Sockeye Salmon Grounds Under Canadian Ban

VANCOUVER, B. C., Feb. 10.—(AP)—The rich sockeye salmon grounds off the Fraser river have been declared "off limits" for foreign fishing fleets and for American and Canadian seiners.

The action was taken by the International Pacific Fisheries commission.

It held that territorial waters off the Fraser, extended "indefinitely westward" and were not confined to the three-mile limit.

The ruling closes to seiners the area west of a line from Bonilla point to Tatoosh island between the 48th and 49th parallels.

Prior to the ruling, fishermen had regarded the region west of the three-mile limit as the "high seas" and had made rich hauls by intercepting sockeye before they reached the gulf and river mouth.

Armory Wrestling Opener To Feature Six Matmen; Ted Bell, Stojack Top Bill

Douglas county mat followers get another bonus wrestling show at the Roseburg armory Saturday night—an Australian tag team match and a full-length opener featuring six of the best-known matmen in the business.

The show opens at 8:30 p.m. with Georges Dusette, veteran French-Canadian, meeting Karl Gray, fine fundamentalist from Milwaukee, in a three-fall, one-hour battle.

Dusette, who beat Billy Box with his full-Nelson last week, will match his tremendous shoulder and arm strength with Gray in an effort to gain another match against the Great Atlas and a possible title tilt against Al Szasz for the coast junior heavyweight championship. Gray is no pushover. A superb workman with a good background of holds, Gray has developed into a rough-and-tumble grappler during the past few months and might give Dusette a rough time.

Major interest, however, centers around the tag-team tilt—Frankie Stojack and Ted Bell meeting Pavlo Katonen and Bob Cummins.

All four matmen possess great stamina, which is of vital importance in a tag match where endurance is the first requisite. Because the tag event continues without a let-up the competitors are permitted to call on help from teammates—who are able to tag their partners from the ring corners. Substituting is important and the wrestlers who use good judg-

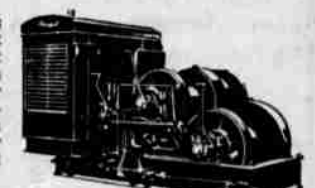

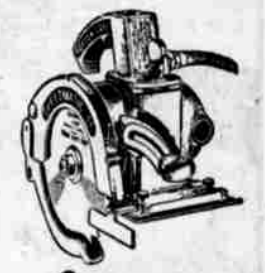
