OSC's Taylor Is Happy There

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 8.—(P)—The University of Iowa sent a feeler toward football Coach Kip Taylor of Oregon State college, but Taylor said today he was happy here.

Taylor reported that Iowa athletic director Paul W. Brechler phoned him from New York Monday night to ask if he and his staff would be interested in the football job at Iowa. Iowa's coach, Dr. Eddie Anderson, resigned and took the Holy Cross position.

Taylor didn't say exactly what he told Brechler, but presumably he said he wasn't interested. In a statement Tuesday he said he and the staff "are happy at this institution."

He said he viewed the call as a compliment to OSC and to the coaching staff, but he said he liked the OSC policies, the enthusiasm of the student body and the understanding of the alumni. He said he looked forward to Oregon State becoming one of the real powers in coast football.

Dr. A. L. Strand, OSC president, said he was "not surprised" that other institutions had an eye on Taylor and his staff, but "we hope they stay with us a long time."

The football staff here has two years to go on a three-year contract.

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Leahy Explains Gigantic 'Offer'

DETROIT, Feb. 8.—(P)—Coach Frank Leahy of Notre Dame came up today with his explanation of a story that he had been offered a 10-year, \$100,000 per, contract to coach pro football.

Leahy, here for the Detroit Times' quarterback dinner last night, said the story apparently grew out of a discussion he had in a New York restaurant a couple of weeks ago while dining with friends.

This was Leahy's version: "We were just chatting about football when one of the party, a man who has no connection with any professional team, said he'd be glad to pay me \$50,000 a year to coach a team if he had one."

"We all laughed and I told them seriously that at one stage of my career I had been offered a 10-year contract at \$50,000 a year to handle a pro team. I turned that one down."

"I told the people at the dinner party that I was happy at Notre Dame and was going to finish my coaching career there."

Leahy then continued: "The friend who had made the dinner statement about wanting me \$50,000 a year wound up things by saying he'd get me even if it took \$100,000 a year. That is apparently the germ from which the story was generated."

"That's all there was to it," Leahy concluded.

Cougars Push Oregon Ducks In ND Cellar

PULLMAN, Wash., Feb. 8.—(P)—Washington State college enjoyed a 1½-game lead in the Northern division basketball race today — thanks to a fast break and the point-making of senior Ed Gayda and sophomore Gene Conley.

The two shotmakers accumulated 36 points between them last night as the Cougars romped to a 64-43 victory over the Oregon Ducks. It was the latter's fourth defeat in five nights and dropped them into the division cellar behind Idaho.

Oregon trailed only 32-27 at half-time but Conley and Ted Tappe teamed for 13 points to run the count to 45-33 early in the second half to doom the Ducks. Oregon just couldn't stand the pace of the WSC fast-break.

Gayda led all scorers for the night with 19 points, 14 in the first half. Conley posted 17, all but six coming in the final period.

Jack Keller's 15 points were high for the Oregonians.

Williams Gets Highest Salary

BOSTON, Feb. 8.—(P)—Ted Williams, it appears, used fewer words to get the highest salary in baseball history — an estimated \$125,000 — than the average 300-hitter does for a \$500 raise.

"There was absolutely no dickering," said the Red Sox slugger, after signing the 1950 contract which calls upon millionaire owner Tom Yawkey to pay him an American league's outstanding performer an eight-million dollars during the comparatively short stretch from April 18 through Oct. 1.

"I've never had any financial arguments with Tom Yawkey or Joe Cronin during my career in the Red Sox organization," the lanky slugger explained. "The luckiest break I've had in my life came when the Red Sox bought me."

"Tom Yawkey is the most generous owner in baseball. He, Eddie Collins (The Williams discoverer) Joe Cronin and Joe McCarthy are the best men to work for I've ever heard of."

Williams, however, will not divulge his salary figures. And neither will any of the club's executives.

Based On Hints
As a result, the eight-million dollar estimates are based on hints dropped by Williams' intimate friends and tiny informative leaks.

Last season, according to such reports, Lanky Ted drew a \$90,000 base salary that was boosted by at least two attendance bonus clauses. And the Red Sox set a new club attendance record of 1,598,650 last season. That probably put another \$15,000 into the Williams' bank account.

The experts figure Williams will have about \$70,000 left after paying federal income taxes.

Two Yugoslavs Enter Esmeralda Ski Meet

SPOKANE, Feb. 8.—(P)—The list of international ski stars entered in the annual Esmeralda ski meet lengthened today with addition of Yugoslavia's two top snowbirds.

The country's No. 1 and 2 skiers, Anniz Pold and Karel Kianznik, are now competing at Lake Placid, N. Y., but advised Esmeralda officials yesterday they would be on hand for the Feb. 18-19 event at Mount Spokane.

Earlier, Fritz Tschannen of Switzerland, had announced his intention of entering the event. Tschannen holds the world jumping record with his 393 foot leap.

The Great Atlas, Hollywood's newest gift to the feminine wrestling fans, has announced his refusal to meet Frankie Stojack if the former Washington State college football star and ex-collegiate mat champion, used an airplane spin. Although the Roseburg wrestling commission is of the opinion there is nothing illegal in the use of the spin, "Mr. America" has flatly refused to meet the erstwhile coast light-heavyweight champion.

Matchmaker Elton Owen said that Atlas saw Stojack in action recently and fears the airplane spin. Stojack, who was booked against Atlas, is burned and is now more than ever before anxious to meet the muscular Atlas. But in the meantime Stojack will team with Ted Bell in an Australian tag-team match against Paavo Katonen and Bob Cummins, the Seaside wrestler who will be making his first appearance here in some months.

Dusette vs. Gray
Owen announced that Georges Dusette, great French-Canadian matman, will meet Karl Gray, Milwaukee stylist, in a one-hour three-fall preliminary to open Saturday's weekly mat card at the Roseburg armory.

Stojack will be making his first appearance since last fall and the appearance of the popular Tacoma matmaster is expected to attract one of the largest crowds in weeks.

He will have a superb partner in Bell, the talented Jersey City grappler who last week upset Tony Ross with his amazing backward body drop.

The Durable Finn
Katonen, the durable Finn, is considered one of the finest fundamental wrestlers in the business, and he has a fine teammate in Cummins, the former member of the military intelligence service in Europe who had such a grand record during World War II.

The two teams possess just about everything in the way of wrestling technique—power, speed and finesse. Stojack and Bell will be slight favorites, however, because of Bell's recent triumphs throughout the state.

Members of Glisson's family said he suffered a broken collar bone, and possible concussion.

"Adam" suffered a broken leg and was destroyed. Jockey T. McGonigal, up on "Adam" was shaken up while Charles Bright, riding "Wise Policy," suffered minor contusions.

"Invercork," owned by Mrs. V. A. Guerrero, won the race.

Glisson is a brother of Gordon Glisson, leading jockey in the nation last year.
