

Show Girl's Body Found in Creek; Paramour Held

BISHOP, Calif., Feb. 14.—(AP)—An early marriage that ended in divorce, an affair with a married man, then death—that's the story of 18-year-old Marilyn Smith, pretty drum major and ice show skater.

Marilyn's body was found Friday night in Bishop Creek. An autopsy showed the girl was pregnant and that she had died by drowning. It also disclosed a bruise on the right side of her head.

Charles Leonard Schneelock, 35, known here as Charles Snow, is being held without charge pending an inquest. Sheriff Charles P. Cline said Schneelock told him that he

'Multi-Million Dollar' Snow Covers Nebraska

OMAHA, Feb. 14.—(AP)—A "multi-million dollar" snow covered most of Nebraska Monday.

The snow ranged up to 13 inches at Ainsworth in north central Nebraska and in general covered the eastern two-thirds of the state.

There was considerable drifting but all main roads were open. Some schools were closed.

State federal crop statistician A. E. Anderson in Lincoln hung the "multi-million dollar" price tag on the snow.

"I don't know what there is about snow," he said, "but it seems to act as a sort of tonic in the wheat, doing more good than the same amount of moisture or rain."

Press Conference Of Oregon Lists Variety Of Topics

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene — (Special) — Research and developments in the field of photo-engraving will be discussed at the Oregon Press conference here Feb. 17 by Kenneth C. Coffman of Chicago, the man who developed the Kenyon engraving process.

Seven other speakers and three panels are slated for the two-day meet. Speakers will include Chancellor Paul C. Packer of the Oregon state system of higher education; Marshall N. Duns of the Oregon Journal; Dr. Ivan Nagy of the political science department in the university; Dr. Laurence R. Campbell of the school of journalism; Dr. Roy C. McCall, head of the university's speech department; and a representative of the Bureau of Advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers' association.

Among editors and publishers of the state who will attend the conference is Eric W. Allen Jr., son of the late Dean Eric W. Allen, founder of the school of journalism in the university. Allen will represent the Medford Mail-Tribune.

The Eric W. Allen memorial fund, which will this year bring Marquis Childs, noted columnist, to the campus, was established by the newspapermen of Oregon as a tribute to the former journalism dean. Among the objectives of the fund are the promotion and advancement of the science and art of journalism, the establishment and support of research projects in the field of newspaper practice, and the stimulation and analysis of conditions affecting the press.

This is the 31st annual press conference for this state. The meeting is sponsored by the University school of journalism and the Oregon Newspaper Publishers association.

Russia Accused Of Scrap Embargo

BERLIN — (AP) — The Western powers have accused Russia of imposing an embargo on shipments of scrap metal from Berlin to Western Germany.

A letter from the three Western Allied commandants of Berlin told Maj. Gen. Alexander Kotikov, chief Soviet officer here, that the Soviet-directed reischbahn (railway) on Jan. 21 had forbidden all scrap shipments by rail except those to Eastern European countries.

"We are not prepared to accept this situation," the letter said, adding that the commandants expect "that shipments of scrap metal, duly authorized by the proper authorities, will continue as before to have free passage to Western Germany."

The formal Allied complaint said the Soviet action indicated "an intention on the part of the Soviet authorities to impose an outright embargo on shipments of scrap metal from Berlin to Western Germany."

It was the second Allied protest within a month against confiscation of Berlin scrap bound for West Germany.

An earlier complaint against impounding of 11 truckloads of scrap brought a flat rejection from Kotikov. He said the material had been "stolen" from enterprises in East Germany.

The Allied letter termed the latest Soviet action a "clear violation" of the Paris agreement of June, 1949, ending the Russians' major blockade of Berlin.

That agreement, the commandants said, "laid an obligation on the four participating powers to restore fully the normal movements of goods between Berlin and the western zones."

The West German government, at Allied suggestion, embargoed steel exports to the Russian zone Feb. 6. The Bonn government said East Germany had not fulfilled its part of the trade agreement which provided for the steel shipments.
