Ski Jumping Has New Star

LAKE PLACID, N.Y., Feb. 6.—(AP)—The sport of ski jumping, which enjoys a limited popularity among competitors, had a brand new star today. He is Hans Bjornstad, a 21-year-old Norwegian youngster who was mentioned only as an afterthought by the experts in forecasting the results of the world championship here yesterday. If you'd ask them about him, they'd just say: "He is a good jumper."

But Bjornstad outshone them all yesterday, achieving both the best form and the best distance. It's an exceedingly rare combination for one skier to excel in both. He jumped 224 and 223 feet in his two trials on the Interlake Olympic hill and showed such perfect form that the judges gave him 18 1/2 points each, a very fine score. Bjornstad's total—on form and distance—of 220.4 points gave him a six-point margin over another rank outsider, Thure Lindgren of Sweden. The week before Bjornstad had placed only sixth and Lindgren 31st. After Bjornstad, the longest jumper was Art Devlin of Lake Placid, who made 220 and 219 feet and placed sixth with 211 points. The Norwegians dominated the event so completely that seven of the eight placed in the first ten and their last man was 15th. The United States got three jumps into the first 15 and Sweden and Finland two each.

Three-Point Method Adopted

SPOKANE, Feb. 6.—(AP)—A three-point method of determining the fourth team to battle it out for Washington's one spot in the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball tournament was decided here yesterday by the district committee. The first three places in the district tournament will be filled by the two top Evergreen league teams and the state's top independent team. The fourth playoff squad will be either the third place Evergreen squad for the second-ranked independent team, depending on their comparison by the following points:

Competition with each other; record of play with district teams; and complete season record on a win-loss basis. Should these three points fail to bring a clear-cut decision, the two clubs would battle it out for the district playoff berth.

St. Louis Bowler Takes Top Prize

CHICAGO, Feb. 6.—(AP)—A 24-year-old St. Louis bowling teacher took time off from classes to win the \$5,000 first prize in the nation's richest meet—the Petersen classic. Tom Hennessey stepped to the line in the 18-day firing Jan. 29 and rattled off an eight game 1,651. That score withstood efforts of 1,792 bowlers from all parts of the country.

Many of the best were crammed into the windup last night. But they got the jitters and failed even to crack through the first 10. Following Hennessey were John Hanis, Kansas City, Kas., with 1,625 for second place and \$2,500; Stan Slomenski, Newark, N. J., with 1,609 for third and \$1,500; and Carl Lundquist of Tulsa with 1,603 for fourth and \$1,200.

There is more money waiting Saturday for this foursome. They qualified for the special \$5,000 four-game bonus rolloff, the Petersen anti-climax which pays \$1,000 to high scorer of each game and \$1,000 for the high total.

The \$3,000 top award in the concurrent Don de Vito meet, which attracted 1,152 bowlers, went to Harry Lippe, a 15-year veteran of Chicago's classic league.

Lippe uncorked a sensational 1,721 last Friday. It easily withstood the closing rush.

George Pickering, also of Chicago, took second money of \$2,500 with 1,704. Jack Zack of Lackawanna, N. Y., collected \$2,000 for third with 1,689.

West Virginia State To Play Prisoners

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6.—(AP)—West Virginia State college's basketball squad will get a taste of the sportier side of prison life tonight.

They enter San Quentin penitentiary for a game with the prison quintet. It will be the first time a major college basketball team has played at San Quentin which has one of the world's largest prison populations. The West Virginians are national Negro collegiate champions.

Earning Reports Requested From Farm Trainees

Annual reports of their earnings during the past year are due from all veterans taking institutional on-the-farm training under the G.I. bill, according to an announcement from the Veterans Administration.

The VA said there are 9150 veterans in the Pacific Northwest now taking farm training from whom reports will be required. Reports should be sent to the nearest VA regional office.

Failure to submit the reports before the deadline, the VA warned, may result in suspension of subsistence payments until such time as the reports are received.

The earnings reports—covering only income from productive labor for the calendar year 1949—are used by the VA as the basis for adjusting each veteran's subsistence for the current year.

Annual earnings reports are based on the farm accounting records kept by the veteran trainees as part of their course of instruction.

Farm trainees received the necessary VA report forms early this year.

Veterans Buy 40 Cabins At Scottsburg Project

With the worst weather conditions existing in many years, veterans braved icy roads to purchase the forty cabins offered for sale at the Scottsburg project by the Housing Authority of Douglas County on Saturday morning. H. L. Scofield, executive director, announced today.

Two-Mile Runner Aims At Record

BOSTON, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Now that Curt Stone has been forced to run an 8:55.1 two-mile race, the fastest of his career, at this early stage of the indoor track season, he is predicting an 8:50 record-breaking performance this winter.

The Philadelphia Circulation manager failed to indicate just what distance, made back in 1943, But on the form Stone has displayed the past two weeks, he appears to be the best possibility, provided he continues to be hard pushed by such competent rivals as FBE-agent Fred Wilt of New York, and Horace Ashenfelter, another star Philadelphia.

Wilt finished 15 yards behind in second place and Ashenfelter was 20 yards back when Stone turned in Boston's second fastest indoor two-miles in Saturday night's 61st Boston A.A. meet. Rice had an 8:53.4 timing here eight years ago. Viljo Heino of Finland, claimant of the world's 10,000-meters record making his American debut, wound up in sixth place.

The outstanding competitor award—the John J. Hallahan memorial—was bestowed on Yale's mighty Jim Fuchs, who came up with the longest 16-pound shot put ever made indoors—57 ft. 6 1/2 in. John Joe Barry, the American-born Irish star, won the famed Hunter mile in the mediocre time of 4:13.4.

Committee Rejects Night Horse Racing As Tempting

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 6.—(AP)—A committee of horse racing officials reported unfavorably today on night horse racing, claiming that racing under lights would tempt "many persons who cannot afford to gamble."

The committee reported to the National Association of State Racing Commissioners that night racing would give the sport a temporary shot in the arm. But it added that it would be "the most unwholesome thing that can happen to the sport and eventually can be its death knell."

Roy Patience of Crescent City, Fla., a member of the Florida Racing commission, sent the report as chairman of the commissioners' association. He was unable to appear personally at the association's first foreign convention here.

PORTLAND, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Tennis professionals Jack Kramer and Pancho Gonzales play here tomorrow night in a singles match that continues their cross country tour. There will be another singles match between Frankie Parker and Francisco Segura, with Bobby Riggs and Kramer meeting Segura and Gonzales in a doubles match.

WSC To Enter Rodeo Field

PULLMAN, Wash., Feb. 6.—(AP)—A collegiate rodeo was added to the spring sports schedule at Washington State college today.

Campus cowboys from 20 colleges in the west are expected here in May for the first annual WSC buck and bulldog jamboree sponsored by the school's Hackamore club.

The Hackamores are charter members of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo association. They said their show will include all the major rodeo events—bull dogging, bronc busting and calf roping.

The club plans to build a special arena near Pullman for the rodeo. Stockmen and contract performers have assured the sponsors that they will provide services at cost.

Montana State college, the University of Montana, Fresno State, California Poly and the University of Wyoming have active rodeo clubs but entries are expected from almost all colleges and universities in the western states. The exact dates for the rodeo have not yet been determined.

British Columbia Takes Ski Honors

BANFF, Alta., Feb. 6.—(AP)—A one-two finish in the downhill gave University of British Columbia skiers top billing today in the weekend three-team fight for honors in the fourth annual international collegiate ski meet at nearby Mount Norquay.

The Canadian squad garnered 235.5 points, 1.2 more than Seattle university which dominated both Saturday and Sunday's slalom runs. Utah finished third with 231.4 points.

Don Walker, Seattle, topped individual honors with a first in the giant slalom, second in the regular slalom and eighth in the downhill.

Gordie Cowan and George Merry were UBC's one-two finishers in the downhill.

Scores of other teams included: Eastern Washington 269.6; Montana 242.6; College of Puget Sound 241.6; Alberta 217.3.
