Ship Plants Disclosed A spokesman for the ministry of supply disclosed last Wednesday Britain is planning the construction of atomic energy plants for ships.

The spokesman did not say whether it was a naval project, but said the atomic engine would be small enough to be carried by a destroyer.

AP Reporter Dies Of Cancer

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Howard Dobson, 36, Associated Press congressional reporter, died last night at Mt. Alto Veterans' hospital here.

Dobson, born in Lake City, Iowa, was stricken last fall and entered the hospital shortly before Christmas. He was unanimously elected vice-president of the Washington Newspaper Guild while in the hospital.

Doctors told him just before he entered Mt. Alto that he had but two months to live.

"Dobby" took it with courage and amazing good cheer. AP columnist James Marlow wrote what a lot of Dobson's friends felt Christmas eve, though he didn't use Dobby's name. Maybe you remember that column:

"A man in my office has cancer. He's 36, a veteran, married, with two children, one 12, one 9. He's been buying a home in the woods seven miles from Washington. . .

"I went to see him the other day. He knew life was being chewed away inside him. He had lost weight until he looked like the ghost of a ghost. His right arm was useless, his left arm almost useless.

"He looked at the bright window and through it at the bright trees outside, stirring in the crisp winter wind. 'It's beautiful outside,' he said. It was his way of saying: 'That's the world out there, I love being alive in it, but I may not be out in it much again.'"

Well, this is the follow up to Marlow's column. Dobson is dead. There wasn't anything that money or doctors could do.

Two Women Die In Flood

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 11.—(AP)—Two women died in the slowly ebbing floodwaters of the Cumberland river here early today.

Homicide detective George Balthrop identified them as Ella May Brandon, 36, and Winona Harris, 22, both of Murfreesboro, Tenn., Negroes.

The women were passengers in an automobile which ran into big water on a flooded street. The car stopped in about three feet of water, but rolled on into a depth of six feet while two male companions were seeking help, Balthrop said.

The deaths were the first flood casualties here since the Cumberland left its banks several days ago.

The flood waters were falling slowly here today, but still were creeping higher at downstream Clarksville.

Record In Congress, Rather Than Platform, To Count With Voters, Republicans Assert

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—President Truman apparently intends to bear down again this election year on the Republicans' lawmaking record—not what they say.

Mr. Truman told his news conference he thinks the Republicans' record speaks better for itself than any platform they can write. Strangely enough, there were Republicans who agreed with him.

A reporter told Mr. Truman a statement of principles issued by the Republicans this week had picked "liberty vs. socialism" as the chief issue for their campaign to gain control of Congress in the November voting.

Which was the president for? The newsmen asked. Mr. Truman said he had read the GOP platform but didn't understand it, adding that it's the Republicans' record that will tell the story to the voters in this year's congressional elections.

In his 1948 campaign for the presidency, Mr. Truman made a great point of what he called the bad record of the Republican dominated 80th Congress.

Mr. Truman's 1950 statement that it is the record which counts, found agreement among some Republicans, particularly those dissatisfied with their party's statement.

Senator Ives (R-N.Y.), who voted against the declaration, told a reporter that he, too, believes the Republicans must stand on what they do in Congress and not on any promises they make in a statement of principles.

"However, I don't agree with the president if he is belittling the danger to the country of the administration's present drift toward socialism," Ives said.

Record Will Count Senator Hendrickson (R-N.J.), another critic of the GOP statement, said he thinks people will pay more attention to the Republican record in Congress than they will to any party declaration.

"The average voter is going to take what you do rather than what you say as indicating your real stand," he said.

There has been doubt that many of the Republicans running for national office this fall will follow the new platform closely in their campaigns.

However, Senator Brewster of Maine, chairman of the GOP senatorial campaign committee, said he thinks that 80 percent of the Republicans will support 80 percent of the declaration. He added that it is about as good as anyone can expect.

So Far, Vatican Sees Khaki, Blue

ROME, Feb. 11.—(AP)—The greatest number of Rome's holy year pilgrims so far have come wearing khaki and blue.

Between 1,500 and 2,000 American soldiers and sailors on furlough from European occupation areas and ports have visited the eternal city since the Vatican opened its year of pilgrimages on Christmas eve. Almost all of them have had audiences with the Pope whether they were Catholic or not.

The main flow of organized American church pilgrimages, however, is expected to begin March 1. New York's Cardinal Spellman will lead one of the first large groups, an estimated 800 Catholics.

To date civilian American church pilgrims have arrived in groups of only 10 and 20.

The American Catholic church and USO club near St. Peter's square arrange guides and tours. As far as possible it reserves rooms for them. The center has been designated by the holy year central committee as the agency in charge of arrangements for American military visitors to the Vatican.

Soviet Charges Denied By U. N.

LAKE SUCCESS, Feb. 11.—(AP)—A spokesman for U. N. Secretary General Trygve Lie has denied Russian charges that the FBI is using certain U. N. officials to obtain information.

The charges were made by Soviet Delegate Jakob A. Malik, who implied in a letter to Lie that Assistant U. N. Secretary General Byron Price, wartime chief U. S. censor, was one of the FBI sources.

Declaring that Lie has full confidence in Price, the U. N. spokesman said "no responsible official of the secretariat is 'used' by the FBI for obtaining information concerning the internal affairs of the secretariat as alleged in Mr. Malik's letter."

Price told to newsmen to telephone that "the statement on behalf of Mr. Lie covers the matter." The spokesman said Lie is studying the records of the espionage trial in New York of Valentin Gubichev and Judith Coplon to check Malik's statement that testimony had proved the FBI had tapped telephone conversations of Gubichev and other U. N. employes.

10-Day Court Order Issued in Coal Strike

(Continued from page One) has been enforcing in the mines, forbidden.

There was no immediate reaction from the UMW on either court order.

A spokesman at the union headquarters said only: "We're waiting to hear from Mr. Lewis."

The temporary restraining order covers four main points: These would enjoin the union against continuing the strike "in whole or in part," direct the union to order the workers to cease their strike immediately; enjoin both sides against encouraging or causing lockouts, strikes or work stoppages; and order the UMW and the operators to engage in free collective bargaining in good faith for the purpose of resolving the dispute.

Inclusion of the operators in the bargaining and lockout provisions made the order a double barreled one.

Lewis, the union, and all its "appropriate officers" are directed to "forthwith instruct, and take all appropriate action as may be necessary" to see that the court's orders are carried out.

Emergency Injunction Assistant Attorney General H. Graham Morrison applied to federal Judge Richmond B. Keech for an emergency injunction as provided for in the Taft-Hartley act when the national health and safety is threatened.

The application followed right on the heels of another injunction order signed by Judge Keech directing Lewis to drop four major demands in his negotiations.

Judge Keech said there is a probability that these demands are "unfair labor practices."

The Indonesian funds are earmarked largely for motor trucks, railroad rolling stock, structural steel, road machinery and other materials needed to get the former Dutch East Indies back into full production as a major supplier of many raw materials.

The loan was negotiated by the Indonesian economics minister, Dr. D. Djundana, who was due to start back to Batavia this weekend.

Indochina in prewar days was one of the world's principal rice-producing areas. American and French policy is to try to restore stability and get the country back into full production, as well as to keep it out of Communist control.

(Continued from page One) rson in 1949. But 146 pounds per person is far below the 1947 eating record of 155 pounds per capita, even if it is far higher than the prewar average of 126 pounds a year.

More Fresh Vegetables More fresh vegetables are expected to be available, although fewer onions and less cabbage. Generally speaking there will be around 14 percent more fresh vegetables than in 1949.

There will be fewer chickens and possibly a reduction in milk, ice cream and butter. But there will be more turkeys, and more eggs.

Expressed in food values, the nutritionists sum it up this way: You will get about two percent more of the goods that make energy and about the same amount of the stuff that provides important vitamins.

But the nutritionists don't like the milk situation. They said less whole milk and cream is being used for the fifth consecutive year and this is reducing the amount of calcium in the American diet.

Calcium is a mineral people need for teeth, bones and other body equipment.
