

American League Red Book Released

CHICAGO, Feb. 14 — (AP)—Winter winds may be howling, but the American Baseball league today released its annual messenger of spring, the 1950 Red Book, a 53-page manual jammed with junior circuit facts and figures.

The statistical reference book, authorized by publisher Earl Hilligan, lists 294 players—123 of them rookies—on the Rosters of the eight American league clubs.

St. Louis has the biggest rookie crop, 20, followed by Chicago and Cleveland with 17 each. All other clubs have 14 newcomers each, excepting Washington which has 13. Bucky Harris' return to Washington as Senator manager Long has been given proper notice, but the

Red Book also points out that nine coaches will be in new jobs this season.

Cleveland has no fewer than three coaching changes, including Oscar Meillo, Muddy Ruel and Al Simmons, the latter a transfer from Philadelphia. Other new coaches are John Corriden with Chicago; Rick Ferrell, switching from Washington to Detroit; Mickey Cochrane and Bing Miller with Philadelphia (Miller was with Chicago last year); Earl Brucker, shifted from Philadelphia to St. Louis; and George Myatt with Washington.

The freshman crop of 123 players includes 56 pitchers—10 on Boston's well-populated hurling staff of 21. Nine newcomers are catchers, 33 infielders and 25 outfielders.

U.W., MICHIGAN SIGN

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Personal Property Tax Reminder for 1950

Personal Property declaration forms were sent out Jan. 1, 1950, with a request for their return before March 2, 1950. Please give this your immediate attention.

Section 110-349, OCLA 1941 reads as follows: "The assessor shall cause blank forms for such returns to be prepared and distributed, but failure to receive or secure the form shall not relieve any such person, managing agent or officer from the obligation of making any return herein required. . . . All returns filed under the provision of the section shall be confidential records of the Assessor's Office."

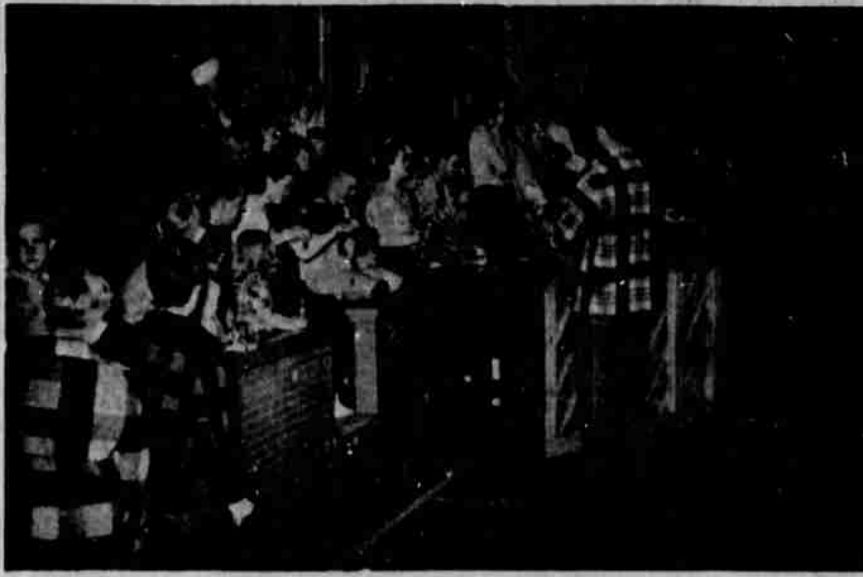
Section 110-608, OCLA 1941. "Any such person, managing agent or officer who shall with intent to evade taxation, refuse, or neglect to make any return herein required and to file it with the assessor within the time specified or as extended shall be subject to a penalty of Ten Dollars \$10.00 per day of the continuance of such refusal or neglect. . . ."

Household furniture, domestic fixtures, household goods and effects actually in use as such in homes and dwellings, where not used for business or commercial purposes, are exempt from taxation and should not be reported on this form. Exemption also applies to wearing apparel, watches, jewelry, and similar personal effects actually in use.

These forms may be obtained by calling at the Assessor's office, or will be mailed upon request.

Bennett's other brother, Talbert, of Wallows, compiled a .9475 average; rated 10th place in the state.

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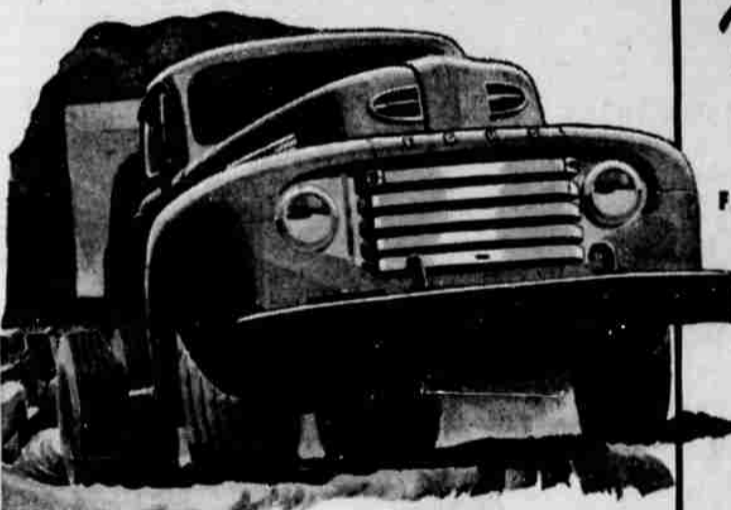
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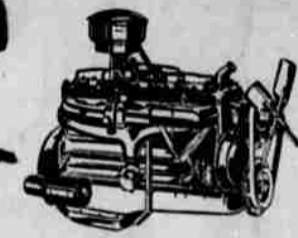
