Rafael Sabatini, Noted Novelist, Claimed By Death

ADELBODEN, Switzerland, Feb. 13 — (P)—Rafael Sabatini, the Anglo-Italian writer whose swash-buckling Captain Blood thrilled millions of readers, died here today. He was 75.

The author of more than 40 historical novels published since 1904, Sabatini had suffered for years from stomach ulcers. His last book, "Turbulent Tales," was published in 1946.

His best-known works included "The Sea Hawk," "The Snare," "Scaramouche," "The Black

Swan" and three books on the adventures of Captain Blood. Many of his novels had been filmed.

Besides historical romances, Sabatini wrote several histories. Among them was "Torquemada and the Spanish Inquisition," for which he read through numbers of the records of tortures inflicted during the Spanish Roman Catholics' campaign against non-Catholics.

He also wrote five plays. Sabatini was born in Italy. His father was an Italian singer. His mother was an Englishwoman. The writer became a naturalized British citizen in 1918. His first wife, whom he married in 1905, divorced him in 1931. Their son, Rafael Jr., had been killed in a motor accident in 1927. In 1935 he married Mrs. Christine Dixon. She was at his bedside when he died.

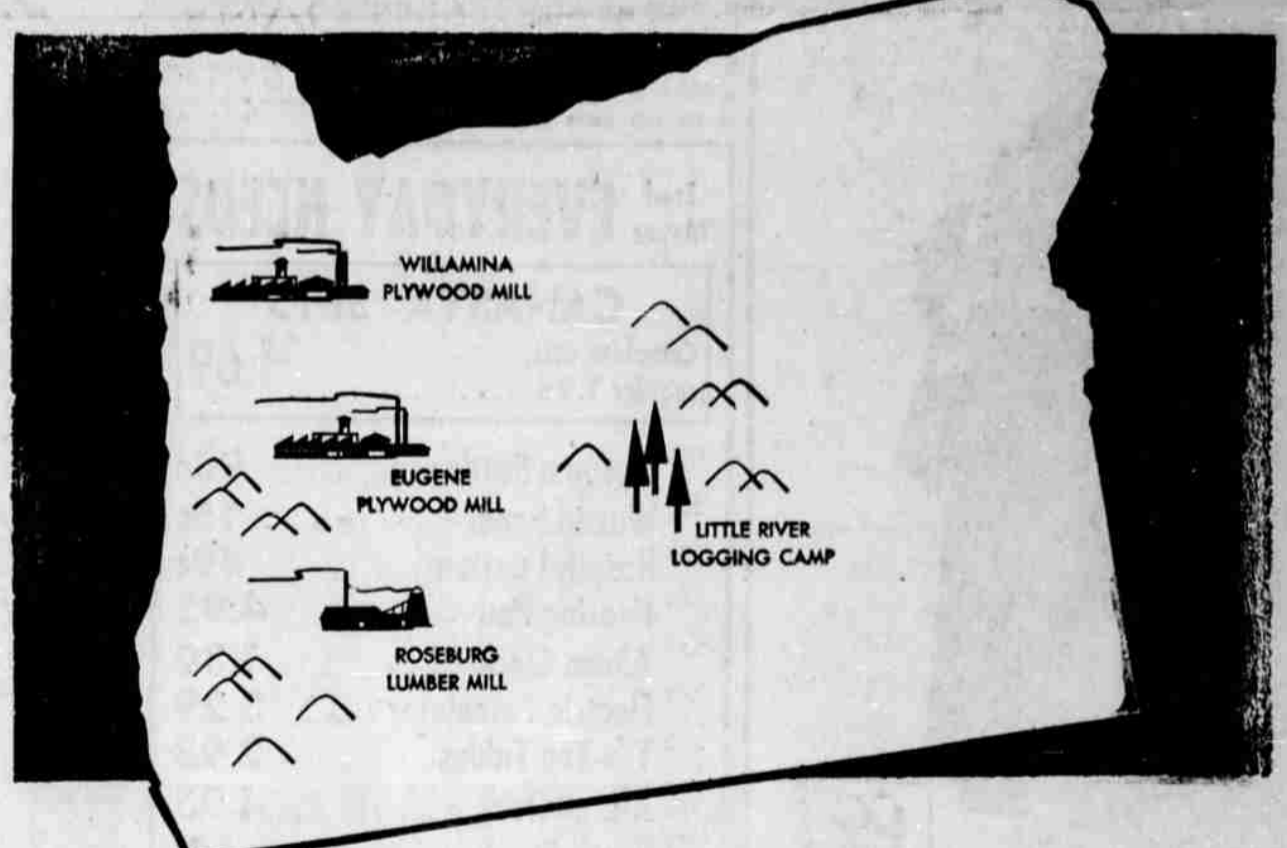

Personal Property Tax Reminder for 1950

Personal Property declaration forms were sent out Jan. 1, 1950, with a request for their return before March 2, 1950. Please give this your immediate attention.

Section 110-349, OCLA 1941 reads as follows... "The assessor shall cause blank forms for such returns to be prepared and distributed, but failure to receive or secure the form shall not relieve any such person, managing agent or officer from the obligation of making any return herein required... All returns filed under the provision of the section shall be confidential records of the Assessor's Office."

Section 110-608, OCLA 1941. "Any such person, managing agent or officer who shall with intent to evade taxation, refuse or neglect to make any return herein required and to file it with the assessor within the time specified or as extended shall be subject to a penalty of Ten Dollars \$10.00 per day of the continuance of such refusal or neglect..."

Household furniture, domestic fixtures, household goods and effects actually in use as such in homes and dwellings, where not used for business or commercial purposes, are exempt from taxation and should not be reported on this form. Exemption also applies to wearing apparel, watches, jewelry, and similar personal effects actually in use.

These forms may be obtained by calling at the Assessor's office, or will be mailed upon request.
