting eight of 16 and Washington collecting on 18 of 25.

At Moscow, it was a case of Oregon being colder than Idaho. The Vandals hit 13 of 65 shots—enough, however, to offset Oregon's 11 buckets in 80 attempts.
