Serve Roast Duck With Fruit Sauce

Try a fruit sauce or relish with your next roast duck. You'll like it. Here are two easy but delicious ones:

Spiced Cranberry Pear Sauce
(Makes about 1 quart sauce)
One cup sugar, 1 cup water, few whole cloves, piece stick cinnamon, 1 tablespoon wine vinegar, 1 firm pear, peeled and diced, 2 cups fresh cranberries.
Combine sugar, water, spices and vinegar in saucepan and bring to boil. Add diced pears and cook gently for 3 or 4 minutes. Add cranberries and continue cooking until berries pop, about 5 minutes. Cool in saucepan. Chill before serving.

Tangy Cranberry Relish
Two cups fresh cranberries, 1 lemon, quartered and seeded, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup honey.
Put fruit through food chopper. Stir in sugar and honey. Let stand to blend flavors. Chill before serving.

At the request of many readers, we reprint notes on duck cooking by Mabel Stegner, home economist for Long Island Duck Growers' association:
You don't have to prick the skin of a duckling because the fat will cook out anyway. Also, trussing, basting and covering are all unnecessary.

It isn't necessary to leave the fat out of your favorite stuffing recipe because very little of the duck fat will cook into it. Modern low-roasting temperatures are best for duck. For the juiciest, tenderest meat, roast duck at a low temperature (325 degrees F.) about 1 1/2 hours for a well-done duck.

If you like a crispier, browner skin, just run the duck under the broiler a few minutes before serving. You can use the giblets to much better advantage if you cook them in 2 cups salted water for about 45 minutes, then use the broth for gravy, or save for soup or a sauce.
A roast duck will serve from 4 to 6 persons.

When In Doubt—Make Lemon Pie

When in doubt about pie make it apple or lemon. Then you'll be safe. Here's a new lemon pie recipe:

Famous Lemon Pie
(Makes one 9-inch pie)
Three tablespoons cream-style cornstarch, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1 1/2 cup lemon juice, 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind, 3 eggs, separated, 1 1/2 cups boiling water, 1 (9-inch) baked pie shell, 6 tablespoons extra sweet white corn syrup.

Combine cornstarch, sugar, lemon juice and lemon rind. Beat egg yolks; add to cornstarch mixture. Gradually add boiling water. Heat to boiling over direct heat and then boil gently 4 minutes, stirring constantly. Pour into pie shell.

Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Gradually beat in the white syrup. Spread meringue over top of pie, carefully sealing in all the filling by spreading meringue to touch all edges of crust. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) 4 to 5 minutes or until browned. Cool on a cake rack away from drafts. Serve cold.

Here's a good fruit dessert, especially after a heavy meal:
Banana Apricot Delight
(Six servings)
One cup dried apricots, 2 cups water, 1/4 cup sugar, 3 to 4 ripe

Gilbness Fails To Save Indian From Prison Term

NEW YORK, Feb. 10 — Nelson Cassell, 72-year-old American Indian, is a smooth, fluent speaker, but not smooth enough to save himself from prison for life.

An all-male jury Wednesday convicted him of attempted burglary after a Brooklyn trial in which Cassell rejected services of a court-appointed lawyer and acted as his own attorney.

As a fourth offender—who already has spent 28 years in prison—Cassell faces a mandatory life sentence.

Kings county Judge Samuel Leibowitz told him: "You displayed a gilbness here that I have never seen the equal

Note: Canned or leftover stewed apricots may be used.
